

Student Plays 144 Holes As Mercury Hits 112

Phoenix, Ariz. — Frank Bostock, one of Phoenix's better amateur golfers, ran and walked 144 holes of golf Monday under a scorching sun in 12 hours and 47 minutes and posted a remarkable average score of 74 strokes per round.

When Bostock teed off at 4:35 a.m., the temperature was 75 degrees. The mercury rose to 112

Fighter Eyes Olson Next

San Francisco — Pat McMurtry, fresh from a victory over Howard King but barely flattened by kid heat wave, said today he was ready to take on Carl Bobo Olson next in Portland.

The 187-pound Tacoma Irishman outpointed the bleeding King 192, in a 10-round battle Monday night which ended with King closing fast while McMurtry visibly wilted in the 80-degree heat which bathed the Clive Auditorium.

"The heat really wore me down at the end," McMurtry said, after agreeing that the veteran from Reno had put on a staunch rally in the final rounds.

That wasn't enough to turn the tide, however. All three officials scored it for McMurtry. Judge Jack Silver saw it 97-94, Judge Eddie James 99-95 and Referee Frankie Carter 96-95. The United Press saw it in King's favor, 98-97. McMurtry was a 3-1 favorite.

It marked McMurtry's 15th triumph in 27 fights. He was held to a draw in one bout and lost another to Willie Pastrano last year.

before Bostock finished and his last four rounds were played in 100-plus temperatures.

"I don't know whether the 144 holes is a record for one day of play," said the 35-year-old former Arizona State College athlete, "but I'll bet no one has played that many rounds any faster than I did today, especially the first five rounds which I ran through. I also doubt that anyone has posted a better score for that many holes."

Bostock, who played the eight-round, 48,800 yard Wigwam Country Club course according to U.S. Golf Association rules, racked up scores of 74-75-68-69-75-75-80-77 in the par 71 layout.

"I've only been golfing four years I have a one handicap," said Bostock. "The reason I did this was because I had heard about other golfers trying a marathon and I thought I would see what I could do."

Paris — Hogan Kid Bassey of Nigeria planned a world tour today to defend his newly won world featherweight title against all comers.

He became the first Nigerian world champion Monday night by stopping Frenchman Sherif Hamia of Algeria in the 10th round, after climbing twice off the canvas himself before 18,000 at Palais des Sports.

They fought for the 126-pound crown left vacant by American Sandy Saddler's retirement last March because of an eye injury. Manager George Biddles said

today, "we have offers for fights in so many countries, we are planning a world tour — after Bassey takes a holiday with his young wife."

Team for Free

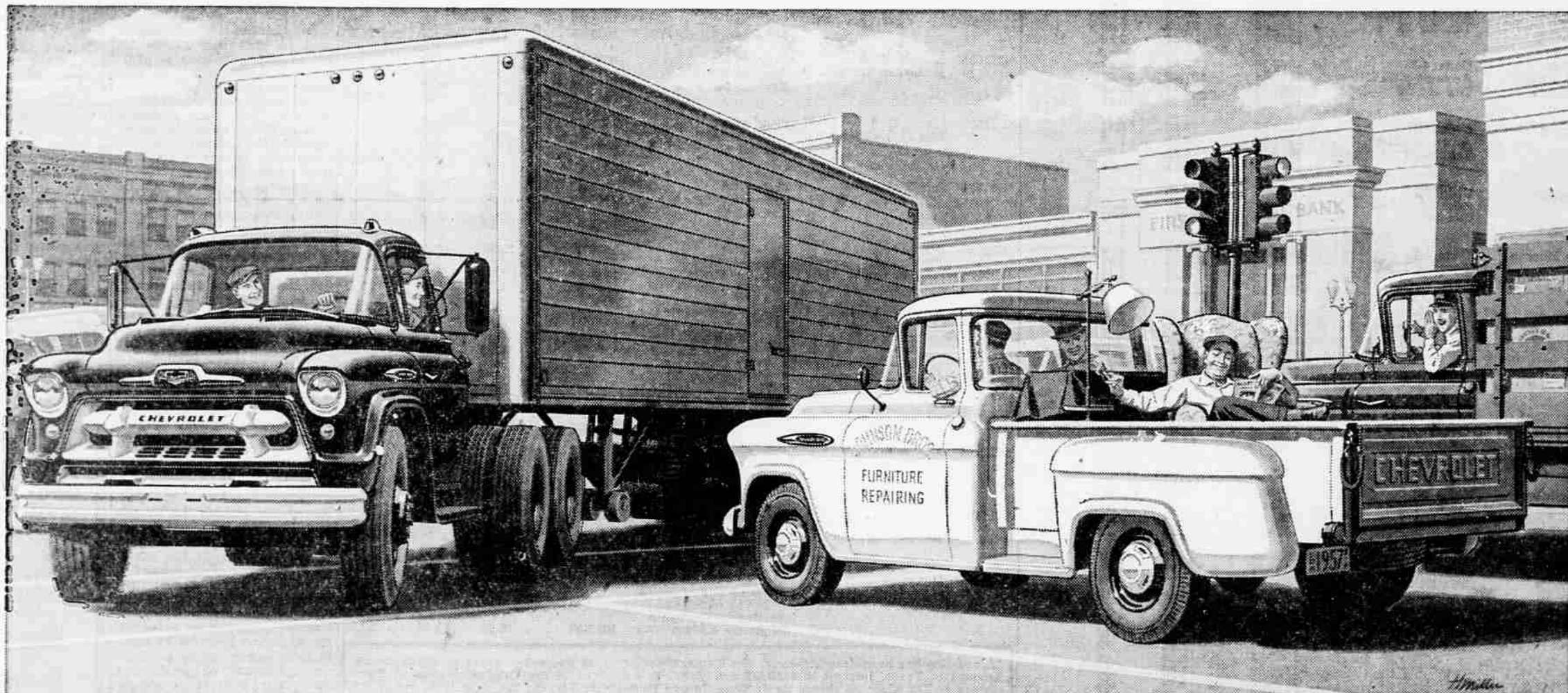
