Band Director Accepts Texas Position in Fall

Ashland—Huot Fisher, band director at Ashland High school for the past two years, has accepted a position as woodwind instructor and associate band director at Lamar State college in Beaumont, Texas.

Fisher will also be the principal clarinetist with the 80-piece Beaumont symphony orchestra.

Lamar State college had a total enrollment of 5,600 during the last year and had a music department of about 90 students.

Returning from a recent trip to the college, Fisher spent two weeks at the Asilomar conference grounds in Pacific Grove, Calif., and attended a workshop for symphony orchestra conductors sponsored by the American Symphony Orchestra League and the Rockefeller foundation.

A 90 piece orchestra was assembled for the workshop and was composed of musicians from 20 states, Canada and two south American countries.

Mr. and Mrs. Fisher will move to Beaumont later this summer. While in southern Oregon Mr. Fisher was a member of the Southern Oregon Philharmonic orchestra.
