Boise — A band of hardy pioneers backtracking along the Old Oregon trail with a covered wagon caravan said here Saturday what the modern trail lacks in hostile Indians it makes up for with hostile motorists.

The four-wagon caravan carrying three women and four men left Ocean Park, Wash., during the last week in April and plans to be in Washington, D.C., by Thanksgiving.

The trip is being sponsored by the Heritage Road Enterprises of Ocean Park.

Jess Melvin, who sports the beard, apparel and demeanor of Buffalo Bill, is the caravan's advance man. He said the group has been making about 25 miles per day since leaving Washington.

House Approves Bill For Lower Payments

Washington — The House Friday approved by voice vote a compromise bill that would permit sharp reductions in down payments required for FHA-insured housing.

It also would authorize \$1,740,000,000 to spur home building and slum clearance.

The bill, which now goes to the Senate for final congressional action, would allow the government to cut \$600 to \$1,000 from minimum down payments now required on homes costing \$12,000 or more. On cheaper homes, down payments could be slashed more than 50 per cent.

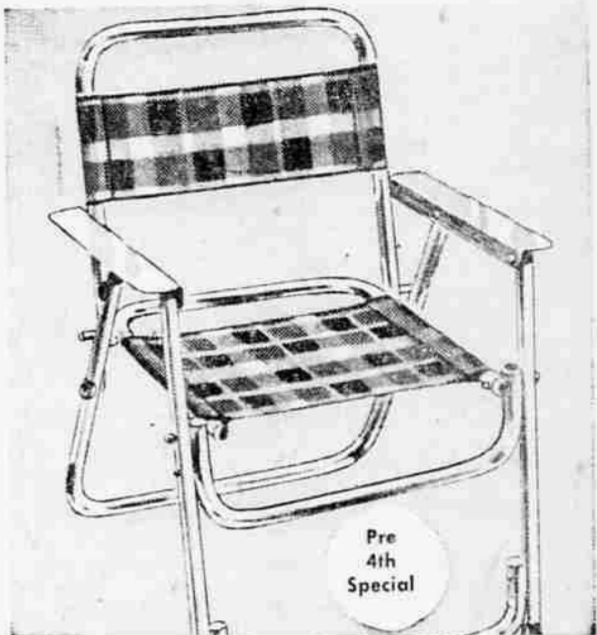
