

Development Project Director Will Visit Area Library System

Dr. Morton Kroll, director of the library development project of the Pacific Northwest Library association, will spend Thursday, July 25, in Medford, according to information received by Miss Helen E. Webster, librarian.

Dr. Kroll plans to spend the day talking to Miss Webster and to trustees of the Medford public and Jackson county library about several matters pertaining to library development in Jackson county.

Selected for Study

Since the Medford public library was selected in February for study by the library development project, a number of questionnaires have been forwarded to Seattle on such subjects as revenue, salary schedules, expenditures, and concerning the community served by the library, its population, economic base, and other factors.

Dr. Kroll's visit is the first of several planned.

The library development project of the Pacific Northwest Library association is concerned with the study of library facilities and services in the Pacific Northwest (British Columbia, Idaho, Montana, Oregon, and Washington).

The project is conducting its work over a two-year period, ending June 30, 1958, and is financed by a \$60,000 grant from the Ford Foundation. Headquarters for the project are on the campus of the University of Washington in Seattle.

Defense Officials Establish Controls

Salem—State unemployment compensation officials, in a follow-up on civil defense exercise Operation Alert, have set up hypothetical manpower controls involving re-assignment of about 100,000 workers displaced from "bombed" areas.

Back from temporary headquarters at Toledo after directing relocation of facilities during the emergency phase of the exercise, staff members were establishing employment stabilization measures under leadership of Chairman Cecelia P. Galey and Earl R. Lovell, director of the state employment service. Appointment of area labor-management committees, determining priority referral plans and establishing reemployment rights were among steps being taken at the Salem central office.

Vet's Widow May Receive GI Loan

The service-connected death of a World War II or Korean conflict veteran may entitle his widow to a GI loan, even if the veteran had obtained a GI loan before he died, according to S. T. Brannock, officer in charge of the local Veterans administration office.

However, Brannock warned, if the widow herself is an eligible veteran, she accrues no additional GI loan rights because of her husband's death.

Widows of World War II or Korea veterans whose death was service-connected also may obtain direct loans from VA in certain areas eligible for direct loans.

Direct loans may be made for the purchase of a home or farmhouse, or farm land. The law does not authorize direct business loans.

GI loan applications from widows, based on their husbands' deaths as a result of World War II service, must be made by July 25, 1958. For Korean conflict eligibility, loans must be made before Feb. 1, 1957, Brannock said.

New Type of Training for Korea Vets Approved by VA

A new type of apprentice training, recently approved for Korea veterans by the Veterans administration, may help add urgently-needed engineering talent to American industry. S. T. Brannock, officer in charge of the VA's local office, said today.

The new program, leading to a job objective of "engineering technician," will train veterans for some of the more routine tasks in engineering—thus allowing graduate engineers to concentrate on advanced work.

Now, engineers sometimes spend much time at duties that could well be performed by others who have less professional training, Brannock said.

Approved by VA for veterans employed by the General Electric company as apprentice trainees, the special apprenticeship consists of "learn while you work" training on-the-job plus two years of regular credit-earning college courses in the evening—all in various phases of engineering.

Veterans entering this apprentice program must meet all qualifications necessary to enter college. Their two years of evening classroom work will count toward an engineering degree, should they wish to continue studies, Brannock said.

The evening courses will be identical with those taught full-time day students.

The job training portion of the course includes more than 5,000 hours of engineering design, 1,700 hours of drafting and nearly 1,000 hours of machine shop.

Throughout the program, veterans will receive apprentice wages, stepped up periodically, as well as monthly Korean GI bill training allowances.

Normally, Brannock explained, the states approve courses for veterans under the Korean GI bill. But when a course is to be offered in more than one state, as is the case with General Electric, VA itself has authority under the law, to handle GI approval.

Colombia Violence Leaves 102 Victims

Bogota, Colombia — At least 102 persons were killed last week in a new eruption of violence throughout Colombia, according to reports today.

Interior Minister Jose Maria Villareal recently expressed confidence that an agreement would soon be reached to normalize the situation in the eastern plains where large armed groups still are active.

No details of the various acts of violence were reported.

Pope Planning Trip To Escape Weather

Vatican City—Pope Pius XII will leave the Vatican for his summer villa at Castel Gandolfo Saturday, 10 days earlier than planned, Vatican sources said today.

The 81-year-old pontiff was believed to have advanced his schedule to escape from the debilitating Rome heat. Temperatures in the high 90s already have been registered in Rome and police estimated more than 200 deaths throughout Italy resulted because of the recent heat wave.

The Pope is expected to remain at his walled castle-like villa overlooking placid Lake Albano in the Alban Hills, 15 miles southeast of Rome, until late in the fall.

Lower Payments on Housing Are Delayed

Washington — Administration sources said today the government will not immediately lower down payments on federal-backed home loans despite new authority to do so.

The sources said FHA Commissioner Lowell P. Mason will issue a statement later this week refusing to lower down payments at least until next fall because of inflationary dangers.

The administration had been considering an immediate cut as authorized under legislation recently signed by President Eisenhower.
