Victor Bower Dies Of Heart Attack

Victor A. Bower, 71, of 729 West 13th st., apparently suffered a heart attack while operating a car on North Ivy st. yesterday afternoon, according to reports from city police and the county coroner's office. He was dead when a deputy coroner arrived.

Police reported that the Bower auto, headed north on Ivy st., struck a parked car near the southeast corner of the Ivy and Fifth st. section, continued on and came to rest on the curb and sidewalk at the northeast corner.

Mrs. Bower was riding with her husband and tried to steer the vehicle away from the parked car, according to police. They said Mrs. Bower apparently was unhurt. The 1954 Pontiac sedan rolled slowly across the intersection and officers stated that it was stopped by hand by Miss Diana Claire Russell, 17, of 204 North Ivy st.

Only minor damage was reported to the Bower car and to the parked 1951 Ford. Police were summoned about 1:30 p.m. Survivors of Mr. Bower in addition to his wife include a step-son, State Police Sgt. Floyd Crafts.

The body is at Conger-Morris funeral home.

Jet Plane Rushes Blood to Soldiers

Tacoma—Eighteen pints of rare-type blood flown from the Red Cross in Portland by an Air Force jet to Madigan Army hospital near here saved the life of a Ft. Lewis soldier suffering from a bleeding stomach ulcer. Madigan Army doctor said last night.

John Betts Jr., the soldier, had been admitted to the hospital June 12 in what was described as a "precarious" condition.

Portland's Red Cross had a quantity of the special blood type on hand, and when the soldier's condition apparently became worse, arrangements were made for an F-89 jet interceptor from the Portland airbase to deliver it to McChord field Saturday afternoon.

Lieutenant Colonel Lewis E. Wolfard, Madigan staff doctor, said Betts' condition is "serious," but added that the mercy flight saved the GI's life.
