Telegraphers, Press Service in Agreement

New York — The Commercial Telegraphers Union and the Associated Press reached agreement early today on a new contract. Federal Mediator Walter Maggioni announced.

"A settlement has been reached subject to ratification of the members of the union," Maggioni said.

The new contract agreed upon by the negotiators will run for one year. The money package averages \$4.62 per employee. A number of other provisions previously agreed upon were included in the contract.

Coos Bay Paper Asks Ike, Nixon To Resign

Portland — The Coos Bay Times Thursday charged that the Eisenhower administration was corrupt and called for the resignations of President Eisenhower and Vice-President Richard Nixon.

The charge was made in a telegram from the newspaper's publisher, Shelton F. Sackett, to managing Editor Forest Amsden which the newspaper published on page one. The telegram said in part:

"I see no alternative for you this day, but for you, in front page editorial to call for resignation of Mr. Eisenhower."

"I never thought corruption has gone so far."

The telegram gave no further explanation of the corruption charge.

Umatilla county coroner Pat Fulson said Koonce either fell or fainted and was dragged into a viner he was feeding. Death was attributed to head injuries when mechanical arms of the machine struck his head and body.

Cottage Grove Man Killed by Automobile

Eugene — John Stalder, 58, Cottage Grove was struck and fatally injured Thursday night by a car driven by a Springfield youth about four miles south of Creswell, Ore.

Donald Samuel Davis, 20, driver of the car, told police he was driving between 50 and 60 miles an hour when he saw Stalder standing on the sidewalk of a bridge. He said just as he reached the man he stepped directly in front of his car. Witnesses said it appeared Stalder either jumped or fell in front of the Davis car. He was dead on arrival at a Cottage Grove hospital and Davis was not cited.

Youths Arrested for Illegal Possession

Steven Alfred Jensen, 18, Myrtle Creek, was fined \$35 in municipal court today on charges of illegal possession of intoxicating liquor.

The youth was taken into custody Thursday, along with a 17-year-old Griffin Creek companion, when Central Point Police Chief Wallace Bowen noticed the car in which the two boys were riding was being operated recklessly, according to city police.

Bowen arrested both juveniles on South Riverside ave. near Ninth st. and turned them over to city police. No other passengers were reported in the car.

The 17-year-old boy was confined to county jail. The case was referred to county juvenile authorities who are investigating a possible parole violation by the youth, police said.
