State GOP Chairman, Warns of Tactics
Salem — Oregon Republican Chairman James F. Short Thursday night warned the GOP organization he would put it on a warlike basis to regain its state leadership. And he suggested that if his belligerent tactics were not popular he should be replaced.

Short told about 150 Republicans gathered at a dinner meeting here. "I expect to issue orders and make decisions and I expect them to be complied with."

He referred to the administration of Gov. Robert Holmes as a "serious, actually present threat to the future of our homes and our employment because as industry lags, taxes must mount."

"It is my strong conviction," he declared, "that continuation of the present incapable, self-interested and partisan-slanted administration will discredit the state before the nation, repel industry and frighten away needed capital."

Thomas Jefferson: In his younger days a fine horseman. He preferred walking in his later years. He played chess, backgammon, and a game known as "cross — pile," a coin-tossing game. He also swam—once a distance of 2 1/2 miles.

James Madison: He was a bird watcher and in pursuit of this subject charted quite carefully the northern migration of the cardinal.

Patrick Henry: Remarkably fond of shooting, fishing and playing on the violin.

Benjamin Franklin: A great swimmer. Roseburg Women Killed As Auto Leaves Highway

Roseburg — Mrs. Evelyn Joyce Kachel, 23, Roseburg, was killed south of here Friday, the second fatality reported on the recently opened stretch of Highway 99 freeway to the south.

County Coroner L. L. Powers said Mrs. Kachel was alone in her car about 2 a.m. when it crashed through a guardrail near Roberts mountain and plunged 59 feet into a canyon.

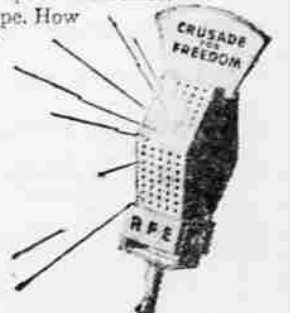

Congress Urged To Act on FBI Ruling

Washington — Attorney General Herbert Brownell Jr. urged Congress Friday to prevent a "serious miscarriage of justice" by limiting effect of the Supreme Court's decision opening certain FBI files in criminal cases.

He told a Senate Judiciary Subcommittee there is "immediate need" for legislation to clarify procedures the prosecution must follow in making the FBI information available to defendants.

He backed an administration bill which he said would "correct a grave emergency in law enforcement which has resulted from the decision."
