Railway Express Strike Nears End

Chicago — A 13-week-old strike of 2,000 Railway Express Agency drivers in seven major cities appeared headed for final settlement today.

Local 720, Railway Express Drivers Union, representing 1000 Chicago area employees, accepted the latest company offer Monday night. James E. O'Hara, secretary-treasurer of the local, said the offer included a 15 cent hourly pay boost retroactive to Jan. 16, 1936.

O'Hara said strikers in Cleveland and San Francisco have approved the new terms. Union members in Philadelphia rejected it by a vote of 195 to 80. Cincinnati, Newark, and St. Louis unions were voting on the agreement.

Mr. and Mrs. Dick Larson and family did some salmon fishing on the coast over the week end.



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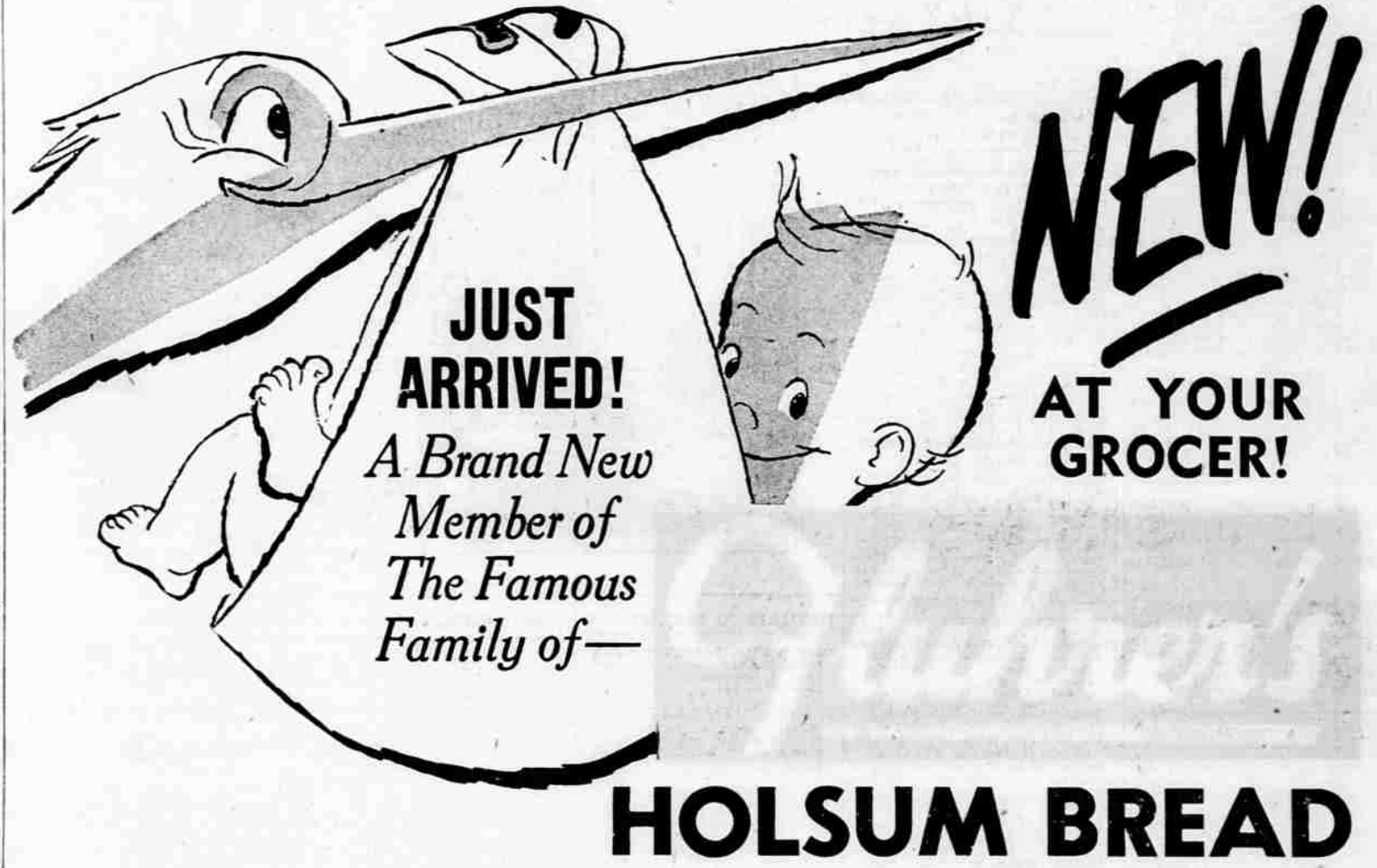


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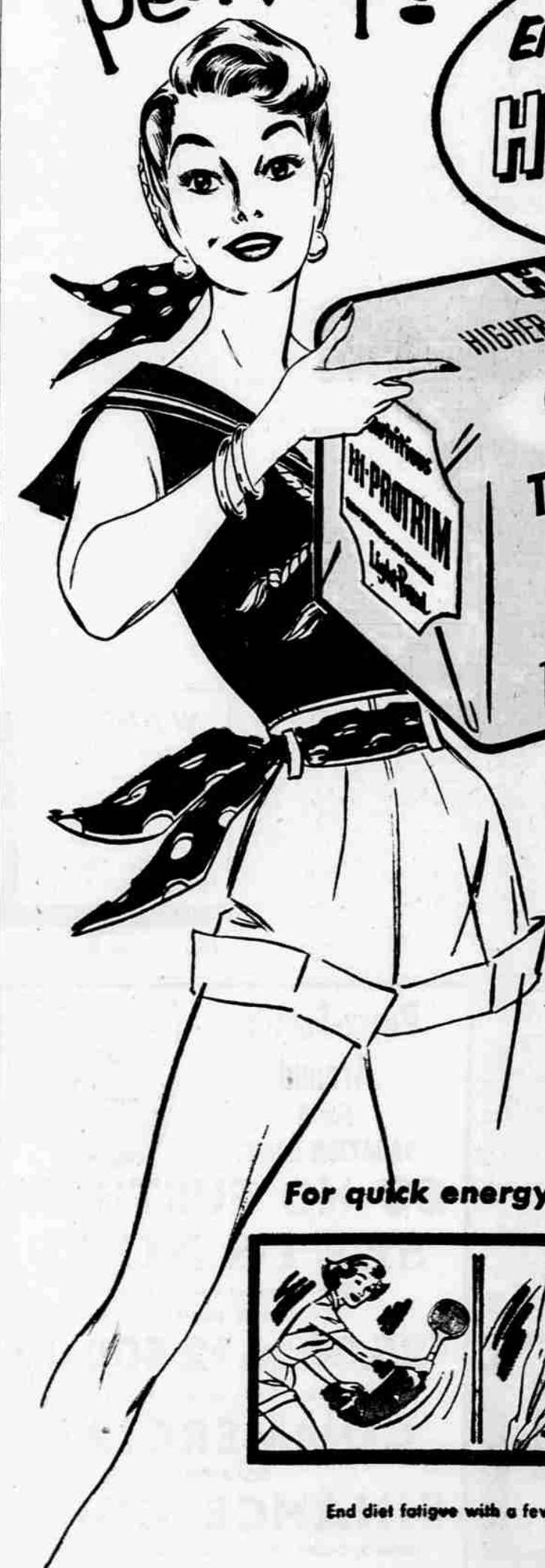
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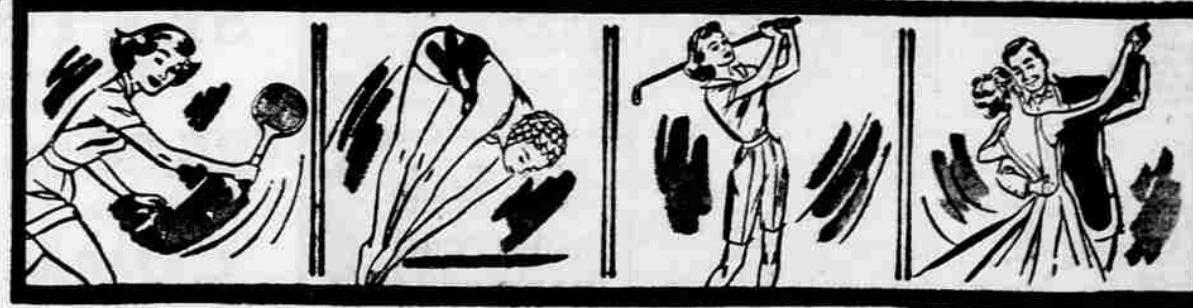


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
