

Sanford Pitches Boston To Win Over Cardinals As Team Tops Nationals

Handsome Jack Sanford, ignored as a major league prospect by the Boston Red Sox 10 years ago because he was too small, stood at least 10 feet tall today in the eyes of Philadelphia's pennant-smelling fans.

The rookie right hander from Wellesley, Mass., pitched the Phillies into first place in the National League Monday night by posting a five-hit, 6-2 victory over the St. Louis Cardinals.

It marked the first time the Phillies occupied the top rung of the NL standings at this stage of the campaign since 1950. And nobody in Philadelphia was to be reminded that was the year the old Whiz Kids won the pennant.

This new group of Whiz Kids now has won 12 of its last 14 games, moving from fifth place on July 1 to its present elevation—a half-game ahead of the Cardinals. Sanford has been the "big man" in this drive, allowing only 15 hits while posting three straight complete game victories.

Nabs Strikeout Leadership

In raising his season win-and-loss record to 12-2 Monday night against the Cardinals, Sanford took over the major league strikeout leadership by whiffing seven men. The blond, blue-eyed New Englander has totaled 111 strikeouts, one more than Early Wynn of the Cleveland Indians.

The only St. Louis player who gave Sanford trouble was Alvin Dark. The veteran shortstop tripled in the fourth and scored on Stan Musial's sacrifice fly, then homered in the eighth to account for both St. Louis runs.

However, Willie Jones treated Sanford to a 2-0 lead in the second inning with a two-run homer and the Phillies chased Vengor Bend Mizell in the third with a four-run burst, featured by Granny Hamner's two-run double.

The Brooklyn Dodgers walloped the Milwaukee Braves, 20-4, and the New York Giants whipped the Chicago Cubs, 5-3, in other NL action. The Washington Senators raced to a 10-3 victory over the Kansas City Athletics in the only American League game.

Neal Homers Twice

The Dodgers clubbed five Milwaukee pitchers for 16 hits, including a pair of home runs by Charley Neal, in moving to with-

in two games of the lead. Duke Snider, Sandy Amoros and winning pitcher Don Drysdale also homered for the Dodgers, who hustled to a 9-1 lead within four innings and then added a nine-run burst in the eighth frame.

Willie Mays, whose 12th-inning home run crushed the Cubs Sunday, turned on his Chicago "cousins" for the second straight day with a two-run circuit blow in the third inning that provided the Giants with their winning margin. Johnny Antonelli picked up his ninth victory, although he needed relief from Al Worthington in the eighth inning. Don Mueller also homered for the Giants.

Russ Kemmerer hit his first major league home run and scattered 12 hits in pitching over the Athletics. Lou Berberet and Faye Throneberry also homered

for Washington and Tim Thompson clouted one for Kansas City.

Sacs Split Double For 7-0, 2-6 Score With Vancouver Mon.

Smiles don't usually come easy to the manager of a last place team, but Manager Tommy Heath of the Sacramento Solons is beaming like a most happy fella.

Most of the Pacific Coast League were romping past the half-mile post before the Solons cleared the starting gate, but the dark horse from the California capital is off and running.

It would take a miracle for the Solons to finish in the money, but second place Vancouver will agree that Tommy's gang can make it awfully rough on the front runners.

Monday night, Sacramento opened a doubleheader with the Mounties by scoring their 11th victory in their last 15 starts—but then dropped the nightcap. The Solons won 7-0, and then lost, 6-2.

The split gave Sacramento a 5-3 record edge of the Mounties, who trail league-leading San Francisco by only three games. Roger Bowman did the job for

Sacramento in the first game, allowing the Mounties only four hits. His mates backed him up with the winning run in the first inning and then added insurance with double tallies in the fourth, fifth and seventh innings of the short contest.

However, the Mounties got back their hitting eyes in the nightcap. They rapped 12 hits off two Sacramento pitchers for their best batting attack of the month.

The Mounties scored one run in the first inning, and then Owen Friend hit his ninth homer of the season with one on in the third inning to give Vancouver all the runs it needed. They added two more in the fourth and a single tally in the eighth.

Morrie Martin held the Solons in check, except in the fourth frame when Harry Bright slammed a long homer over the left field wall that brought in Sacramento's only two runs.

Tonight, Sacramento moved to Seattle. Vancouver plays at Los Angeles, Hollywood visits San Diego, and Portland hosts San Francisco.

Ippolito Beats Tom Salem Monday Nite

New York — Lightweight Frankie Ippolito, the Manhattan College graduate who used miltis and mathematics to stop Tommy Salem Monday night, will get another TV fight at St. Nicholas Arena, Aug. 5.

Promoter Teddy Brenner matched 23-year-old Ippolito today with dangerous Johnny Busso of New York, who upset fifth-ranked Larry Boardman on June 28.

Ippolito, weighing 139 pounds to 136 for Salem of Cleveland, floored Tommy twice and registered an upset technical knockout at 1:37 of the sixth round. Salem, favored at 8-5, was bleeding from a cut on his left eyelid, but the bout was stopped because he had been beaten into helplessness on the ropes.

"I changed my style last night," Frankie explained. "I used some very simple mathematics—the law of leverage—and came down off my toes to punch flat-footedly for more power."

Musial Leads In National

Brooklyn — That Man was leading the National League hitters again today.

Stan the Man Musial of the St. Louis Cardinals regained the top spot Monday night, collecting one hit in two official at-bats against Philadelphia's Jack Sanford to raise his batting average to .344.

Hank Aaron of the Milwaukee Braves dropped to second place with a .343 mark. He went hitless in five appearances against the Dodgers.

Herb Flam Aims For Second Win

River Forest, Ill. — Defending champion Herb Flam today opens his conquest for a second straight men's singles title in the U.S. Lawn Assn.'s National Clay Courts championships.

The Beverly Hills, Calif., star seeded No. 1—drew a first-round bye and begins action with a second-round match against William Cullen, Southport, Conn.

Meanwhile, Althea Gibson, first Negro to win the Wimbledon women's singles title, easily swept past Lois Smith of Glenview, Ill., in straight sets, 6-0, 6-0 for a first-round triumph.

'Quiet' Jet Engine Claimed Developed

Virginia City, Nev. — The Curtiss-Wright Corp. has developed a "quiet" jet engine designed to take the car-splitting racket out of the commercial jet air travel of the future.

The revolutionary new power plant, designed the T338 Zephyr, was developed jointly by the Wright Aeronautical Division and Bristol Aero Engines of England.

Officials of Curtiss-Wright demonstrated the new engine Monday.

The second big factor of the Zephyr is its thrust reverser, which enables the pilot to "throw the plane in reverse" much the same as the pilot of a conventional aircraft brakes by reversing the pitch of his propellers.

DRIZZLE CAUSES FIZZLE

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Los Angeles Man Says Dodger Failure To Move West Would Be 'Double Cross'

Los Angeles — A Los Angeles official today charged it would be "the biggest double cross in history" if the Brooklyn Dodgers failed to come to Los Angeles next year.

The statement was made by County Supervisor Kenneth Hahn who claimed Brooklyn President Walter O'Malley had gone so far in lining up Los Angeles as the new home for the Dodgers that the city and county were about to rip apart sections of the 105,000 seat Memorial Coliseum to make it a temporary field for the team until a baseball stadium could be built.

At the same time a joint city-county group announced it was appointing a business executive to get a "firm agreement" from O'Malley that he intends bringing the Brooklyn club here.

Verbal Agreement

Hahn indicated that so far as he was concerned there was a verbal agreement and he doubted if the offer of a site was sufficient to change O'Malley's mind. Poulson, however, took the New York story lightly, and declared, "I am not alarmed, let me put it that way."

Meanwhile, San Francisco Mayor George Christopher told a press conference Monday that the financial burden of pay-as-you-see television may keep the New York Giants and the Dodgers away from the West coast.

He said Mark Sullivan, president of the Pacific Telephone and Telegraph Co., had told him it would cost between \$60 and 75 million to install a Skiatron closed circuit TV system in San Francisco and that the installation would take at least three years.

Skiatron TV Inc., is seeking closed circuit franchises in both San Francisco and Los Angeles. Under the Skiatron system telephone subscribers can dial a baseball game or other events by paying a fee.

Courchesne To Fight Negro on August Match

Holyoke, Mass. — New England lightweight champion Bobby Courchesne of Holyoke, Mass., has signed to fight Shiva Negro on Aug. 5 and Vincent Rivas on Aug. 19 in Caracas, Venezuela. Rivas is the current Venezuelan lightweight champion.

Baltimore — Don Shula, a defensive halfback with five seasons of pro football experience, and George Press, an offensive tackle, are the latest players to sign their 1957 contracts with the Baltimore Colts.

Sacs Player Tops In Earned Runs

San Francisco — Figure filberts in the Pacific Coast League can puzzle over the fact that the losing pitcher in the loop has a better earned run average than the leading percentage pitcher.

Figure released today by league statistician William Weiss showed Roger Osenbaugh of Sacramento with 11 losses and an ERA of 4.39 while Bill Abernathie of San Francisco had a 4.74 earned run average but had compiled a 9-1 record for the leading percentage.

Explanation of this seeming paradox might rest in the fact that the Seals lead the league while Sacramento is in last place a couple dozen games off the pace.
