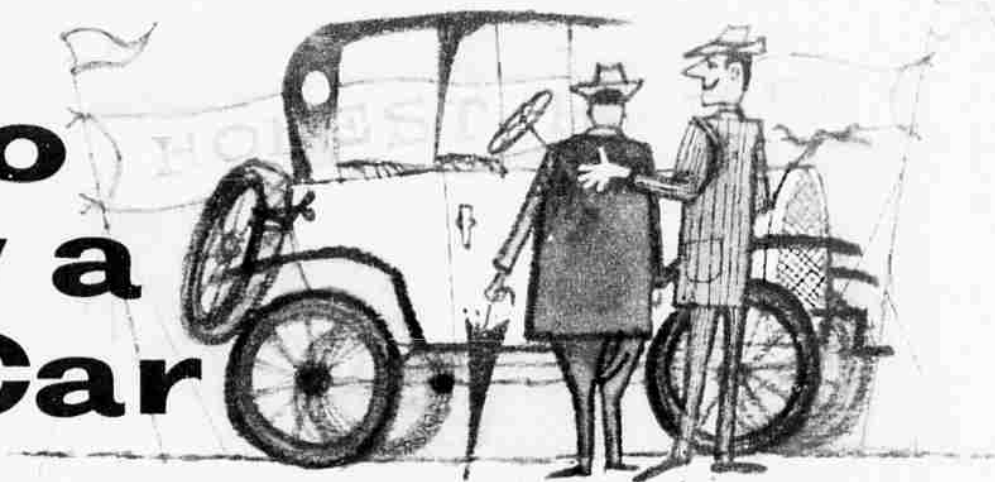


How to Buy a Used Car

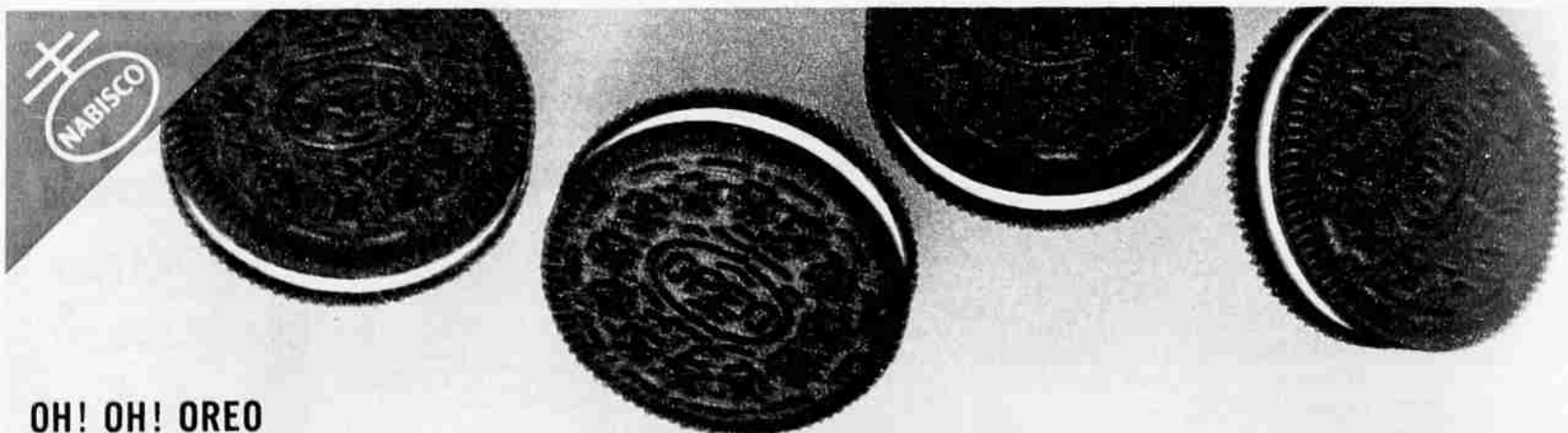
If there's anything wrong with the car you want to buy, remember that it's up to you to find it. If a

The purpose of the on-the-lot test is to eliminate at the start cars in such bad shape that further road

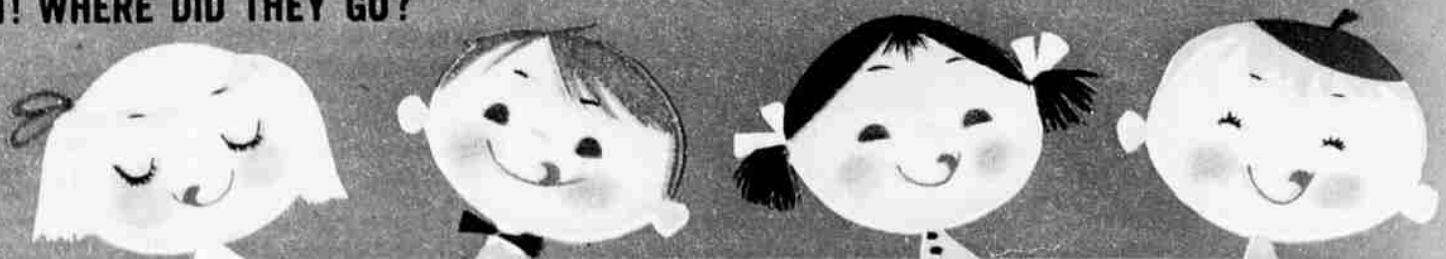
testing would be a waste of time. Besides using the tests described here, get a copy of your state's auto-inspection requirements and make sure the car will pass them without additional repairs.
