U. S. Soldier Wanted For Philippines Trial

Manila — Police today arrested four demonstrators who picketed the U.S. Embassy with signs demanding the return of a former sailor to face trial in a Philippine court on charges arising from an automobile accident.

The ex-sailor is George E. Roe of Clio, Mich., who has been discharged from the Navy. He was accused of hitting Roman Ortiz, a pedestrian, on Jan. 1, 1956, while stationed in the Philippines.

The Philippine government asked formally on June 28 that Roe be returned to Manila for trial. A note handed to Ambassador Charles E. Bohlen formally protested the fact Roe was returned to a discharge despite the fact he was under indictment before the Cavite court.

Strike Curtails Construction in N.Y.

New York — A strike by 6,000 steamfitters and sheet metal workers put a 5 per cent dent today in construction work in New York city and on Long Island.

A spokesman for the Building Trades Employers Assn. said the effect of the strike would become progressively worse as the strike continued.

The strikers are members of Local 683 of the Enterprise Association of Steam Fitters and Local 28 of the Sheet Metal Workers Union.

A strike was called Monday when the union's contracts with the builders expired without agreement on a new contract terms. The men had earned between \$3.50 and \$4 an hour. They asked an increase of 40 cents an hour and fringe benefits of 48 cents an hour.

Douglas Man Appointed To Conservation Board

Salem — V. T. Jackson, Douglas county judge, Monday was appointed by Gov. Robert F. Holmes to the Board of Forest Conservation.

Jackson succeeds Carl S. Hill, also of Douglas county, Jackson served in the Legislature in 1951, 1953 and 1955 and was elected county judge last year.

Man Drives Home After Losing Foot

Jamestown, N.D. — A farmer lost a foot in an hour-long struggle with a hay baler, then mounted his tractor and drove home to summon aid.

Doctors said friction from the rollers of the machine cauterized blood vessels in his leg and probably saved his life.

William Wilson, 37, was in good condition today at Jamestown hospital, and physicians said he might leave in two weeks.

Wilson said he attempted to speed the baling process Sunday and began to push hay into the machine with his foot. It was caught—and the powerful rollers began to tug his body into the machine.

After an hour, the rollers crushed the bone about 10 inches below the knee and Wilson was freed.

He tied a belt-tourniquet around his thigh, mounted the tractor and remained conscious until he was taken into surgery at the hospital.
