

New Coastal Warning Display System To Go Into Effect Jan. 1

A new simplified system of coastal warning displays will become effective Jan. 1, 1958, the weather bureau has announced. Under the new system, only four separate flag signals during the day and lantern signals at night will be used instead of seven separate signals. The new signals are for small craft, gale, whole gale and hurricane warnings.

Under the present system, warnings are small craft, northeast storm, southeast storm, southwest storm and hurricane or whole gale.

Not A Replacement
The weather bureau pointed out that visual storm warning signals displayed along the coast are supplementary to, and not a replacement for, the written advisories and warnings given promptly and wide distribution by press, radio and television.

The new system of coastal warning display signals was adopted after several months of preparatory work and consultations with marine groups, yacht clubs, shipping agencies and other coastal interests.

Briefly, the new display signals are:

Small craft warning: one red pennant by day and one red light above a white light at night to indicate winds up to 38 miles per hour.

Gale warning: two red pennants by day and white light above a red light at night to indicate winds ranging from 39 to 54 miles per hour.

Whole gale warning: a single square red flag with black center by day or two red lights at night to indicate winds ranging between 55 and 73 miles per hour.

Hurricane warning: two square red flags with black centers by day or a white light between two red lights at night to indicate winds more than 74 miles per hour.

Additional information concerning the new system may be obtained from the Medford weather bureau station at the municipal airport.

Federal School Aid Backers Irked By Ike's Position

Washington—P—Advocates of federal school aid were disappointed today by President Eisenhower's lukewarm approval of a compromise measure to meet the critical classroom shortage.

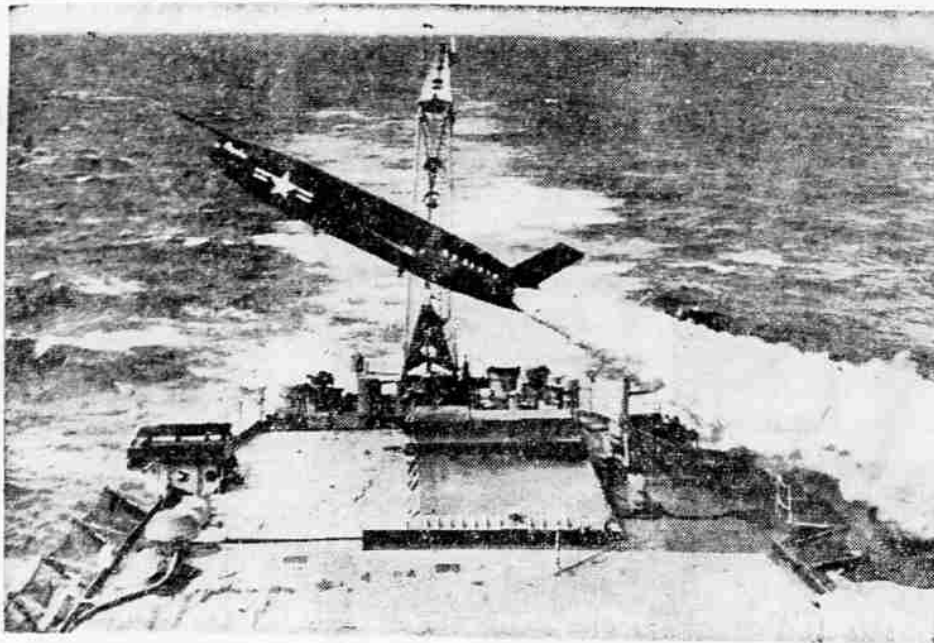
They said the President's position, expressed in a letter to Rep. Peter Frelinghuysen Jr. (R-N.J.), by no means guarantees passage of the bill. They had hoped the President would unite liberal Democrats and Eisenhower Republicans behind the compromise.

Eisenhower said it is urgent for Congress to act this year to meet the shortage of classrooms across the nation. But he gave only partial approval to the compromise school aid bill calling for federal outlays of \$1,500,000,000 during the next five years.

He said the measure follows principles "which I consider basic to sound federal legislation on this subject." But he declined to "pass judgment on all details of this bill while it is still before Congress."

The compromise would authorize federal expenditure of \$300 million annually for five years. Half would be allocated to states on the basis of need and half on the basis of school population.

The President originally sought \$325 million in each of the next four years with the money to be distributed solely on the basis of need. Democrats wanted a six-year program of \$600 million annually with states matching the money dollar for dollar.

Woman To Stand by Husband in Slaying of Former Wife and Son

Terre Haute, Ind.—P—Mrs. Dorothy Whitaker, whose husband shot and killed his ex-wife and son, said today she would stand by her wife-swapping husband because he was "fighting for what he thought was right."

Thomas Whitaker, 39, a truck driver, went on a berserk shooting rampage Tuesday after brooding for two days over the "grief" he suffered in the wife trade.

He fought a gun duel with his ex-wife's husband, Stuart Martin, 40, in the early morning darkness, crippling him with a shotgun blast in the leg.

Uses Shotgun
Then he battered his way into Martin's luxurious suburban home to wipe out the woman and child he once loved. He killed his former wife, Mrs. Alma Martin, 36, and her son, Jack Whitaker, 11, with the double-barreled shotgun.

He then shot and seriously wounded his daughter, Regina, 9, as she pleaded for her life. Whitaker, held in Vigo county jail under \$50,000 bond on a first degree murder warrant, showed no remorse over his killing spree.

Headless Body Said Remains of Frogman

Chichester, England—P—A coroner ruled today that a headless body found floating in the harbor here was that of Cmdr. Lionel (Buster) Crabb, the frogman who vanished last year while apparently checking a Soviet cruiser.

Crabb, a tough 46-year-old war hero, was last seen alive in Portsmouth in April, 1956, during the visit of the Russian warships that brought Soviet leaders Nikita Khrushchev and Nikolai Bulganin on a state visit to Britain.

The body was found floating in Chichester Harbor June 9, almost 14 months later.

Harold Johnson Heads Ratings of Ring Magazine

New York—P—Harold Johnson of Philadelphia was named top contender for the light heavyweight crown today in the Ring Magazine's latest ratings.

The new designation, climaxing a remarkable rebound may help his campaign for a shot at Archie Moore's 175-pound title.

Twenty-eight-year-old Johnson, who can fight as a heavy weight or light heavy, was previously listed as the fourth-ranking heavyweight aspirant. But his impressive first-round knockout of lightweight contender Clarence Hinnant on May 31 and his announced campaign for Moore's title, helped shift him to the 175-pound rankings at the top.

He was aided also by Canadian Yvon Durelle's upset draw with Tony Anthony of New York. Anthony dropped from the top to No. 2, and previously unranked Durelle was brought in at number eight.

Book-Binding Art Practiced

St. Bonaventure, N. Y.—P—The art of hand-binding books and magazines may be considered obsolete in this country, but you couldn't prove it by the vast St. Bonaventure University library.

For the Rev. Joseph Ruther, OFM, head of the university's mathematics department, has proved that the old way has rhyme and reason in this age of machine stitching.

The Franciscan friar took up binding as a hobby in 1945 when the school found it was losing the use of books for long periods of time when they were sent out for repairs.

Since then, Father Ruther has become an expert in the art of hand-binding. His hobby has grown into a "full-time, part-time job."

Father Ruther, aided by two student assistants, re-binds an average of 1,200 books and periodicals a year. Working in a basement room of Friedsam Library on campus, Father Ruther has rebuilt more than 9,000 volumes since he first took up his "hobby."

"The work hasn't changed much since bookbinding as we know it was invented by the English in 1832," Father Ruther said.

"One difference now is that strings are on the inside instead of the outside as in the old days. After a while, the job becomes a set of processes. Each book and magazine has its own problems—thickness, type of paper, etc.—but the processes remain the same."

Father Ruther said bookbinding had two requisites—a good pair of hands and infinite patience.

"Make one error in the 35 steps and that error plagues the entire operation," he concluded.

Man Reports Own Suicide To Police
