Tax Proposed to Help Boost Tourist Trade

Ashland — A proposed license tax for promoting tourist business in Ashland was introduced at the council meeting this week. The proposal was referred to the ordinance committee for further study.

The council approved the 1937-38 city budget calling for \$1,098,595 expenditures. The budget is within the 6 per cent limitation and will require no general election. It requires a levy of 14.66 mills to raise \$105,119.

The council also accepted the bid of Picker X-ray firm for equipment at the laboratory in Ashland General Hospital. The bid was \$11,692.

Fireworks Display Scheduled at Ashland

Ashland — The Ashland Junior Chamber of Commerce has scheduled a fireworks display at the Ashland Speedway July 4. Robert Boyce Jr., chairman of the event, has announced.

Boyce said the Jaycees plan to stage the largest display ever held in this area for several years.

More than 80 pieces have been arranged for the display, which will include star shells, carnival shells, golden fern shell, Niagara Falls, and the American flag.

The display will start at 9 p.m. July 4.

China Provinces Ravaged by Floods

Tokyo — The worst floods in recent history ravaged seven provinces on the China mainland last year, Communist China disclosed for the first time today.

Peiping carried reports of the floods when they occurred last year but maintained they were kept under control. A statement broadcast by Radio Peiping admitted today the floods were far more serious than its previous reports indicated.

Senate Heads for Civil Rights Battle

Washington — The Senate today headed for a showdown on the opening battle over the civil rights bill.

Supporters said publicly and southern opponents conceded privately that the House-passed bill would result in keeping the bill out of the hands of the Senate Judiciary Committee where a similar bill has been bottled up for months.

A civil rights coalition headed by Senate GOP leader William F. Knowland and Sen. Paul H. Douglas (D-Ill.) resorted to a seldom used Senate rule to try to put the bill directly on the Senate calendar.

Home Economist Gives Tips on China Care

Iowa City — Fine china which is often displayed but rarely used can take daily use if given proper care, a University of Iowa home economist said.

Margaret Keyes said care should begin with proper storage. This means keeping similar shaped pieces stacked together with a piece of protective material between them.

Cups shouldn't be hung by the handles because it puts pressure on the weakest part of the cup, the point where the bowl and handle are joined, she said.

China should be washed separately and in soft, warm water with a mild soap. The water should be of uniform temperature, with no scalding water used as a rinse.

Buyers in Cautious Return To Market

New York — Buyers returned cautiously to many sections of the stock market today to cushion a further decline that came into the leading groups.

The averages slipped a bit further but as the 500 level approached more support was forthcoming.

Utilities which are considered less advantageous as inflation hedges than other issues receded more than rails or industrials. Their losses ranged to more than a point in Peoples Gas.
