

## Yosemite Park Area Scanned For Missing Four-Year-Old Girl

Yosemite, Calif.—Searchers fanned out over the Bridal Veil Creek area of Yosemite National Park today in search of a four-year-old girl lost since Wednesday evening.

The girl was Shirley Ann Miller, of Rosedale in Los Angeles county. She wandered off from the Bridal Veil Creek campgrounds where she had been vacationing with her parents, Mr. and Mrs. Glenn E. Miller and her seven-year-old sister, Carol.

### Looking for Sister

The campgrounds is located near the Badger Pass ski resort along Glacier Point Road. Shirley disappeared about 7:30 p.m. apparently after deciding to go upstream to look for her sister. Her parents notified rangers when she failed to return with Carol.

Meanwhile, three-year-old Randy Scott Libby, Fresno, also missing since Wednesday, was found Thursday night about five miles east of Dinkey creek, a High Sierra stream 65 miles east of Fresno.

Randy was clad only in a bright orange and black bathing suit, but was unharmed except for cut feet and bruises.

Randy, the son of Fresno fire

man Harold E. Libby, was last seen Wednesday evening when he left the camp of Mr. and Mrs. William K. Patterson, with whose children he had been playing.

More than 250 men, including volunteers from the Fresno fire department, took part in the search for Randy. The boy was found by bloodhounds at 6:30 p.m. Thursday, atop Marble Point about 4 1/2 air miles from the point where he had strayed. Rangers estimated he had walked about eight miles.

He was still chewing his bubble gum.

### Tracker Unable To Find Trace of Missing Man

Molalla, Ore.—A professional tracker hired to hunt Mark Franklin, 79, Portland, reported today that a month of searching had turned up nothing new.

Franklin vanished in the woods southeast of here. His car was found abandoned.

Conducting the search is E. J. Sherman of Molalla.

## Negro Appointed On Graham Team

New York — Evangelist Billy Graham announced Thursday night that for the first time, a Negro has been appointed a member of his "crusade team."

The North Carolina Baptist minister introduced the Rev. Howard Jones of Cleveland, to a Madison Square Garden audience. The Rev. Mr. Jones will serve as an associate evangelist on Graham's 35-member "team."

Graham later told the United Press that "we consider ourselves most fortunate in having the Rev. Jones with us, as he did a magnificent job conducting revivals in Nigeria, Liberia and other African areas."

Although the 28-year-old Negro minister is only a temporary member of his team, Graham said, "It is possible he will be associated with us in future crusades, both north and south."

He explained that the Rev. Mr. Jones was on leave of absence as pastor of the Smoot Memorial Christian and Missionary Alliance Church in Cleveland.

Honolulu — At least 900 cases of influenza have been reported among servicemen and their dependents on Oahu Island during the past two weeks, military authorities said Thursday night.

A spokesman at Tripler Army Hospital said a few cases have been analyzed clinically and most of them proved to be the Asiatic type flu which struck hundreds of thousands in the Philippines, Hong Kong, Japan, India and other Oriental countries.

He said, however, that most of the present cases were mild and only about 135 required hospital treatment.

Health officers here said that the flu outbreak apparently is centered at military installations. Only 110 civilian cases have been reported, they said.

## Measles Epidemic Breaks All Records

Portland — Oregon's measles epidemic, which has been going on for four months and shows no signs of diminishing, has broken all previous records according to the State Board of Health.

Dr. Harold M. Erickson, state health officer, said the state had reported 12,047 cases through last Sunday. That is about nine times the incidence of last year and it by no means includes all cases, many of which are not reported.

In Portland, for example, only 193 cases have been reported officially but it is known the incidence has been heavy in the metropolitan area.

The previous record year for measles in Oregon was in 1940 when some ten thousand cases were reported.

## Panama Water Level Said Critically Low

Balboa, Canal Zone — The water level in the Panama Canal has fallen to a near-critical low as a result of this year's unprecedented spring drought in the Canal Zone, officials here said today.

The water in Gatun Lake, used as a reservoir for canal operation, has fallen to a level of barely 82 feet, 3 feet below normal and only 8 inches above the all-time record low.

Shipping operators have been warned that draft limits on ocean carriers, supertankers and other large vessels will have to be reduced until the lake level returns to 83 feet.

## Asian Flu Claims 300 Lives in India

New Delhi, India — Asian influenza already has killed at least 300 persons and afflicted 500,000 more in India, official sources said today. The figures do not include rural areas, for which statistics are unavailable.

Today's minister is often a skilled advisor. He may have taken courses in psychology and sociology, as well as theology.

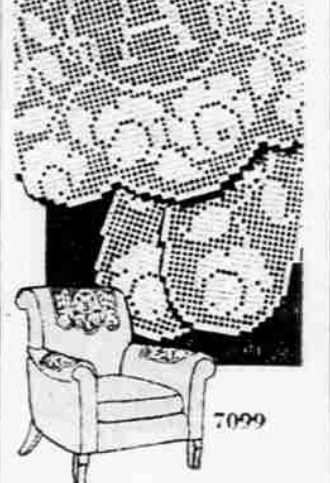

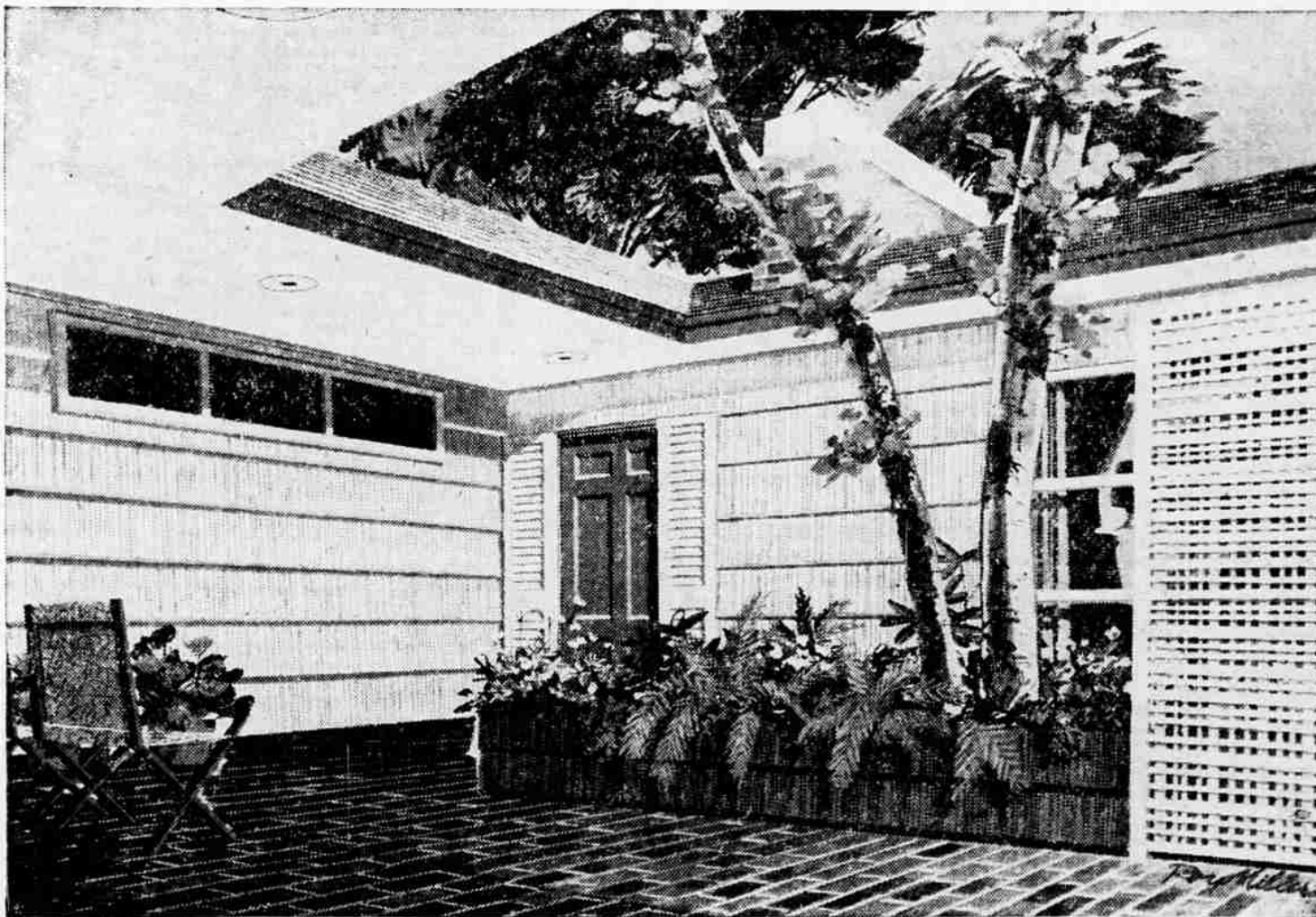

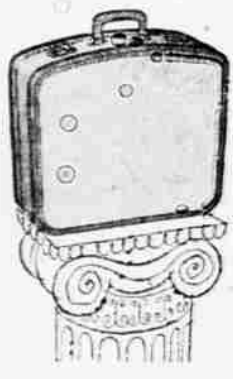
