

# Danny McDevitt From St. Paul Leads Brooklyn to 7-2 Victory

The jubilant Brooklyn Dodgers felt something like a sweepstakes winner today, having collected on a "long shot" by the simple expedient of writing Danny McDevitt's name on a ticket.

They made out that ticket last Friday and it provided transportation for McDevitt from St. Paul to Brooklyn.

Who is this guy McDevitt?

That's a question even the Cincinnati Redlegs were asking today after the 25-year-old rookie southpaw, making his first big league appearance, struck out 11 of them Monday night and limited them to seven hits in pitching Brooklyn to within two games of the National League lead.

**Bucs Beat Braves**

In the only other game scheduled in the majors, Pittsburgh defeated league-leading Milwaukee 7-5. The Braves now lead the second-place Cardinals by one game.

McDevitt, called up by the Dodgers to take up some of the slack caused by the sidelining of Johnny Podres and Sandy Kou-

fax, put on quite a show for the 14,595 fans at Crosley Field. He bled chiefly on a fast ball and sneaky curve, the sawed-off New York City native struck out at least one batter in every inning except the seventh and eighth.

McDevitt also drove in what proved to be the winning run with a nifty squeeze bunt during a three-run uprising against starter Johnny Klippstein in the second inning.

Gino Cimoli led off the frame with his ninth homer over the left field fence. Roy Campanella singled and Charley Neal drove him in with a triple. McDevitt then laid down his squeeze bunt to bring in Neal.

The Dodgers added three insurance runs on two hits in the ninth.

By losing, the Redlegs tumbled into fifth place, two percentage points behind Brooklyn.

**Pittsburgh Rally Wins**

Pittsburgh gained its victory over Milwaukee with a four-run rally in the ninth, featured by triples off the bats of Gene Freese and Bob Skinner.

With the Braves leading 4-3, Freese, who collected four of

Pittsburgh's 10 hits, tripled in the ninth and scored on Roman Mejias' pinch single. Mejias raced to third when Andy Pafko threw wildly to the plate and came home on Hank Folles' bunt. Skinner then came through with his triple, scoring Folles, and then scored himself on Paul Smith's bunt.

Reliever Bob Purkey was credited with the victory. Gene Baker homered for the Pirates. The Braves rapped out 17 hits, including four by newly-acquired Red Schoendienst.

# House Un-American Committee Disregards Ruling and Suicide

San Francisco — The chairman of the House Un-American Activities Subcommittee disregarded both an adverse U.S. Supreme Court ruling and the suicide of a prospective witness and ordered hearings to proceed today on Communist infiltration of San Francisco's professions.

Rep. Francis E. Walter (D-Pa.), chairman of the subcommittee, called 50 persons to appear in the four days the hearings will be conducted. "Leaned Over Backward"

Walter said the Supreme Court "leaned over backward" Monday in reversing a contempt of Congress citation of Illinois labor leader John T. Watkins, who had balked at telling House investigators about other persons' past Communist activities.

The subcommittee chairman also expressed "disappointment" over the suicide of William K. Sherwood, a Stanford University research assistant who had been scheduled to testify.

Walter, in ordering the hearings to proceed, ignored a demand by the American Civil Liberties Union that he call off the sessions because of Sherwood's suicide.

Sherwood, 41, took a dose of poison in his Pacific Grove, Calif., laboratory, leaving a note which said he feared he would be "assassinated by publicity" at his scheduled appearance before the subcommittee.

Walter said he had been hopeful of obtaining helpful testimony from Sherwood.

He refused to comment at length on the Supreme Court decision, saying he would not make a full statement until he had read the decision.

"I am of the belief that the court leaned over backward," Walter said.

Walter said doctors, lawyers, schoolteachers, newspapermen and architects will be called. He did not disclose any names but three lawyers admitted they had been subpoenaed.

# Mounted Patrol Serious Business at Lake Resort

Lake George, N.Y.—If you're visiting this resort village on the shore of the lake of the same name, don't be surprised by a band of horsemen dashing along the streets.

This won't be part of a Wild West show. The Warren County Mounted Patrol is serious business.

The patrol is Sheriff Carl McCoy's answer to law-enforcement problems in the remote woods and mountains of his 876-square-mile county in the Adirondacks. He organized the group last fall and, after a winter of service, it has emerged an established arm of the law.

The patrol now numbers nearly 40 volunteers, and they're no dude cowboys. Fully deputized, they are highly respected citizens who know well the rugged terrain and perils of their territory.

# Porter Bill Would Deny Tax Write-Off

Washington, D.C.—Legislation designed to deny Idaho Power company a "fast tax write-off" in its Hells Canyon franchise was introduced by Congressman Charles O. Porter (D-Ore.) last week.

The Oregon lawmaker's bill would "plug another tax loophole" which "is already going to cost the taxpayers \$3 billion for its past six years of existence," Porter said.

"It was not enough that the Administration should attempt to give away the biggest remaining undeveloped power resource in North America—Hells Canyon—but insult to injury was added in stretching a wartime device—intended to encourage companies to build needed defense facilities in a hurry—to favor the Idaho Power company."

Rep. Porter recalled that Russell C. Bainwater, chief accountant of the Federal Power Commission, testified that the U.S. Treasury could lose as much as "\$83,959,827" by the fast tax write-off granted to the Idaho Power company.

"This is probably a conservative and minimum guess at the loss," Porter commented.

The Porter bill, "Emergency Facility Amortization Act of 1957," would change the present law to apply to applicants certified after January 1, 1957.
