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### Ohio State Revises Scholastic Standard

Columbus, Ohio — Ohio State University trustees have adopted a revised set of rules that will require a higher scholastic average for graduation and better work from students from the first quarter on, starting next fall.  
 The new rules require a student to have a point-hour ratio of at least 2.0 or a C average, compared to the current 1.8. A major change is the requirement that freshmen make at least .75 in their first or second quarter or face possible dismissal. Current rules permit a student to continue in school until the end of the third quarter when he must have a 1.5 average or face dismissal.  
 The trustees said the change will continue under the old rules.  
 The revision of the academic standards followed a study.
