New York — Industrial stocks advanced to within touching distance of their 1957 highs today on the most active trading since June 11.

The unexpected surge of buying lifted prices by \$1 to \$3 in the main list with some issues up \$5 to \$8 a share. Avco, the active leader Tuesday, was again in top volume position today and at a new high inspired by its receipt of an Air Force order.

Metals came to the fore and the aluminum group made a substantial advance. Selected oils had wide gains with oil companies following in their wake.
