

Russia Said To Be Up Against Serious Economic Troubles

London—The Soviet Communist Party boss Nikita Khrushchev's recent boast that Russia would overtake the United States economic lead in a few years looked like the worst guess of the year today.

The Chatham House Review, a Royal Institute for Foreign Affairs publication, in an assessment of the Soviet Union's current problems, said Russia presently is facing one of its most serious post-war internal crises. **Serious Domestic Crisis**

"The Soviet Union is at present involved in a domestic crisis more serious than any she has met since the end of the last war," the review said.

"The apparatus which served the country through 25 years that Stalin was at the helm of a highly centralized and tightly controlled economy seems to have reached the limits of its effectiveness."

Khrushchev's latest strategy of decentralizing economic planning is an attempt to remedy the ills caused by the Stalin-type tight controls. But whether it will work remains to be seen.

For some time, for instance, official analysts have suspected internal pressure behind Mos-

cow's sudden anxiety for some disarmament agreement with the West. The findings by the authoritative Chatham House Review now tend to support those suspicions that the Kremlin wants a respite to tend its internal ills.

Some Ills Emerge Openly
Russian affairs experts have discerned growing economic troubles in the Soviet Union in recent months, despite Moscow's attempts to cover up. Some of these difficulties began to emerge openly, and many more became apparent as a result of Khrushchev's decentralization drive.

But the experts have concluded that Khrushchev is tending to attack the symptoms rather than the causes of the contradictions inherent in the Soviet system. They predict that Russia's economy will continue to face considerable trouble in the immediate and near future.

Organizational handicaps, shortage of raw materials and manpower, and commitments to underdeveloped countries, and the satellites are among the unforeseen factors responsible for current setbacks to the Soviet's plans.

Wheat Price Supports To Average \$2 Bushel

Washington—The Agriculture Department has confirmed that it will support 1957 crop wheat prices at a national average price of \$2 a bushel.

The \$2 rate originally was announced July 2, 1956, but the department is required by law to redetermine the support level on the basis of the parity price of wheat at the beginning of the marketing year (July 1).

Woman, 46, Found After Six Days in Hot Texas Country
Alpine, Tex.—Mrs. Clifford White described today how she filed her nails with stones and kept a calendar by adding pebbles to a row while she was lost for six days in the parched wilds of Big Bend National park.

Mrs. White, of Houston, was spotted from the air Monday by a search plane pilot and rescued by a ground party. Her first question was about her husband, from whom she had become separated in the scorching, rugged country.

Found Along Trail
She was told that her husband had been found along a trail apparently dead from heat prostration. He had been trying to reach help after their air conditioned car became stuck in sand.

Mrs. White said she recited the 23rd Psalm while waiting to be rescued because "it sounds cool."

She was spotted near a cave-like mountain ledge where she had found a trickle of water.

Completely rational when found, Mrs. White, 46, was dismissed from the Alpine hospital late Monday after an examination. Her face was covered with blisters and she had sores around her mouth from the thorns of prickly pears on which she said she subsisted along with "some other things I don't care to remember."

Cubans Plan to Appeal Deportation Order
Miami—Six Cubans who claimed they fled to the United States in a boat to escape death at the hands of Cuban police plan to appeal a decision ordering them deported.

U.S. Immigration Service Officer Herbert Ferguson Monday denied the plea of the Cubans for asylum in this country, but the Cubans indicated they would appeal the ruling to the U.S. Immigration Service Board of Inquiry in Washington.

Ferguson ordered them deported on a charge that they are immigrants without visas. The six men were held in detention pending outcome of their appeal.
