U.S. Air Force C47 Wreckage Located

Taipei, Formosa — Search parties reached the wreckage of a missing U.S. Air Force C47 military transport and found no survivors of the 16 men on board, Chinese police reported today.

A Chinese forestry patrol reported sighting the wreckage earlier in the day in a remote mountainous area of this island. The plane had been missing since Tuesday on a routine flight from the Philippines to Formosa. U.S. search parties were scheduled to follow the Chinese groups to the crash site.
