Eugene Ems Take Over 1st in NW

Eugene broke Yakima's six-week stranglehold on Northwest league leadership by a bare six percentage points Tuesday night as they faced Wenatchee, 8-3.

Tri-City smoothed Eugene's path by dropping the Bears, 6-2, while Salem sunk Lewiston deeper in the cellar, 9-3.

Knocking at the league front door since the first of the month the Emeralds had to make up a two-run deficit in the bottom of the fourth inning before the evening looked promising. This came on a run by Mel Krause off a Pete Mikacich triple. Mikacich then scooted home on a single by Don Frailey.

Eugene widened the gap in the sixth as Frailey drove in three more with a bases-loaded triple and later scored on Dan Holden's sacrifice fly.

Wenatchee reliever Ernie Sadler, a newcomer from Clovis, N. M., ran into more after he came on in the sixth. He gave up walks with the bases loaded in the seventh to score Bob Gauthier and Frailey.

Tri-City helped topple the Yakima Bears out of first place behind the solid pitching of Jim Mertlik. He struck out 12 to chalk up his fourth straight win against three defeats.

Bob Hoehn provided punch with a two-run homer in the fourth. Then the Braves picked up three doubles and a pair of walks to hang up their final three runs in the following inning.

At Lewiston, Salem's Chuck Lybeck scattered nine hits and was backed up by Jack Dunn's and Manager Hillis Layne's roundtrippers.

The Senators were off to a quick 7-0 lead after three innings and coasted home. It was their 30th win of the year and boosted the Senators' won-lost percentage to an even .500.

NCAA Golf Toga Taken By Houston

Colorado Springs, Colo.—Emphasis switched today from team to individual competition in the annual NCAA golf tournament now that Houston university has packed away its second straight championship.

Warren Simmons of Syracuse, 19-year-old sophomore, and Wisconsin's Roger Rubendall, 22, moved into the favored roles to succeed Ohio State's Fred Jones as individual champion on the basis of their identical 142 scores for medal honors in the 36-hole qualifying rounds.

Rubendall fired a 4-under-par 68 to set a course record Tuesday after Simmons had established it at 69 the day before.

The co-hoed of Tuesday's round was Jim Hickey, whose par shooting on the last eight holes gave Houston university the team championship by one stroke over Stanford.

His teammate, Frank Wharton, informed Hickey at the 15th hole that he had to shoot par golf to win the title for his team. Hickey obliged and wound up with a 73 for a two-day total of 150.

Simmons and Rubendall were the class of the qualifying rounds. The next low score was 146, posted by Florida State's Frank Shave Jr.

One of today's top matches pitted Simmons against Ernie George of San Jose State, a West Coast favorite, who qualified at 154. Rubendall was scheduled to meet one of George's teammates, Jim Clark, who qualified at 153.

Shave was matched with Tom Brown of Southern Methodist. Eddie Duino Jr., also of San Jose State, Duino qualified with 153.

Prospective Major Loop Shift Aired

Washington — The president of the New York City council charged today the National league acted "arrogantly and callously" when it authorized the Brooklyn Dodgers and New York Giants to move to the West Coast.

Council President Abe Stark also said the proposed shifts amounted to a "shocking spectacle of organized, officially sanctioned piracy" by the mayors of Los Angeles and San Francisco.

Stark told a house judiciary subcommittee which is holding hearings on professional sports antitrust legislation that the National league took a "public be damned" attitude.

He compared the league owners to "the robber barons who plundered private industry until the government stepped in to regulate the jungle."

Stark charged that there is an "unholy alliance" between the baseball barons and the pay television forces involved in the proposed shifts, which he said the subcommittee should investigate.

He noted reports that the Dodgers were negotiating with a pay as you see TV firm, in connection with their proposed move to Los Angeles.

Washington — Rep. Patrick J. Hillings predicts that the Brooklyn Dodgers and New York Giants will play baseball on the West Coast next year.

The California Republican expressed his belief in an interview with the United Press Tuesday night. He based his prediction on talks with officials of the two clubs.

The prospective Giant-Dodger shift was due for a thorough airing today before the House judiciary subcommittee studying sports anti-trust legislation.

Hillings, Dodger President Walter O'Malley and Giant President Horace Stoneham all were called to testify on the move.

Other witnesses included New York City Council President Abe Stark and Leslie M. O'Connor, president of the Pacific Coast league.

Rep. Emanuel Celler D-N.Y., subcommittee chairman, said he would try to learn from the witnesses whether the Dodgers and Giants actually will move to Los Angeles and San Francisco as authorized by the National League May 28. Neither club has said whether it will exercise its option to shift to the "West Coast."

Al Williams Fired 151 in Links Open

Seattle — Seattle amateur Don Taylor carded his second straight three-under-par 70 Tuesday to hold a one stroke lead at the halfway mark of the 72-hole Washington State Open golf tournament.

Tom Marlowe of Portland, who tied George Holland, Seattle, as first round leader with 69, slumped to a 72 for a 141 and second place.

Holland came in with a second round 73 and was tied for third place at 142 with Chuck Congdon, Tacoma.

The final 36 holes will be played today but with only the sixty low scorers for the first half competing.

Al Williams of Medford, Ore., slipped into the finals with a 73-78-151.

At least one auxiliary contract is understood to have been signed. It is an agreement between O'Malley and a pay-as-you-see TV firm which has made guarantees to presidents of both the Dodgers and Giants.

Wires for the pay-as-you-see television already are being strung in Los Angeles, Hillings said.

NY Yankees Had Biggest Payroll
Washington — It pays to be a Yankee but no one has to pull in his belt with the Dodgers, either.

The Yankees had the largest payroll in professional baseball last year, having paid their players a total of \$492,000, according to financial figures submitted to a house judiciary committee.

The Brooklyn Dodgers, however, paid the highest average salary—\$18,880—to the 25 players on its roster. The Dodgers' entire payroll was \$472,000. Yankees Average \$17,570.

The Yankees, 28 players were paid in average salary of \$17,570, with Yogi Berra drawing the highest pay, \$58,000.

Top National league salary was \$75,000 and it apparently went to Stan Musial of the St. Louis Cardinals. The individual players were not identified in the financial figures.

Slugging outfielder Ted Williams of the Red Sox has generally been regarded the top salaried man in the sport with a contract of \$100,000 per year. However, some of Williams' pay hinges on a bonus arrangement.

Like Rules Out Denver Vacation

Washington — President Eisenhower today ruled out a Denver vacation this year. He indicated he may relax in New England or some other northern clime.

He told his news conference that for a number of reasons he does not want to return to Denver where he spent previous vacations at Mrs. Eisenhower's girlhood home. He did not spell out any of them.

The President's doctors felt after his 1955 heart attack in Denver that it would be better for him to pass up high altitudes for at least a year. The time limit long since has passed.

White House Press Secretary James C. Magerty said later that Eisenhower's reasons for not vacationing at Denver this year are more personal than medical. Magerty said he does not know whether Maj. Gen. Howard McC. Snyder, the President's personal physician, has made any recommendations in the matter.
