### Philip Gates Takes Store Managership

Philip E. Gates, son of the late George Gates, today is assuming active management of the Gates Furniture store in Medford.

George Gates, who died last week, had planned to retire in the near future and plans for announcing the management change were made prior to his death.

Philip Gates has been in partnership with his parents and George Gates Jr., of Grants Pass, in the Gates Furniture store in Ashland. He is a native of Medford and a graduate of Medford High school. He served in the Navy during World War II, and attended the University of Colorado at Boulder, graduating from the school of business administration.

### Brownlee Dam Half Completed

Brownlee, Idaho — The Idaho Power Company said today its Brownlee dam in the Hells Canyon stretch of the Snake river is about half completed and should be ready for power production by late 1958.

Work on the structure has been underway for about 18 months.

Resident Manager Glenn C. Johnson of the Morrison-Knudsen Construction company said the payroll at the dam now totals 1,226 workers, most of them M-K employees.

Johnson said the most spectacular work at Brownlee is the tunneling through solid rock for installation of penstocks. When the dam is completed water will pour through the penstocks in four 28-foot diameter tunnels to activate the power plant. Each tunnel will be about 535 feet long.

Johnson added that heavy equipment crews also were excavating earth and rock from the canyon wall to prepare the powerhouse site. About 100 men are working near Huntington, Ore., to relocate a railway bridge which will be inundated by the Brownlee backwaters.

### Mill Kilns, Sheds Destroyed by Fire

Springfield, Ore. — Fire of undetermined origin destroyed three dry kilns and three drying sheds of the Fall Creek Lumber Company containing about two million board feet of clear lumber early today.

The fire started about 1 a.m. and firemen from the Eastern Lane Protective Association and the Springfield fire department fought the blaze throughout the night to prevent it from spreading to the mill proper.

The fire was brought under control about four hours after it started.

The mill was covered by insurance and no estimate of the total damage was made immediately.
