While the other six clubs of the Rogue Valley Baseball League engage in loop contention this week end, the Medford Cheney Studs will be hosts to a longtime rival in action outside the circuit.

Medford and the Drain Black Sox tangle at the fairgrounds park at 8 p.m. Saturday and 2 p.m. Sunday.

Sunday's RVL scuffles have Butte Falls at Glendale, Camp White at Cave Junction and Grants Pass at Talent.

Drain and Medford renew opposition which was carried on through the years in the Southern Oregon and Southern Oregon leagues. The Black Sox are operating independently this season but like the Studs are fielding a squad similar in caliber to those fielded in the Southern Oregon loop.

Ray Stratton is the Sox skipper, replacing Roy Heiser who pitched the Douglas county combine through its league years.

Pitchers Listed
Principal hurlers for the Drain crew and both likely to see service here are Stan Dmochowsky and Jerry Philgus. Dmochowsky was a member of the University of Oregon Northern Division title club this spring and Jerry Philgus was a U of O Fresh chucker up from Cascade High school. Stratton also pitches. Dmochowsky was with Bend in the Southern Oregon league last year.

Catcher may be Norval Ritchey, U of O Fresh coach and ex-Oregon player. In the infield first baseman may be Ron Rowan, who was with Bend in the SOL last year, second baseman likely will be Wimp Hastings, all-Northern division for U of O this spring, third baseman probably will be Stratton and shortstop may be Dan Luby from the Oregon State college varsity and with Bend last summer.

Outfield possibilities are Moose Blevins, an ex-Stud; Pat Wohler, ex-University of Oregon, and Jerry Grigg, from California. Utility players are Marion Moore, infielder, and Bill Levins and Frank Jacobs, outfielders.

Studs Line-Up
Manager Frank Roelandt will choose his pitchers from among Jerry Bartow, Duane Sides, Jerry Droscher and Don Vannice. Roelandt will be behind the plate.

Other probable starters are Jack Cooney, first base; Larry Perkins, second base; Ron Owens, shortstop; Frank Reitor, third base, and Ed Reinking, John Kovenz and Droscher, outfielders.

As of last week end the Sox had a record of three wins and no losses. Their last victory was

a 6 to 5 nod over Archer Blower, which at that time was leading the Portland City league. Medford has seven victories one loss with an undefeated status in six Rogue Valley league games. Cave Junction can't be bumped from its second place position Sunday but will be out to improve on its record in that spot. Talent and Camp White will try to at least maintain third position while Grants Pass, Butte Falls and Glendale will have a chance of getting out of the cellar as their purpose.

Finsterwald, 27-year-old native of Athens, Ohio, now playing out of Tequesta, Fla., fired a six-under-par 65 in Thursday's opening round for a one-stroke edge over Billy Maxwell of Odessa, Tex.

Not Too Tough
The 6,892-yard Plum Hollow layout wasn't too tough on a rainy opening day. Thirty-five of the 170 golfers in the Western Open field broke par of 35-36-71.

The quartet of Bill Casper Jr., Bonita, Calif.; Max Evans, Rochester, Mich.; Ken Venturi, San Francisco; and Babe Lichardus, Hillsdale, N. J., was only two strokes behind Finsterwald at 67. The man who puts out the fire is keeping the San Francisco Seals on top of the Pacific Coast league, and at least partly because Manager Joe Gordon has so many arsonists on his starting staff.

Lefty Leo Kiely performed his dousing specialty again Thursday night and the Seals edged Los Angeles 8-6 to retain their two game loop lead.

The win was Kiely's tenth straight in relief and gave him an 11-2 record for the season. The Seals gained no ground, however, as all first division clubs won. Vancouver beat Portland 6-1; Hollywood took Seattle 7-1, and San Diego got by Sacramento 6-4.

Kiely Also Hits
Kiely did more than just rubber-arm his way to victory for the Seals. He hit a double in the ninth inning that drove in the two winning runs and broke a 6-6 tie that had existed since the eighth when he came on and tossed a three-run gopher ball to Jim Baxes.

Earlier Steve Bilko had slammed his 20th out of the park and Bilko followed it shortly for throwing his bat after fanning. Vancouver got five-hit pitcher from Charlie Beamon and a two run homer from Owen Friend to drug Portland easily. The Mounties chased loser John Carmichael with two runs in the first inning and kept up the attack until they accumulated 11 hits.
