

Glenn Klein Elected Chairman of County Inter-Agency Group

Glenn Klein, county extension agent for 4-H work, was elected chairman of the Jackson County Inter-Agency Council, a group of professional personnel representing the several health, education, and social service agencies in our community.

W. V. Nussbaum, regional representative of Social Security administration is vice chairman. Ruth Kilbourne, newly named executive-director, Rogue Valley Girl Scout Council, is secretary. Harold Cook, executive secretary of the United Medford Crusade, and current vice chairman, are the nominating committee.

Thomas Lytle, president of the Medford Junior High School, and Elliott Becken, assistant superintendent of Medford schools, also served on nominating committee.

Committee Chairman

Committee chairmen Robert Jones, YMCA executive secretary, who is in charge of program, and Robert Kelley, psychiatric social worker, Veterans Administration at Camp White,

who heads a committee working with community relations and information. Another committee on community resources, to study and coordinate community services, will be headed by Hugh Simpson, Southern Oregon college representative. Appointments to these three committees will be made later by Klein cooperatively with the three chairmen.

Program for the June meeting held in the Courthouse on Tuesday, was a discussion of Jackson County's civil defense program. Major General J. H. Hicks met with the group and emphasized the need for preparedness of all citizens for attack and of key personnel for help in case of evacuation.

The June meeting will be the last meeting chaired by Miss Mary Vandenberg, psychiatric social worker for the Southern Oregon Child Guidance Clinic association, who is accepting employment in the east this fall. The Inter-Agency Council will meet in September with new officers and committees.

Teacher Changes Listed by Board

Personnel changes in Medford school were announced today by school officials.

Ernst Ludwig, who has served as principal and seventh and eighth grade combination teacher at West Side school, has been transferred to McLoughlin Junior High School. Students in the seventh and eighth grades will be transferred to McLoughlin Junior High this fall.

Don Perry, who served as coach and fifth and sixth grade teacher, will assume a coaching and teaching position at Jackson school.

Ronald Weatherford, who previously coached and taught in intermediate grades at Jefferson, and who served as Nampa, Ida., elementary school principal last year, will be principal, coach and teacher of fifth and sixth grade combination classroom at West Side school.

West Side and Oak Grove schools are scheduled to have grades on through six starting next fall, school officials said.

The school board also announced that Leland J. Knox, certified public accountant, Medford, has been selected to audit school district accounts for the 1956-57 school year.

Barber Give-Aways Banned in Detroit

Detroit.—The local Barber Union has decided there'll be no more lollipops or bubble gum handed out to youngsters in the future.

The barbers say the action did not come because of sticky chairs or gummed-up magazines. "It's to correct a situation that has gotten out of hand in recent years," a union spokesman said.

The union said free bubble gum was one thing but barbers didn't stop there in enticing children to their respective shears.

"It's no good," the union said, "when everybody starts trying to buy everybody else's business. It got so bad that one of the barbers was offering chances on a bicycle with every haircut. A drawing was held each week on a new bike.

"So we decided to put a stop to it."

Some 2,000 barbers in the Detroit area will be affected by the new ruling, announced Tuesday by Local 522 of the Barbers Union.

The ban wasn't aimed wholly at the children, the union said, "but we couldn't draw the line." It also prohibits barbers from giving away free cigars to Dad and trading stamps to Mom.

Suspect Confesses Idaho Bank Holdup

Boise.—The FBI said today a suspect picked up for questioning about Tuesday's robbery of the Idaho First National Bank branch in Parma admitted orally that he pulled the holdup.

Thomas Gearty, special FBI agent in charge of the Idaho-Montana district, identified the suspect as Maurice Lloyd Fillmore, 31, of Wilder. He was taken into custody by FBI agents and local police just before 10 p.m. Tuesday in a local tavern.

There was no definite estimate of the amount of money taken in the robbery, although bank officials said it was between \$4,000 and \$4,500.

Officers said Fillmore had \$3,700 on him at the time of his arrest and they added Fillmore told them it was the bank's money.

Clark Eaton, assistant manager of the Parma bank, said the holdup occurred about 2:30 p.m. at a time when there was only one customer in the bank.

Architects Select Oregon Buildings

Portland.—The three most outstanding buildings in Oregon built since 1951 received "First Honor" awards here on Tuesday night from the Oregon chapter, American Institute of Architects.

The three examples were cited for their contemporary design and liberal use of regional materials.

They were: Hoyt Street Medical building, Portland, Skidmore, Owings and Merrill, architects; Portland Garden Club building, John Storms architect; and the Oceanlake-Wecoma Beach community congregational church, Warren Weber, architect.

Jacksonville Man Named as Counsellor

Lawrence L. Tweedy, 38, of route 1, box 65A, Jacksonville, will start duties Thursday, June 20, as counsellor in the Jackson county Juvenile department.

Tweedy will replace Leroy Wells who resigned in April.

The new counsellor was born in London of American parents and received his high school education at Canford school in England.

He is a graduate of Freiburg university, Black Forest, Germany, and served as a master sergeant with the OSS, U.S. Army during World War II. He was formerly employed with the personnel department of Arabian American Oil company, Dhahran, Saudi Arabia, and has made his home in Oregon since 1952. He has been a field representative for Monarch Feed and Seed company.

His wife, Helen Tweedy, is executive secretary for the Jackson county Public Health association.

The couple have four sons and are active in PTA and 4-H club work.

Missing Novelist Located in Hospital

Los Angeles.—Elliott Paul, 66, author of "The Last Time I Saw Paris" has been located at General Hospital suffering from a heart condition after being reported missing for a week.

Mrs. Elizabeth Benson reported Paul missing last Wednesday. She described herself as a friend of Paul and said he failed to keep an appointment with her last week.

Officers Tuesday found that Paul had been a patient at General Hospital since June 17. They said he was nearly broke and had a cardiac condition. The hospital reported Paul was "doing all right."

Rehearing Denied Crosby in Arizona

Phoenix, Ariz.—The Arizona Supreme Court Tuesday denied an application for a rehearing in the case involving Oregon Teamster official Clyde C. Crosby.

The Supreme Court had denied the petition of Attorney General Robert Morrison to reinstate the 1930 theft conviction of Crosby, who claimed he was a juvenile at the time. The high court Tuesday denied Morrison's request for a rehearing.

However, a petition on the same case is still before Yavapai County Superior Court.

Stock Prices Decline On Curtailed Volume

New York.—Stocks declined irregularly today on sharply curtailed volume.

Industrial registered their widest decline since May 27 but the losses in the leading issues generally held to small amounts. Eastman Kodak, the exception, fell more than four points at its low.

Amerasia fell three and several others two or more. But new issues came to the fire in the wire-gain category. American Home Products touched 166 1/2, a new high and up eight points. It held most of the rise. American Hawaiian Steamship gained three. Corning Glass at its top was up three and Minneapolis Honeywell set a new high at 115, up four, before meeting moderate profit taking.

Dow-Jones final stock averages: 30 industrials 505.82, off

5.40; 20 railroads 145.55, off 0.85; 15 utilities 71.60, off 0.98, and 65 stocks 174.86, off 1.77.

Sales today were about 2,220,000 shares compared with 2,440,000 shares today.

Neuberger Presents Bill for Orphans

Washington.—Sen. Richard L. Neuberger, (D-Ore.), today introduced bills in the Senate to permit four Oregon families to bring their adopted, foreign-born children to the United States.

In introducing the special legislation, Neuberger scored the failure of Congress and the administration to adopt a permanent policy to sweep aside barriers to orphan entries to the United States.

Neuberger said that last January when he introduced a bill to admit 10,000 orphans to this country he was assured of prompt action.

"To date," he said, "no action has been taken or scheduled by the appropriate Senate committee on this or the dozen or so other orphan bills which have been introduced."

Hoffa Stands Trial On Bribery Charges

Washington.—The government today brought Teamster Union Vice President James R. Hoffa to trial on the charge of bribing a Senate Rackets Committee investigator.

Being tried with him on the same charges was Hyman L. Fischbach, a Miami lawyer and an alleged accomplice.

Hoffa is one of three high-ranking Teamster officials currently fighting criminal charges brought by the government. Union Vice President Frank Brewster of Seattle was on trial here in a courtroom not far from Hoffa on a contempt of Congress charge. And Teamster President Dave Beck is under indictment on an income tax evasion charge.
