

Ordinance Establishes Fund For Sewage Treatment Plant

Ordinances establishing a sewage treatment plant operation fund, authorizing a revised airport charge schedule for United Air Lines, and creating several improvement districts were adopted by the Medford city council Friday night.

A portion of sewer service charges now credited to the Camp White Sewer disposal fund will be paid in the treatment plant operation fund. Creation of the latter fund was proposed in the 1957-58 budget.

City Manager Robert Duff said it is estimated that the present rate will yield about \$47,020.97 for the year ending June 30, 1957. The principal and interest payments for 1956-57 were \$27,500, he said, leaving an anticipated balance of \$124,252 in the sewage disposal fund.

Divert 45 Per Cent

The council authorized diverting 45 per cent of the service charges for sewage treatment. On last year's basis, Duff noted, it will yield about \$20,859, leaving \$26,161, which with anticipated growth, will meet bond and interest payments of \$20,650.

The treatment plant operation fund was created to help finance maintenance and operation of the plant. Previously maintenance funds were budgeted from the general fund. Creation of the operation fund provided an additional \$20,000 in the general fund budget and still left enough to cover bond and interest payments in the sewage disposal fund.

The new rate schedule for the United Air Lines lease will produce an estimated \$508.50 per month on the present basis of five scheduled Convair flights per day, Duff noted. The present monthly payment is \$292 and is based on a formula of \$45 for the first three scheduled flights, \$25 for all more than three plus \$1 per 1,000 pounds in excess of 22,500 pounds gross weight.

New Rate Schedule

The new rate schedule is based on 8 cents per 1,000 pounds of gross landing weight for the first 3 million pounds; 7 cents per 1,000 on the second 3 million; and 6 cents per 1,000 on all more than 6,000 pounds.

The council also adopted an ordinance amending the fire code. The amendment defines alternate methods of basement construction and use to reduce sprinkler requirements.

A \$38,000 contract with the Medford Rural Fire Protection district was approved. The contract is \$2,000 less than last year, because the district lost in excess of \$1 million of assessed valuation protected by the district through annexations to Medford. Duff said the district felt a reduction was justified.

Bids will be opened at 11 a.m. Monday, July 15, of paving Marie st. from Saling to Jackson sts. In other action concerning improvement districts, funds were approved for paving on Lyman ave., Rose ave., South Grape st., Newtown st. and South Front st.

Plans and specifications were authorized for paving an alley in the Willeke addition from Almond st. to Tripp st.

Plans and specifications will be reconsidered at the next regular council meeting for grading and graveling on Surnise ave. between Hillcrest and Capital aves. The council voted 4-3 in favor of authorizing plans, but since there was not a majority of the full council in favor, council procedure requires reconsideration at the next regular meeting.

Duff said grading and graveling Sunrise ave. was the only feasible way of improving the

Police Blame Truck Driver in Accident

Copemish, Mich. — Police tentatively put the blame on a truck driver Saturday for the deaths of five children and their parents in a car-truck accident.

Trooper James Riley of the Manistee post said he would question the driver, Warfield Laws, 53, who is in a Frankfort hospital with a skull fracture and broken ribs sustained in the accident.

Riley said Laws' truck collided Friday afternoon with a car driven by Bynum Collins, 55, Paragould, Ark., at the intersection of State Highway 115 and county road 604.

Killed in the accident were Collins, his wife, Florence, 45, and five of their six children, ranging in age from 5 to 14.

A son, Dennis, 3, suffered a brain concussion and a niece of the couple, Clara Collins, 13, was also in Frankfort hospital with a compound skull fracture, broken legs, and multiple lacerations.

The Collins family had come from Arkansas to Michigan to pick cherries and other produce. Trooper Riley said that it appeared to him that Laws, who lives in Lake City, Mich., came to the stop sign on the county road and "either saw it and ran it, was asleep, or stopped and started again without seeing the car."

Two Bombs Explode In Cuba Friday

Havana — Two bombs exploded in Oriente Province and two fires destroyed public buildings and warehouses in widely separated sections of Cuba Friday.

A powerful bomb exploded in the city of Manzanillo, causing considerable damage but no casualties. A second bomb, also without casualties, exploded at Victoria de Las Tunas.

Authorities suspecting sabotage said fire destroyed railway warehouses in the town of Remedios, Las Villas Province. Another fire destroyed a public school building at Consolacion, Pinar del Rio Province.

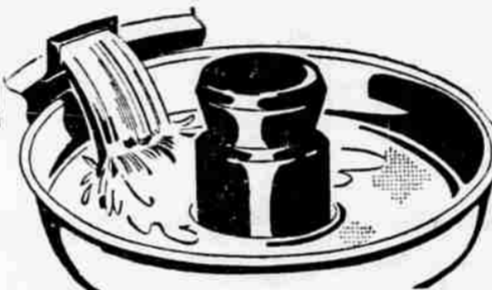
