

Keegan Hurts White Sox to Win Over Senators, Yanks Lose; Braves, Phillies Win

The Kansas City Athletics won their first game in 14 meetings with the New York Yankees Saturday when they defeated the World Champions 6-4.

Kansas City's victory, coupled with Chicago's 7-4 triumph over Washington, cut the Yankees' American league lead to three games.

Hector Lopez drove in the tie-breaking run for the Athletics with a sacrifice fly in the bottom of the seventh inning. Billy Hunter and Lou Skizas each homered for the A's while Yogi Berra connected for the Yanks.

Glenn Cox took over for starter Arnie Portocarrero in the sixth and was credited with the triumph although Tom Morgan relieved him in the eighth.

Sox Rap Stobbs

The White Sox rapped hard luck Southpaw Chuck Stobbs for six runs in six innings and then went on to win on Bob Keegan's relief pitching. Keegan took over for starter Jack Harshman in the third inning and gave up only two hits, including a homer by Herb Plews, to gain his fifth win. Nellie Fox collected three of Chicago's 11 hits to drive in two runs. Luis Aparicio also drove in a pair.

Home runs by Rocky Colavito and Rodger Maris helped the Cleveland Indians to a 5-2 victory over the Baltimore Orioles.

Colavito put the Indians in front with his 17th homer off loser Billy O'Dell in the second inning and after Baltimore had narrowed Cleveland's margin to 3-2 in the top of the eighth, Maris hit his 10th homer with one on in the bottom of the frame off reliever George Zuverink.

Don Mossi gained his seventh victory for the Indians, allowing only two hits until the eighth. Cal McLish and Ray Narleski both pitched for the Indians as the Orioles scored their two runs in the eighth.

Williams Hits Homer

Tom Brewer of the Red Sox gained his 10th victory with an eight-inning effort that beat the Tigers, 6-2. Billy Klaus drove in two of Boston's runs with a triple and a double while Ted Williams hit his 23rd homer with the bases empty in the seventh. Paul Foytack was the losing pitcher.

Rookie outfielder Harry Anderson hit an inside-the-park homer and drove in three runs to lead the Phillies to a 5-2 victory over the Cubs. Anderson's homer, off loser Dick Drott in the fifth inning, came with Ed Bouchee on base and it gave Philadelphia a 4-1 lead. Joe Lonnett also homered for the Phils while rookie Jerry Kindall connected for the Cubs. Ex-Cub Warren Hacker was the winner although Dick Farrell was summoned from the Phillies' bullpen to choke off a Chicago threat in the ninth.

Lew Burdette scattered seven hits in pitching the Braves to a 4-3 triumph over the Pirates. Del Crandall's two-run homer in the seventh off loser Ronnie Kline produced what proved to be the deciding runs. Wes Covington also homered for Milwaukee.

The Dodgers were leading the Redlegs, 2-0, in the last half of the second inning when their game was called as the Cards had a 4-0 lead over the Giants when the rain forced a halt in the second inning also.

Clem Upsets Iron Liege

Chicago — Clem, an eastern 3-year-old ridden by Con McCreary, upset favored Iron Liege with Jockey Willie Hartack and the midwest speedster, Greek Game, to win the \$151,500 Arlington classic handily Saturday.

Clem, owned by Mrs. Adelle L. Rand, came out of the seven horse pack at the top of the stretch and shaded Iron Liege, owned by Calumet farm, by one length at the wire while Louis Lee Haggins' Manteau took third over Greek Game, owned by Fred W. Hooper.

The victor was the second in a stake for Clem, and the record payoff of \$105,950 was more than he had earned in all his previous starts which included six victories in 22 appearances.

Clem's total earnings soared to \$198,810 as Saturday's net surpassed the previous high payment for the classic of \$105,375 to Calumet's Mark-Ye-Well in 1953.

Russian Sets High Jump Record at Meet
Frankfurt, Germany — Jurij Stepanov of Russia cleared 2.16 meters (7 feet, 1.02 inches) to set a world high jump record Saturday in a track meet at Leningrad, the East German news agency A. D. N. reported.

The official world mark of seven feet, 1/2 inch was set by Charles Dumas of Los Angeles at his home town on June 29, 1956. Stepanov did not take part in the 1956 Olympic games at Melbourne, in which Dumas won the gold medal by clearing six feet, 11 1/2 inches.

Bayer Takes Canadian Title; Winger Second

Kitchener, Ont. — Mighty George Bayer, the long-hitting titan of the links, captured his first tournament title Saturday when he fired a two-under-par 69 to win the Canadian Open Golf championship with a 72-hole total of 271.

Six-foot-five, 240-pound Bayer—the game's longest hitter—finished two strokes in front of little Bo Winger of Odessa, Tex., who made a bold bid to catch him. Six strokes back of the pace going into the final round, the gray-haired Winger fired a six-under-par 65 to finish 11 under for 72 holes at 273.

Bayer entered the final round with an 11-under total of 202 and held a three-stroke lead over Bill Casper, but his lead melted to a single shot early in the round as he scrambled through the first five holes. At that time Casper was just one stroke back, Doug Ford two and Frank Stranahan three.

Forest Hills, N.Y. — Tony Trabert of Cincinnati, Ohio, captured a marathon match from Australia's Ken Rosewall, 6-4, 14-12, 6-4, Saturday as Jack Kramer's professional tennis tournament of champions began with rain limiting play to one singles and one doubles contest.

Trabert whipped Rosewall in the same stadium in which he defeated the dark-haired Aussie for the 1955 United States amateur crown.

In Saturday's doubles contest, which was completed just before dark, Gonzales and Rosewall defeated Segura and Dinny Pails of Australia, 6-2, 6-4.

Because of Saturday's curtailed program, three singles and one doubles match will be played today.

Low Hoad, recent Wimbledon winner who accepted a two-year contract from Kramer for \$125,000 last Monday will make his pro debut Sunday by taking on a fellow Australian, Frank Sedgman.

Pancho Gonzales, world pro tennis champion, goes against Trabert, while Pancho Segura faces Rosewall. Gonzales arrived Saturday morning from Los Angeles after a long holdout period. An extra \$1,000 bonus tossed him by Kramer caused him to change his mind.
