

Joe Brown Favorite In Zulueta Tussle

Denver — Champion Joe Brown, a rugged puncher for a lightweight, is favored to catch elusive Cuban challenger Orlando Zulueta often enough tonight to retain his title in a scheduled 15-rounder at Denver coliseum.

Brown, 21, is a 2-1 favorite over the 28-year-old Havanaan, although Zulueta has never hit

the canvas in 100 fights. His fancy boxing and strong left could lift the champion's slightly-worn crown. Brown has worn the crown less than a year.

The Baton Rouge, La., champion, who defeated Wallace Bud Smith for the title and again in his only defense in a rematch, was expected to weigh ounces short of the 135-pound limit. Zulueta was well under the limit, at 134½.

6-Ounce Gloves

Zulueta's camp lost a pre-fight skirmish Tuesday when the Colorado Athletic commission ruled 6-ounce gloves would be used instead of the 8-ounce ones called for in commission rules.

Manager Hymie Wallman charged the commission was giving Brown the championship "before it gets started," pointing out that the lighter gloves helps a "puncher" like Brown.

Commissioner Leo J. Crowley said the 8-ounce rule was "our rule and we can change it." Most championship bouts, outside Colorado, which has not had a title bout since 1918, are fought with the 6-ounce glove.

Coe Starts Defense in Trans Miss.

Dallas, Tex. — Bob Prall of Salem, Ore., failed Tuesday to qualify for the Trans-Mississippi golf tournament. The University of Oregon ace had an 80.

Dallas — Charlie Coe, the Oklahoma thin man who will serve as non-playing captain of this year's Walker cup team, opened defense of his Trans-Mississippi golf championship today.

It will be the veteran Coe, an Oklahoma City insurance man who has been winning golf titles for a decade or more, against a strong field of youthful challengers in this 54th revival of one of the top amateur competitions in the nation.

One starts out the 126-hole match play grind that could lead to his fifth Trans Miss. crown against a little known Houston entry, Chuck Dresser, who slipped into the 64-player title flight with a five over par 70 in Tuesday's portion of qualifying play.

Not a one of the 130-odd would-be qualifiers even managed to match par Tuesday, and that left the medalist honors safely in the hands of Jack Moore, the Big Seven conference champion from the University of Oklahoma.

Moore, a 19-year-old sophomore from Duncan, Okla., had mastered the Brook Hollow layout with a 23-35-68 in scorching heat on Monday.

Louis Mediator In Fight Issue

New York — Joe Louis probably will save the million-dollar Ray Robinson-Carmen Basilio fight before next Monday's deadline.

The former heavyweight champion has been sent in as a mediator to break the deadlock between promoter Jim Norris and Sugar Ray.

Louis, now is a \$20,000-a-year public relations man for Norris' International Boxing clubs of New York and Illinois, and he is also a close friend of Robinson.

Big Joe had his first huddle with the middleweight champion Tuesday night, and the previously bitter Robinson reported "some progress."

Grand Rapids, Mich. — Bernard Warren, retired furniture executive, says he is responsible for the nation's Dutch elm disease blight.

Warren said he unwittingly brought the disease to the United States in the 1920's when he imported 12 carloads of Carpathian elm stumps from Europe for elm burl furniture veneer. "The whole thing was done innocently," he said.

No Objections Voiced To Public Works Bill

Washington — The chairman of the House Rivers and Harbors Subcommittee said today no objections have been registered against adding 11 navigation projects to the big public works authorization bill.

The House Public Works Committee is expected to finish work on the Senate-passed bill sometime next week.

The bill carried more than \$1,500,000,000 in authorizations when it cleared the Senate. The 11 new projects would add \$139,528,000.

The new proposals included: Bellingham Harbor, Wash., Watcom Creek deepening, \$83,700.

Siuslaw River, Ore., channel and basin work, north jetty extension, \$1,693,000.

Santa Cruz County, Calif., beach erosion, \$516,000.

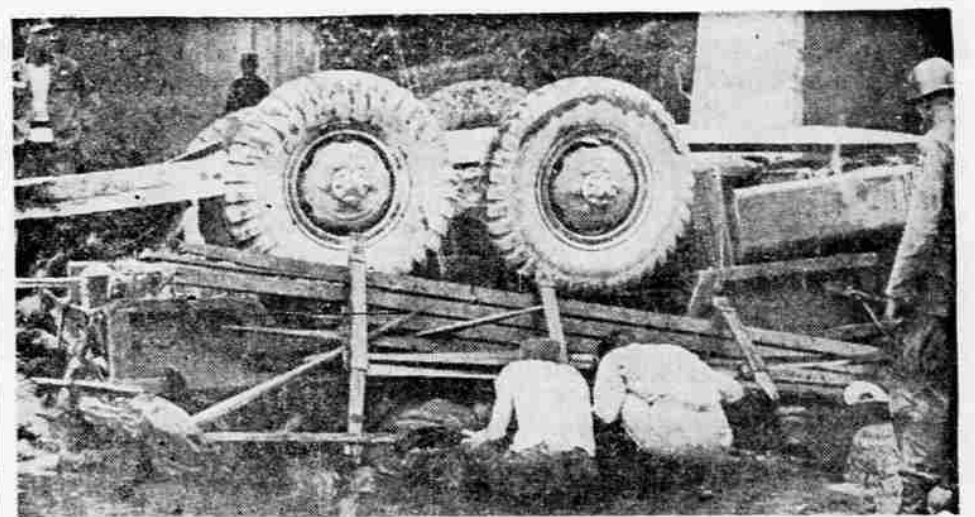
Showgirl Advances On \$64,000 Question

Swedish Industries Find Advantages Under Ground

Stockholm — Swedish industries which have gone underground to protect themselves against air raids are finding peacetime advantages in their deep-rock shelters which are likely to make subterranean factories permanent establishments.

There are no published figures on the extent of these underground factories. Informed sources estimate that virtually all of Sweden's vital defense industries now are in underground quarters, blasted out of solid granite.

The first privately owned concern to build underground was AGA (Swenska AB Gas-Accumulator), manufacturers of marine beacons, optical goods.

Brush Fire Burns Out of Control Near Los Angeles

Los Angeles — A second major brush and forest fire blazed out of control today in Temescal Canyon near Lake Elsinore, threatening to surpass an earlier conflagration that razed 1,650 acres during 100-degree Southern California weather.

Assistant California Forester Harvey French, in charge of fire fighting operations, said the new blaze probably would cover 4000 acres before it could be controlled.

Fire crews faced the outbreak near the village of Alberhill, about seven miles northwest of the dried Elsinore lakebed. The flames moved toward Corona to the north in the citrus belt, but that city was not in any immediate danger.

No Homes Threatened

French said 1,000 acres burned overnight in the Temescal blaze, and that a major portion of the 350 fire fighters in the area had been shifted to that area. There were no homes or ranches threatened in the sparsely populated sector.

More than 1,600 acres were burned over inside the city of Los Angeles, including the natural wilderness of Griffith Park, but these fires were reported under control early today.

The first major brush fire of the year was brought under control Tuesday near Lake Elsinore. The blaze blacked 1,850 acres of brush.

The Griffith Park fire in San Fernando Valley area was controlled Tuesday night by the city fire department. No structures were destroyed but 1,000 acres in the vast park were charred.

Extension Agents Plan To Attend Conference

All Jackson county extension agents will be in Roseburg Monday attending an administrative conference for agents in the southern Oregon area.

The group will leave here early Monday morning and return Monday evening. Counties represented at the meeting will be Coos, Curry, Josephine, Jackson and Douglas.

Honolulu — A thief broke into a restaurant Tuesday and stole 15 pounds of ham, 10 pounds of stew meat, 6 pounds of margarine, 5 pounds of uncooked pork, 4 pounds of fish, 4 dozen eggs, 100 pounds of rice and a case of canned cream. He also took a small double-burner electric stove.

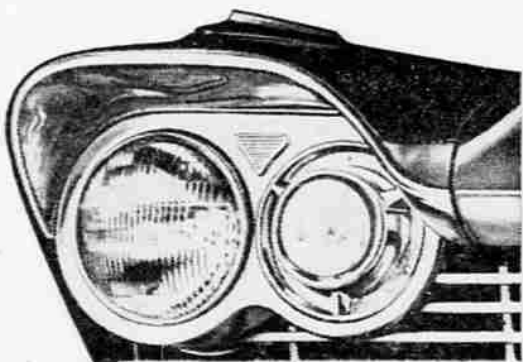
