Is That So?

Tips to the outdoor cook which will make you say: "Now why didn't I think of that myself!" Just the way I did, when I ran across them.

When you've been boiling something in a pot with a lid, lift the far side, first to divert the escaping steam from your face.

To avoid scorching your face, remove the pot or griddle from the hot fire before stirring or turning over the contents.

Why round biscuits? They mean rolling the dough to use



the leftover bits. Instead, simply roll out the dough and cut in squares.

To keep your razor blades from falling into infants' hands, drop them into a piggy bank.

Larger birds are usually better buys because there is less bone in them in proportion to the meat than in smaller birds.

Like your chicken crisp and golden brown? Add a little baking powder to the flour in which chicken is coated. That's for crispness. For color, use a generous amount of paprika with the salt, pepper and flour.

About those milk cartons. They are wonderful for starting charcoal or getting the fire in the hearth going.

To prevent eggs from cracking when placed in boiling water, wet them first in cold water. Or add a teaspoonful of salt to the boiling water—then the whites will not run even if the shells crack.

Fried egg on toast can be simplified outdoors. Simply cut a large hole in the slice of bread with the top of a small baking powder can. Then fry the bread in butter and then drop a whole egg into the buttered space and fry it.

Will Spin Like Top
How can you tell if the egg has been hard-boiled—simply take the egg between the tips of your finger and spin it as you would a top. An uncooked egg will turn once or twice. When boiled, it will spin as rapidly and nicely as any top.

Want to separate whites and yolks quickly? Then break them into a small funnel over a bowl. The whites will slip through into the bowl and the yolk will remain intact in the funnel.

To keep fish from sticking to the bottom of the frying pan, sprinkle a little salt over the bottom of the pan before you put in the fish.

And for scaling fish, first put the fish in scalding water and then dip it into cold water. Use a grapefruit knife with serrated edges.

Don't give me away on this one. But to save the work of browning flour to make country brown gravy, simply add one teaspoon of instant coffee to each cup of gravy.

Speaking gravies, to get it nice and smooth with little effort put your flour and water in a small jar (say half-pint size) and shake it until the mixture is smooth. No lumps and no straining.

To start a new bottle of ketchup, insert a soda straw. The air that gets into the bottom of the bottle will help the ketchup flow easily at once.

When you have pancakes left over, roll them up and cut them in very thin strips. Combine them with scrambled eggs for a good lunch dish. Syrup goes good with this.

Bill by Congress Designed To Make Home Buying Easier

Washington—(CQ)—Congress has hammered out a bill designed to make it easier to buy a house by lowering minimum down payments and contributing federal money to the tight mortgage money market.

Here are the ways the new legislation may help you:

Down Payments — You can buy a house with less cash if your bank is willing to accept the new minimum down payment required by the Federal Housing Administration. The FHA takes the risk out of lending by promising the bank to pay up your mortgage if you don't. In exchange for this insurance, the FHA makes certain demands upon the bank giving out the loan, including how much the minimum down payment must be.

The old minimum down payment for an FHA-insured loan was 5 per cent of the first \$9,000 of the house's appraised value and 25 per cent of the rest. The new minimum down payment is 3 per cent on the first \$10,000, 15 per cent on the next \$6,000 and 30 per cent on the rest. So the new minimum down payment on an \$18,000 house would be \$1,800 instead of \$2,700. The highest mortgage FHA will insure is \$20,000.

In some areas, builders put up FHA-approved houses selling for less than \$10,000. The minimum down payment on these homes, usually in outlying areas, is now 3 per cent instead of 5 per cent of the appraised value. The maximum mortgage the FHA will insure on these homes was raised from \$6,650 to \$8,000.

Mortgage Money — The bill may increase your chance of getting a home mortgage in today's tight money market. For one thing, your banker may have an easier time selling his FHA and GI mortgages to the government for cash. As a result, he will have more money to lend. The legislation enables the government's mortgage trader, the Federal National Mortgage Association, to buy up an additional \$650 million worth of FHA and GI mortgages from banks.

Another mortgage aid was the extension of the Voluntary Home Mortgage Credit program for two years. The VHMC is a string of private banks and other lenders that consider FHA and GI mortgage applications rejected twice elsewhere. This mortgage pool also tries to help minority groups who cannot get the same mortgage terms as others. The program works through a national committee in Washington and 15 regional committees.

Many Totally Unselfish
Not infrequently, women appear with totally unselfish wishes; they want something for someone else. One woman who returned from missionary work in Korea wished for money to be sent to a Korean orphanage. Another for a bicycle for her paper boy.

But the washing machine is number one and anyone trying to raise three or four youngsters can understand why. Because many women still don't have any kind of washing machine and many others need later models, we give every "queen" a new automatic in the array of household gifts that all our winners receive.

Mink, diamonds, a chateau on the Riviera, a powder blue convertible, all of them may be a girl's best friend, but to the average American housewife, the washing machine is the real symbol of her emancipation from drudgery and hard work.

Around Hollywood

Hollywood — (AP) — At the famous Cocoanut Grove they're standing in line to hear Lena Horne, for this may be the last time for years that one of the greatest of all-time popular singers will work in a nightclub.

The sultry singer, one of the highest paid club acts since 1941, is retiring for the time being from the nightclub to make her Broadway debut, in a Harold Arlen musical about the West Indies, "Jamaica."

Lena also hopes to snare a regular TV show, if NBC's "experiment" with another colored singer, Nat Cole, in a 15-minute program is a long-run success.

"The reason I'm giving up clubs as a full-time career is that I'm almost 40, and I don't want to be an older woman singer," she explained over lunch in her suite at the Ambassador Hotel.

Not Gracful
"I don't think there's anything too attractive about an older woman singing about sex and romance. I'll feel more graceful when I'm older if I'm working in the theater instead of singing about how crazy some man makes me feel."

"Jamaica" doesn't have a complete cast yet, but a million dollars worth of tickets have been sold already. Originally the musical was written for Harry Belafonte, she said, "but he had too many commitments so they rewrote it for me."

"I'm nervous about opening on Broadway," she admitted. "After all, I've never acted before. When I was under contract

on MGM I just sang in pictures.

New Experience
"I've never done a Broadway show before because I never was offered a part I wanted—Many shows don't have as fine songs as I do in my nightclub act. But I'd do anything to sing Arlen songs."

Lena hopes her Broadway debut "will open up new opportunities for me" so after the run of the show she will move on to other fields.

"I'm a little tired of clubs and I feel good about leaving them," she said. "I was in a rut. I began to know all the headwaiters and their children!"

"I suppose I'll return to clubs now and then as long as I have teeth. But nothing is harder than singing" all the time in clubs. I've been in a position recently to choose where I sang here and in Las Vegas, San Francisco and New York. But for many years I put up with rude bosses and unpleasant surroundings.

"One thing I'll miss about nightclubs is the closeness to my audience—you don't get that on Broadway," she reflected. "But I won't miss having to concentrate hard because everybody in the audience is loaded and having a ball!"
