Poor Management of Money One Insult Beck Can't Ignore

Seattle — Dave Beck, who observed his 63rd birthday here Sunday, has shown himself impervious to virtually all manner of insults hurled by senators or labor leaders, save one.

Criticize his ability to manage money, and the president of the Teamsters Union will break from his silent retreat like a wounded tiger.

Apparently, it didn't bother Beck a bit when AFL-CIO President George Meany said the Teamsters Union still would have a dirty house if it allowed Beck to retire as "president emeritus."

"I don't give a damn what Mr. Meany says," was Beck's reply.

And when AFL-CIO Vice President Walter Reuther termed Beck a "disgrace to his country," and said the teamsters boss should be kicked out forthwith without a penny of retirement pay, Beck commented only upon the monetary phase of the insult.

"There is no power on earth—no court nor anything else," Beck said, that can deprive him of his \$50,000 per year retirement salary.

But when William A. Lee of Chicago, seventh vice president of the Teamsters Union, said last week that Beck will cost his union \$100,000 because of poor management, the Teamsters chief, barely available to reporters, beckoned to the press with fire dancing in his ice-blue eyes.

Lee's comments must have stung Beck deeply, because he followed up a Wednesday news conference with a Thursday en-

SF-Honolulu Flight Figured To Cost \$65

Honolulu — Peter Gluckman, San Francisco's flying watchmaker, estimated today his record making solo flight to Honolulu only cost him about \$65.

Gluckman flew Saturday from San Francisco to Honolulu in 15 hours and 48 minutes in his single-engine plane. He intends to fly back after a week's vacation in the islands.

If he completes the trip, he will be the first person to make a solo single-engine plane round trip between California and Hawaii.

So far, he is the first person to fly from California to Hawaii alone and his plane is the smallest ever to make the trip.

Asked if he would recommend the trip to other owners of light planes, Gluckman said, "sure, it is fun and it's cheaper." He had 75 gallons of gas left in the extra tanks of his Beechcraft Bonanza when he arrived.

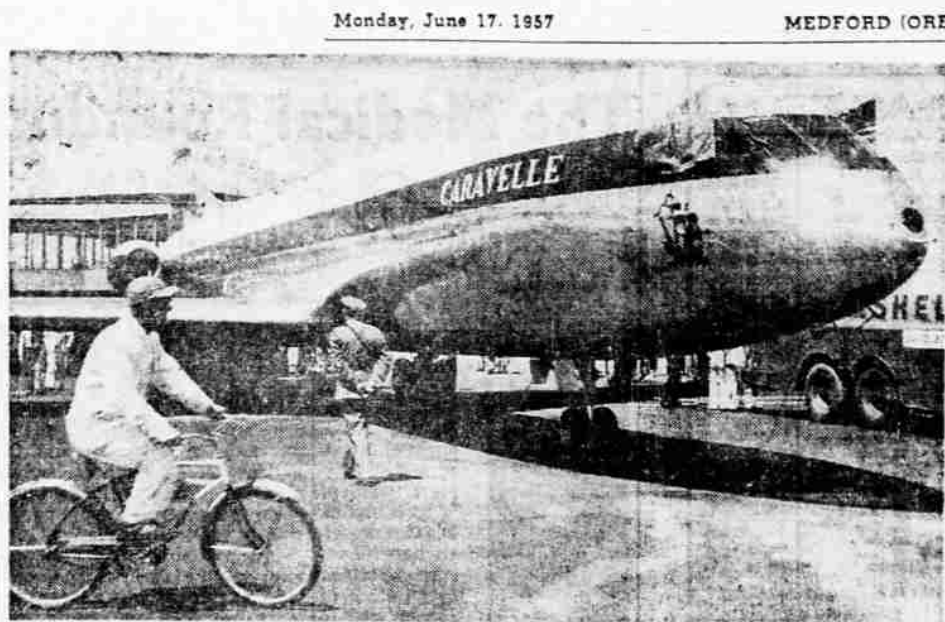

Stocks Move Higher With Rising Volume

New York — Stocks moved higher again today with volume rising on the advance.

Net gains running to more than two points spread over a broad list. The specials outperformed the blue chips although there were a few strong spots there too, notably Eastman Kodak which at its new high of 108 1/2 was up 3 1/4 points.

Steels firmed, motors moved narrowly, oils were higher and tires mixed. In the last group, General ran up nearly two points while Goodrich declined more than a point. Tobacco registered gains running to more than two points when American Tobacco raised prices on some of its cigarette brands.

Boston — One of the world's most unusual watches is for sale here. The late Tom Lawson, famed financier, paid \$10,000 for it in 1899.

An extraordinary feature of this solid gold timepiece is a set of chimes. The watch chimed for Lawson at 9:45 a.m. — 15 minutes before the market opened. It rang again at 10 a.m. to signify that the market was now open. It also chimed at 2:43 p.m., 15 minutes before the market closed, and at 3 p.m., the closing hour.

The watch is one of several antique time pieces, valued at \$100,000, placed on sale recently by the Boston jewelry firm of Charles, Henry and Crowley.
