

MEDFORD LEGION NINE TOPS KLAMATH TWICE, CLINCHES SUBDISTRICT

Medford American Legion nine topped Klamath Falls nine twice, clinching the subdistrict championship of its district last night by bouncing Klamath Falls 12 to 3 and 8 to 0 in seven and five innings, respectively.

The twin triumphs brought the Medford record to six wins against no setbacks with two games with Lakeview yet to be contested. Klamath has two wins and four defeats and Lakeview was loser in the four games it has played.

Dennis Barr and Wayne Allen each hit three-hitters. Ron Perry sparked the Medford hitting with four safe swats in five times up and six runs batted in. He had a triple, two doubles and a single, parking one blow at the base of the left field fence.

Medford got the bulk of its runs in clusters. Four in the first inning of the opening game, three in the second, and two in the third. Another group of four was in the third panel on doubles by Barr and Allen, a single by Dick Monroe, a base on balls, a hit batter and an error.

The locals took command of the second encounter with five runs in inning No. 2. They were counted up on a triple by Dick Durante, a double by Peery, singles George Ice, Pond and Ray Konopasek and a base on balls. The other three were in the fourth frame on a three-baser by Monroe, singles by Konopasek, Allen and Ice, a hit batter, a walk, an error and a sacrifice flyout by Peery.

Barr threw the seven inning game, striking out 12 and walking three while rival tosser Dean Dunson had a nine-hitter, walked eight and whiffed five. Allen struck out six over five innings and walked four. Dennis Runge gave up 10 safeties in the four innings he pitched to Medford batters. He fanned two and walked three.

Bill Worlein went hitless against Medford in the first game but lashed out two triples for Klamath in two times up in the second brush. Konopasek hit two for four for Medford, Monroe two for five including a triple, Allen two for five, one a double, Ice two for six and Pond two for seven.

Brooklyn, N. Y. — Don Hoak of the Redlegs vowed vengeance today he'll whip Charley Neal of the Dodgers "so bad his own wife won't recognize him" for the punch he threw at him in baseball's latest fist-swinging free-for-all.

"I'm gonna get him and you can tell him that," steamed Hoak, who caught a haymaker by Neal in the fracas touched off Thursday night at Ebbets Field when pitcher Raul Sanchez of the Redlegs threw a beanball at Junior Gilliam of the Dodgers.

Sanchez' beanball came with two out in the last of the seventh inning and Cincinnati leading, 4-3. On the next pitch, Gilliam bunted along the first base line with the obvious intent of drawing Sanchez over and running him down. Gilliam's bunt bounded a few feet foul half way up the line, but as Sanchez came over to field the ball, Gilliam crashed into him and the two went to the dirt, fists swinging.

Flowed on Field. Within seconds, players from both bugouts flowed on the field and became embroiled in a fist-swinging melee that ranks with the June 15 Yankee-White Sox fight as one of the wildest in many major league seasons.

Neal came charging at Hoak and landed a clean punch to the head that knocked the Cincinnati infielder sprawling. Hoak, enraged, regained his feet and went after Neal. Four or five Redlegs held him off. The umpires and the rival managers had just about restored order when Hoak broke loose, charged Neal and had to be restrained once again.

When play was resumed, Hoak, Sanchez, Gilliam and Neal all were ejected from the game. The Dodgers, who wound up with first baseman Gil Hodges playing second, won the game, 5-4, on Duke Snider's seventh-inning homer.

Finnish Runners Better Record In Metric Mile

Turku, Finland — Don Bowden and Tom Courtney, members of a touring American track and field team, were to attempt to lower the world record for the half mile today on Turku's lightning-fast oil track.

Both Yanks were so impressed in watching three Finnish runners smash the world record for the 1,500-meter metric mile event Thursday that they asked officials to schedule a special 880-yard event for them on today's program.

The request was granted by the officials, who said Bowden and Courtney also would be clocked at 800 meters in the same race.

Both Bowden and Courtney skipped Thursday's 1,500-meter event in which the three Finnish runners—Olavi Salsola, Olavi Salonen and Olavi Vuorisalo—beat the world record of 3:40.6 set by Istvan Rozszoivgyi of Hungary at Budapest in 1955.

Permission has been granted by U.S. authorities to admit to this country the wife of Miklos Feodorov, a refugee now living here, according to Dr. Mark A. Talney, executive director of the Oregon Council of Churches.

Mrs. Feodorov had been in a refugee camp in France and her application to come to this country had been held up by red tape. The camp in France has evicted the refugees.

Feodorov said that he has been sending money every week to his wife, who is now in Paris.
