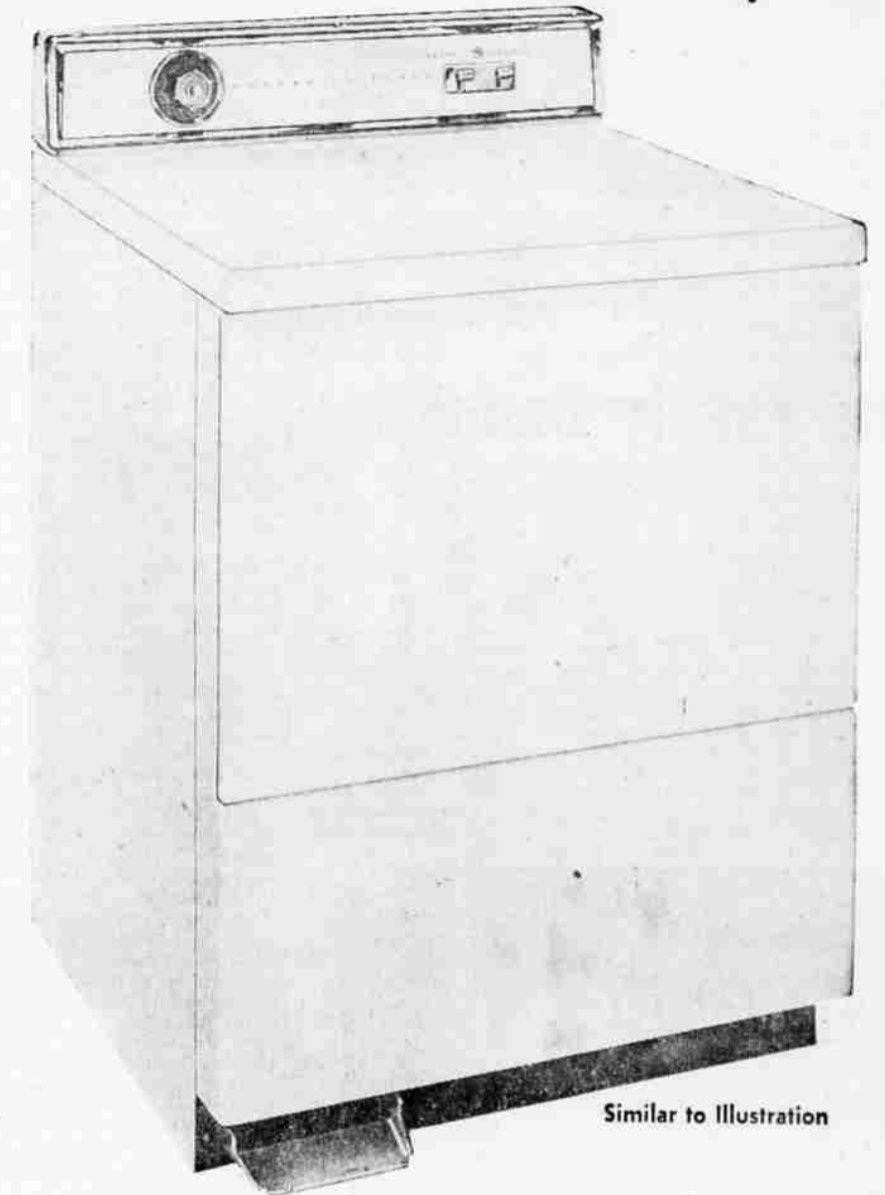
He returned from St. Martins college, Olympia, Wash., last week, and is planning to enter the service as a Naval Air cadet this fall.
