

New Location for Translator Sought

Cave Junction—A new location for the television translator which station KBES-TV plans to install on Eight Dollar mountain near Kerby is being sought by E. A. Malone, engineer, who will have charge of construction work.

One definite ghost and several less distinct reflections will probably appear in the Illinois Valley television picture, even though the location is moved from the micro-wave station now on Eight Dollar. Malone indicated the station which now relays radio beams to Eureka would not be suitable as a spot on which to place the translator.

Testing will cover the entire mountain top. Although much of the material needed for the work has been ordered, construction will not start until preliminary engineering surveys are completed.

Castello Tie With Nevada Hotel Denied

Las Vegas, Nev. — The president of the swank Tropicana resort hotel today denied that New York gambler Frank Castello had any interest in the \$11 million hotel.

The denial followed a report that a piece of paper found in Castello's pocket when he was shot while leaving his apartment in New York City May 2 listed gross winnings as of "4-26" as \$651,234. The Nevada Gaming Control Board said the winnings, which included \$133,745 in IOU's and \$62,124 from slot machines, "appear to correspond to the cumulative totals of the Tropicana hotel as of April 26, 1957."

Tropicana President T. M. Schimberg said the owners "categorically deny that Frank Castello ever had or now has any interest whatsoever in the hotel."

Teamed with small nickel-cadmium storage batteries for peak power and night time operation, the solar cells can provide current for as much as a year, as compared with dry cells life measured in hours.
