Klamath Indian Bill Sent To Committee

Washington—Sen. Richard L. Neuberger (D-Ore.) announced today that he had succeeded in sending Klamath Indian termination legislation to a conference committee. Neuberger said he moved for the conference in hopes of correcting inadequacies of the House version of the Klamath termination act. He pointed out that the \$550,000 appropriated by the House version to reimburse Indians for termination costs totals only half of the Senate allowance. In addition, the House bill shortens the period of postponing and delaying termination, the Senator said in calling for a compromise between the two versions.

Tigard Boys Go On Rock-Throwing Spree

Tigard, Ore.—Two boys, 9 and 11, went on a rock-throwing spree over the week end and smashed out 59 window panes, a plate glass door and eight stained glass panels of an uncompleted Methodist church. A stained glass panel of the Holy Bible was one of the targets of the vandals. Reverend Stanley D. Trefen, pastor of the new church, said cost to repair the damage will be from \$500 to \$600. The boys, Trefen said, had been caught, and their parents are assuming the responsibility.

Presbyterians Name Albany Man Officer

Portland—The Synod of Oregon of the Presbyterian church Monday elected the Rev. Dr. Morton L. Booth of Albany as moderator. More than 300 delegates were attending the 67th annual session of the synod, held this year on the Lewis & Clark College campus here. Dr. Booth has been with the Albany church for 10 years and is state chaplain for the Oregon American Legion.

Salem Council Moves To End Outside Work Ban

Salem—An end to a ban on outside work was called for Monday night by the Salem city council. The council unanimously adopted a subcommittee report on suspension of firemen which was made after three fire department employees were fired for holding outside jobs. It was proposed to allow outside work if prior approval is given and the work does not conflict with regular duties or bring discredit to employees.

Togoland Villagers Attack French Patrol

Lome, French Togoland—Seven persons were killed and three seriously wounded Monday night when villagers at Lamarkarra attacked a French army patrol. French authorities said the populace was trying to stop the patrol from arresting a villager. Lamarkarra is in the northern tip of Togoland.

Shasta Recreation Project Scheduled

Dunsmuir, Calif.—Start on a \$750,000 recreational development, one of the largest of its kind ever built in northern California, is scheduled for next week on the slopes of Mt. Shasta. The Mt. Shasta Chairlift Corp. said the fund drive would be concluded this week and work started on a 7775-foot chairlift by July 1. Planned for completion by Dec. 1 were the first portion of the lift, a \$50,000 lodge for daytime tourist accommodations, power lines, parking area and sanitary facilities. An all-weather highway is under construction to the area. George Schrader, secretary of the corporation, said the project should be completed in time for the Mt. Shasta area to cash in on the Olympic winter sports boom of 1959 when foreign skiers will train under California conditions for the 1960 Olympics.

California Girl Suffering From Asia Flu Symptoms

Davis, Calif.—More than one fourth of the 291 high school teen-agers attending the 1937 Girls State here are suffering from "an acute respiratory infection," similar to the flu that has swept Asia for months. Dr. Thomas Y. Cooper said that if laboratory reports confirm his preliminary diagnosis, it will mark the first outbreak of epidemic proportions of the flu in California. The girls were conducting mock local and state governments on the campus of the University of California College of Agriculture here, where Dr. Cooper is a staff physician. Over 100 of the delegates checked in, suffering with fevers and stomach trouble. One dormitory was converted into a makeshift hospital and state medical agents were called in. The Sacramento Red Cross issued an emergency appeal for nurses and volunteers to assist in the outbreak. None Dangerously Ill The group was scheduled to break up today, but a spokesman said that girls still suffering from the sickness would not be allowed to return home by public transportation. Cooper said the outbreak began Thursday, picked up Friday and mushroomed over the week end. None of the girls is dangerously ill, Cooper said, but several were "very sick" for a day or two. He said the attacks normally last about 24 hours. The doctors said it was difficult to determine where the disease might have been carried from. There have been a few scattered reports of the flu in California, and the girls came from all parts of the state.

Storms Curb Heat In Eastern Area; West Swelters

Severe thunderstorms broke the year's second heat wave in much of the East, but temperatures continued to soar today in the Far West. New York City was soaked by one-half to three-quarters of an inch of rain Monday night. The storm also dumped more than one inch of rain at Flat Top, W. Va., three-quarters inch at London, Ky., and up to one-half inch at Cleveland, Ohio, and most of Western Pennsylvania. Homes Destroyed A windstorm ripped the community of Leeches, Corners, Pa., 90 miles north of Pittsburgh, Monday night, destroying two homes and uprooting scores of trees. No injuries were reported. In California, federal and state warnings as the state baked in an early summer heat wave. Readings climbed to 95 at San Francisco Monday, and the weather was made more uncomfortable by a record smog. Oakland recorded a high of 89 to tie an all-time June record. Temperatures in the Central Valley included Red Bluff and Sacramento to 106, Stockton 105 and Bakersfield 109.

High Water Battled

Volunteers in Minnesota battled to prevent the Crow river from spilling over dikes from Delano to Dayton, where the river empties into the Mississippi. The Crow hit a record 17 feet at Rockford, Minn., and Red Cross officials predicted much of the area along the river might be in for "serious" trouble. The Crow and the flooded Minnesota river already have inundated miles of cropland. At Mankato, along the Minnesota, farmers said the floods have washed out all their crops and it is now too late in the season to replant them.

Jackie Cooper Cited On Reckless Driving

Mojave, Calif.—Actor Jackie Cooper has been ordered to appear in court here July 1 on a charge of reckless driving, it was learned today. Sheriff's deputies said Cooper was arrested late Saturday after a 45-mile chase at speeds up to 140 miles an hour. They said the actor was returning to Hollywood with his 10-year-old son in a \$12,000 sports car from a fishing trip. The Highway Patrol said it first spotted Cooper's car traveling at high speeds near Inyokern. Two Highway Patrol cars reportedly were forced to give up the chase because of the high speed but officers radioed ahead to sheriff's deputies who stopped the actor here.

Holmes Speaks on Educational Demands

Williamsburg, Va.—Gov. Robert D. Holmes of Oregon said Monday there can be no question of whether America can afford to meet the educational demands of its people. Speaking at the annual Governors Conference, Holmes said "no matter how we may be tempted to cut down the existing education program in order to save money, to be practical or economical or prudent, I think our decision is clearly part of a larger problem—do we turn back or move forward in education." Holmes suggested three ways to make best use of school facilities. They included a staggered attendance schedule; classes the year around, and use of summer months for special classes for the exceptional, the retarded and the gifted children and for expansion of adult education.

Thieves Take Money

Portland—Police today said that between \$2500 and \$3000 was stolen from a safe at the R & R food market in north Portland. Police said burglars broke into the building by drilling holes and removing boards from the roof. The safe was moved to a cooler and opened there.
