

Bob Shantz Records Eighth Victory; Yankees Gain as Orioles Nick Sox

Bobby Shantz, the New York Yankees' 142-pound pitching giant, owns an 8-1 record and 1.85 earned run average today that make him baseball's No. 1 candidate for "comeback of the year" honors.

Shantz, showing the same form that made him the American league's most valuable player in 1952, turned in his seventh straight victory Tuesday night when he beat the Detroit Tiger, 2-1, to move the Yankees within 2½ games of the first-place Chicago White Sox. The White Sox suffered their sixth loss in 10 games when Billy Pierce walked out the winning run in a 2-1 defeat at the hands of the Baltimore Orioles.

Bobby Richardson, the man who made Billy Martin expendable, delivered a sacrifice fly in the second inning and singled home the winning Yankee run in the fifth to help hand Billy Hoeltz his fourth defeat. A crowd of 33,124 saw the Tigers score their only run on a walk and two singles.

Pierce Loses No. 4
Pierce suffered his fourth loss against 10 wins when he walked and Billy Gardner, Bob Nieman and Jim Busby in succession to give the Orioles their decisive run. George Zuverink shut out the White Sox for the last 2 2/3 innings to gain credit for his seventh victory for Baltimore.

The Cleveland Indians shamed the Boston Red Sox, 7-6, and the Kansas City Athletics beat the Washington Senators, 2-0, in the other American league games. Chico Carrasquel, Vic Wertz, Rocky Colavito and Roger Maris homered for the Indians as Bob Lemon, in his first appearance since May 24, won his fourth game.

Ralph Terry, the ex-Yankee, pitched 5½ hit ball for 2 2/3 innings for the Athletics and Virgil Trucks struck out Art Schult with the bases filled for the final out. Homers by Lou Skizas and Vic Power produced the Kansas City runs that tagged Ted Abernathy with his seventh defeat.

In the National league, the Brooklyn Dodgers dumped Cincinnati into fifth place with a 7-0 victory over the Redlegs; the New York Giants whipped the first-place Milwaukee Braves 5-4; the Philadelphia Phillies downed the Chicago Cubs 7-6, and the Pittsburgh Pirates defeated the St. Louis Cardinals 8-1.

Don Newcombe pitched a five-hitter and drove in two runs with a double and a homer as the Dodgers tagged the slumping Redlegs with their fourth straight loss and eighth in nine games. The Dodgers combed five Cincinnati pitchers for 13 hits as Newcombe flipped his third shutout for his sixth triumph.

Giants Keep Rolling
Ray Crone shut out his ex-teammates for six innings to win his first game for the Giants who've won six of their last seven games. Daryl Spencer's two-run sixth-inning single was the decisive blow after an error by Bill Bruton paved the way for Warren Spahn's fourth loss. Wes Westrum homered for the Giants. Rookie Harry Anderson's

slam and Rip Repulski's three-run homer provided the Phillies with all their runs as Jim Hearn picked up his first win with a 4 1/3 innings of one-run relief pitching. Hearn struck out six of the 15 batters he faced after rookie Jack Sanford, trying for his ninth win, fanned seven batters in 4 2/3 frames.

Bobo Olson Awarded Split Decision Over Joe Maxim

Portland, Ore. — "You know, when that man hit me, I didn't feel a thing."

That's what Carl (Bobo) Olson said in his dressing room Tuesday night after he had taken a split decision over the veteran Joey Maxim at Civic auditorium here.

Olson was awarded the decision by both judges. Judge Eddie Volk had the ex-middleweight champ ahead 57½-52½ and the other judge, Dick Wagner had Olson ahead 56-54. Only the referee, Ralph Gruman, had Maxim in front. He gave the fight to Maxim, 56-54.

The ex-middleweight kinglypin was fighting for the first time since May 18, 1956, when he lost a return match to Sugar Ray Robinson for the 160-pound title.

He went into the fight at 187 pounds, eight more than he had figured. But the extra poundage didn't seem to hurt Olson. He looked like the once-proud owner of the middleweight crown as he continually hit Maxim with sharp lefts and rights.

To Take 10 Off
Sid Flaherty, Bobo's manager, said after the fight: "we'll take another 10 pounds off him and he'll be all right. You know, making that 160-pound weight weakened him too much. He's too big of a man to fight in the middleweight class."

Flaherty thought Olson's timing was off a little, but otherwise thought Bobo's showing in the fight was good after such a long layoff.

In the other dressing room, where Maxim was sporting a

medium-sized mouse under his left eye, the former light-heavyweight champion thought Olson did a good job. "I just couldn't get started tonight. I just couldn't get off," he said.

As Maxim walked into the shower, his manager, Jack Kearns, said: "There'll be a return match someplace. It was too good of a fight not to have another."
