50,000 Boy Scouts Reach Valley Forge

Valley Forge, Pa.—Historic Valley Forge park, where George Washington and his small ragged army huddled during the winter of 1777-1778, became a "Boys' City" today with the arrival of 50,000 Boy Scouts for their fourth National Jamboree.

Scouts from all over the country and several foreign nations began pouring in Tuesday by boat, train, plane, bus and automobile to the 1,500-acre site. The final contingent is expected to arrive tonight.

The jamboree officially will get underway Friday and run through Thursday, July 18.

Lowest Crop Level Since 1951 Expected

Washington—A combination of adverse weather, production controls and the soil bank may cut the 1957 total crop to its lowest level since 1951.

The Agriculture Department said in the first production report for the season that floods and excessive rain damaged prospects for corn, cotton, soybeans and other crops. The adverse weather also forced harvesting delays resulting in reduced yields of many early ripening fall grains.

But the report issued Wednesday said "some improvement in prospects is possible if favorable conditions predominate for growth, maturity, and harvest" the rest of the season.
