

Four County Youths Selected for Camp

Four Jackson county boys have been selected to attend the annual Boys' Range Camp in Morrow county July 29 to Aug. 3.

They are Steve Carroll, 15, route 1, box 662, Eagle Point; David Hughes, 16, Little Butte Star route, box 140, Eagle Point; Russell Elmore, 15, Applegate; and Wayne Ditsworth, 14, route 1, box 536, Talent.

Steve, Russell and Wayne are 4-H club members and David is a Future Farmers of America member.

Selected From Applicants

The boys were selected from 10 applicants by a committee appointed by the Jackson County 4-H Leaders association. The committee conducted contests on

plant identification and other factors. Each will attend the camp on a scholarship supplied by Crater Lake Motors.

The Jackson county campers will leave here July 28 for Bend. They will be met there by campers from Klamath, Deschutes and Josephine counties and will take a bus to the camp site at Tupper Guard station in the Umatilla National forest.

Subjects taught at the camp will include identification of plants, use of hunting and fishing equipment, how to get along in the woods, what to do if lost, and problems involved in managing ranges, both open sagebrush and forest.

Contests Scheduled

Several contests will be conducted at the camp in finding and naming plants growing in the area. On the last day, 100 plants will be tagged in some adjacent range area and the boys will be given about three hours to find all the tagged plants and name them.

One day of the camp will be devoted to visiting range livestock ranches near Heppner in Morrow county.

In charge of the camp will be John G. Clouston, Portland, executive secretary of the American Society of Range management.

Social Security Payments On Dec. 31 Were \$242,945

A total of 4,748 retired individuals more than 65 years of age and survivors of deceased insured individuals were receiving \$242,945 monthly in social security benefits in Jackson county as of Dec. 31, 1936. W. V. Nusbbaum, manager of the Medford office of the Social Security administration, has announced.

This is an increase of 603 beneficiaries and \$35,722 in monthly payments over the same date in 1935.

The largest group receiving payments consisted of retired workers of whom there were 2,859 receiving \$170,780 per month.

Other groups and the amounts received were wives, 837, \$26,180; children under 18, 591, \$23,635; widows 359, \$17,350; mothers, 95, \$4,665.

Noting that coverage under the Old Age and Survivors insurance program has increased rapidly in recent years, Nusbbaum pointed out that three-fourths of the men becoming 65 this year will be eligible for social security benefits. Of all people over 65 years of age, 62 percent are now drawing benefits or will be entitled to draw them when their income stops.

He also pointed out that while the original law covered only about 26 million workers, as of March 1937 approximately 55.5

million people were in work covered by the law, and more than 9 out of every 10 persons who work for a living and 9 out of 10 mothers and children have a stake in the social security insurance program.

Oregon ranks sixth among the 48 states in the percentage of people over 65 receiving benefits under the Old Age and Survivors insurance program, being exceeded only by four New England states and New Jersey, Nusbbaum said. The national average of persons over 65 receiving payments as of Dec. 31 was 478 per 1,000 whereas the number in Oregon was 575.

Residents Warned Of 'Buy-Back' Scheme

Don McNeil, manager of the Jackson County Chamber of Commerce, Saturday warned residents of Medford and Jackson county about Lincoln penny coin albums currently being advertised under a "buy-back" lure.

He stated that in a typical advertisement, the reader is attracted by such a heading as: "We pay \$16 for only 59 Lincoln pennies." Readers are told to send \$1 for a Lincoln coin album, return the complete album and receive \$16 by return air mail plus \$1 back for the album.

McNeil noted the reader is not advised that the coins necessary to complete the album must bear specified mint marks, or, in some cases, the initials of the engraver. It was pointed out that established dealers offer to pay more than \$16 for just one coin in top condition and the chamber manager said, "Anyone with a complete set of these coins, in any condition, would be foolish to sell it for \$16."

Possible violations of postal laws are also indicated in this type of scheme.

Date for Happy Camp Election Scheduled

Happy Camp—The Siskiyou county board of supervisors Friday approved a resolution setting the date for an incorporation election at Happy Camp for Tuesday, Sept. 24.

Officers to serve in the town if incorporation is approved will be elected at the same time.

A dissenting vote on the election issue was cast by Supervisor Clint Jackson. He said his "no" vote was based on objection to the board's rejection of all petitions for withdrawal in one motion. He said that action caused a few of the proposed withdrawals a hardship.

Supervisor W. C. Ealy replied he thought the good of the majority was more important than consideration only of the minority. The area will vote on five councilmen, a clerk and a treasurer as well as the incorporation matter.

Undersea Cable to Hawaii Is Planned

San Pedro, Calif.—The cable-ship Monarch was scheduled to leave here today to start laying the first undersea telephone link with Hawaii.

The \$37,000,000 project will involve laying a cable from a spot 10 miles off Point Arena, Calif., to Hawaii, 2,400 miles away. The cables will be capable of carrying 36 simultaneous conversations.

The Hawaiian Telephone company and the Pacific Telephone and Telegraph company, participants in the project, have been planning the construction for about three years.

Gravel Applied to New Section of Highway 199

Cave Junction — Gravel is being applied to the new stretch of Redwood highway south of Cave Junction as a last step before the paving job begins.

The re alignment eliminates several bad curves and two narrow bridges.

Included in the new highway are two new bridges, built by the Tom Lillebo company.
