

Edict by Giles Puzzles Redlegs, Dodger Skippers

Brooklyn, N. Y.—Puzzled by National League President Warren Giles' edict making them responsible for any future fights involving their players, managers Birdie Tebbetts of Cincinnati and Walt Alton of Brooklyn declared today they may be helpless to comply with his order.

Giles sent special bulletins to Tebbetts, Alton and the six other National League managers warning them they would be held responsible for any repetition of Thursday night's brawl between Brooklyn and Cincinnati players.

"It's no good to make us responsible," Tebbetts said, "unless they put in a rule that any players not involved in the fight, who come out on the field, be thrown out of the game."

Alton said he didn't see how any manager could control his players once a free-for-all breaks out.

Peace and Harmony
"What am I supposed to do if someone pokes one of my players?" he asked. "Am I supposed to tell my player not to retaliate because I'm to be held responsible?"

All was peace and harmony between the Dodgers and Redlegs Friday night in their game at Jersey City, N. J.

The only casualty from Thursday's fight was Redleg third baseman Don Hoak, who was missing from the lineup because of two swollen fingers on his right hand.

Ron Maurer Batting Leader In Rogue Valley Circuit

Three baseball games are slated in the Rogue Valley league today with Cave Junction at Glendale, Medford at Grants Pass and Ashland-Talent against Camp White at Ashland.

Ron Maurer, Cave Junction manager and catcher, is the batting leader among Rogue Valley league baseball players who have had 15 or more times at bat.

He has had 12 hits in 23 turns at bat for a .522 average and leads also in runs batted in with 15.

The statistics include all games for the first half of the league season with the exception of the Camp White-Talent game last Wednesday. Figures on that tussle were turned in incomplete. The record sheet has been sent back for filling in of the missing details.

Maurer's tabulation is for six games. Jim McAbee, Ashland-Talent catcher, followed the Cave Junction man with a .500 mark for four games on eight hits in 16 trips to the plate. Dick Woolton, Camp White, has compiled a .476 record on 10 hits in 21 times up in four games reported.

Jack Cooney is fourth in the overall status and heads the loop-pacing Medford Cheney Studs with .474. Bob Stolz, Glendale, is fifth with .471.

Portland — Seattle's Art Kono, top seeded in the Oregon men's junior tennis championships being played here, lost Friday to 15-year-old Ramsey Earnhart, Ventura, Calif., 6-2, 8-6, but came back in the men's singles division to topple fourth seeded Ron Schoenberg, Los Angeles, 6-4, 6-3.

Kono was to have met Portland's Bill Rose, No. 1 seeded in the men's division in the semifinals yesterday.

In the other semi-final match, John Swann, Vancouver, B.C., faced Gordon Davis, from Santa Monica, Calif., No. 2 seeded in the tournament.

Swann defeated Jim Buck, Compton, Calif., 9-7, 6-3, in the other quarter-final match Friday.

Roelandt Most Runs
Roelandt is top man in runs scored with 17 and Maurer is next with 14.

Duane Sides, Medford, continues to top the pitching column with four wins and no setbacks. Jim Eggers, Cave Junction, is 2-0. Sides has pitched the most innings, 30 2/3. Wayne Saffer, Cave Junction, (2-1), is next in service with 28. He is tops in strikeouts with 32 while Sides has 29.

One of the better mound showings has been by Larry Cochell, Grants Pass, (2-1). Third in point of activity with 27 2/3 innings. He has been responsible for only 12 hits and six runs.

Jones Hurls Two-Hitter

Sam Jones loves to chew on toothpicks and maybe that ain't etiquette, but the St. Louis Cardinals aren't fussy as long as he can help them sink their teeth into some World Series melon this fall.

Jones munched on a toothpick all Friday night while pitching a two-hitter against the New York Giants in a 5-1 victory that kept the Cards two games ahead in the National League pennant race.

For a time Friday night, it appeared the hard-throwing St. Louis right hander might be enroute to the second no-hit game of his big league career. He pitched one such game for the Cubs against the Pirates, May 12, 1955, and he was working on another one Friday night until Willie Mays' 14th homer in the ninth but by that time, home runs by Stan Musial, Alvin Dark and Don Blasingame had insured Jones' third victory in a row and seventh of the campaign.

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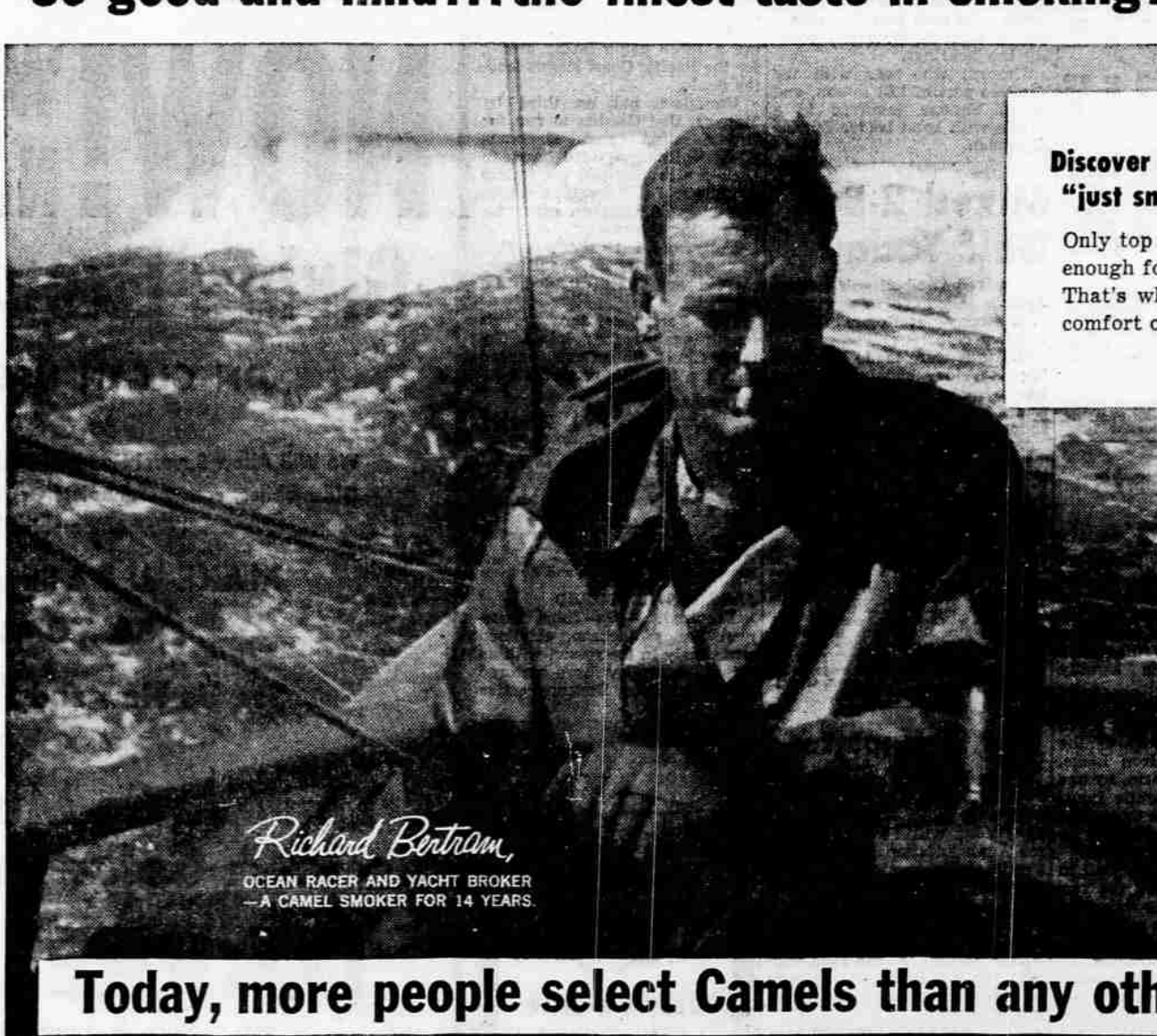
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
