The Medical Roundup

"Fall-Out" and X-Ray Hazards
I recently talked to one of America's nuclear physicists, an expert, of course, on atom bombs and the now-dreaded fall-outs. He said that the amount of radiation in such out dust is only a fraction of that which a man gets when he has his teeth x-rayed. He said that if the great government experts thought that testing bombs would do harm to the people of the world they would not be doing it.

The physicist reminded me that every minute, day and night, there is a stream of extremely powerful cosmic rays pouring down upon us from outer space, and this radiation we seem to stand all right. He evidently felt that while we have this constant stream of radiation hitting us, there is little sense in fussing about a little fall-out.

According to a report last year from the National Academy of Sciences — our most august group — the "background" of radiation which we all have to meet in every 30-year period is about 4.3 roentgens (units of radiation). The amount we get from x-ray studies over the years is about 3 roentgens. The amount from test of atom bombs will probably be about 0.1 roentgen (the amount we get off a radium dial on a watch). The Medical Research Council of Great Britain last year calculated the "fall-out" over 50 years as from 0.02 to 0.04 per cent of the radiation we get constantly from "natural sources."

Obviously, then, there is nothing here to get excited about. The British recently pointed out the curious fact that in their country the men who are excited, the people to panic over the "fall-out" never protest the fact that Russia is setting off five bombs a year. This does not bother them. What bothers them is that Great Britain has set off two bombs a year, and America, at the time of writing, had set off six in a year.

Cobalt 60 and Cancer in the Abdomen
Dr. John H. Maus recently reported at Quebec City that with the help of rays from a rotating cobalt bomb life can be made more comfortable for some patients with cancer of the stomach, pancreas, gallbladder and colon. The results were impressive in a few instances, but, unfortunately, not curative in the majority of cases.

Airlines Granted Over-Pole Routes
Washington — President Eisenhower has authorized the permanent grant of a trans-polar air route between the West Coast and Europe to Pan American World Airways and Trans-World Airlines.

Pan Am also received a 2-year temporary authority for polar route flights from Portland, Ore., and Seattle, Wash., to Europe.

The permanent route authorized Pan Am and TWA to use Los Angeles and San Francisco as co-terminals on the West Coast. The two lines will be competitive on the run.

Three foreign airlines are authorized by treaty to serve the West Coast over the polar route. One of them, Scandinavian Airlines System (SAS), began service between Los Angeles and Europe in November, 1954.

In addition, British Overseas Airways Corp. (BOAC) has received CAB permission to serve San Francisco and London over the pole, but has not yet inaugurated service.

The German airline Lufthansa has treaty authority to operate between either San Francisco and Los Angeles and Europe, but has yet to receive a go-ahead from the CAB.

Wailes Appointment To Hungary Cancelled

Washington — The United States, showing anew its dislike for the Communist regime in Hungary, has cancelled appointment of Edward T. Wailes to be U. S. minister to Hungary, it was learned Saturday.

State Department officials informed the United Press that Wailes, who was recalled in February for consultation, "will not be going back to Budapest." Instead, he has been reassigned as chief state department officer at the war college here.

There are no plans, it was said, to appoint a successor in Budapest.

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
