Hurricane Heading Toward Gulf Coast

New Orleans — Louisiana was warned today that terrible tempered Audrey, first hurricane of the season, is expected to smack the state Thursday night with winds of 100 miles an hour.

The Weather Bureau said gales will begin lashing the Louisiana coastline tonight. The hurricane was located in the Bay of Campeche in the southwest Gulf of Mexico.

High Tides Expected
Tides rising to five and eight feet are expected on the Louisiana coast and over the Mississippi Sound by late Thursday.

Hurricane warnings were posted along the entire Louisiana coast, and northwest storm warnings were displayed as far south as Galveston. Southeast storm warnings were up east of Louisiana to Pensacola, Fla.

Hurricane Audrey continued to move slowly northward and was centered this morning about 400 miles southwest of New Orleans.

Highest winds were estimated then at 100 miles per hour near the center. Gales extended out 150 to 200 miles.

Plane Keeping Watch
A Navy hurricane hunter plane was keeping a watch on Audrey. The Navy at Jacksonville, Fla., said at least two flights a day will be made to check on the hurricane until it strikes land.

The Weather Bureau said Hurricane Audrey was following the same path as Flossy, which came out of the Gulf near the Mexican coast in September, 1956, and caused millions of dollars in

damages in Louisiana, Mississippi and Alabama before blowing itself out.

Navy hurricane hunters reported Audrey was "more intense" than Flossy.

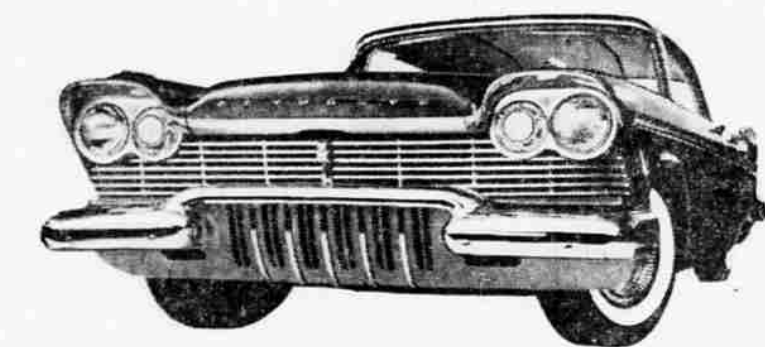
