Mrs. Sherwood Drops Lawsuit Over Death

Monterey, Calif. — The widow of a man who committed suicide last week after appearing before a House Un-American Activities Subcommittee has ordered her attorneys to withdraw a \$500,000 damage suit.

Mrs. Barbara Sherwood filed the suit last week against three members of the committee and two staff members, charging they drove her husband to his death.

Her husband was William K. Sherwood, 41, a brilliant cancer research scientist. He took poison in his Pacific Grove, Calif., laboratory a week ago, saying he feared "assassination by publicity."

Mrs. Sherwood, the mother of four, wrote to her attorneys saying that "continuing with the suit can only bring more grief, pain and publicity to a family already overwhelmed with these conditions."

New York — Stocks lost almost \$2 billion in value today and then rallied a bit from the lows in moderate trading.

The decline was in extension of last week's setback, the sharpest for any week since early in January. Lukens Steel was a wide mover all day. It ranged between a new high of 121½ and a low of 115½. Near the close it was up almost three points. Other steels were earlier.

Oils were weak. Gulf lost around four and Amerasia around three to pace this group lower. DuPont fell almost two and Allied more than one in the chemicals.

Three Soviet Ships Leave Suez Canal

Suez, Egypt — Two Soviet destroyers and a Red fleet tanker sailed out of the Suez Canal today and entered the Red Sea.

The destroyers and the auxiliary tanker had entered the canal from the Mediterranean at Port Said Sunday. They emerged at Suez in the early morning darkness and steamed slowly southward.

There was no indication that they would linger in the Red Sea, close to the potential Aqaba Gulf trouble spot.

The Soviet vessels, first Russian warships to transit the canal since its reopening, were believed to be part of the six-ship Red fleet that sailed into the Mediterranean last week through the Dardanelles. The others were a cruiser and two motor torpedo boats.
