

Beavers Don't Know Where Next Victory Will Be Coming From

It's getting so the Portland Beavers don't know where their next win is coming from.

And you can bet that league leading San Francisco feels anything but merciful what with Vancouver and the hot Hollywood Stars breathing down its neck.

The Seals dumped Portland for the 10th consecutive time Thursday night in a rousing 10-inning game that eventually needed the attention of 10 hurriers. The final score was 12-7, after 22 Seal hits.

San Francisco sewed it up in the extra inning with a five-run outburst which began with a round-tripper by Frank Kellert. That started the Seals into four more runs—all off singles.

For a time it looked like Portland had found the winning combination by taking a second inning lead with five runs. The big man there was Frank Carswell who hit a three-run homer that was followed by a single, two walks and an infield out.

Kiely Wins Again
Winner was Leo Kiely. Kiely, the winningest pitcher in the league, now has a 14-2 record. Loser Gene Fodge is 1-4.

Hollywood continued its pace by defeating San Diego, 9-6, Vancouver came from behind to down Los Angeles, 3-3, and Seattle took Sacramento's measure 4-3, in an 11 inning game.

The Senators wrapped it up with a four-run outburst in the fourth. Bob Campbell drove in two runs on a single and Terry Maddox sent home two more with a double.

Sweep Series
Eugene swept a three-game series at Tri-City as Norm Tanner fanned two, walked 11, and scored the winning run.

Tanner doubled down the rightfield line, advanced to third on John Keller's bunt single and came home on an infield out by Dick Stacy.

Bruce McIntosh garnered four safeties in six trips and drove in four runs in the Broncs' lop-sided decision at Yakima. Chuck Davidson coasted to his eighth win of the year against five setbacks while Bob Roberts, first of five Bear hurlers, absorbed his eighth defeat in 16 outings.

Vince Moreci was the whole show for the hapless Bears. He had three hits in five times at bat, including a pair of two-run homers.

Nathan Leopold, Roger Touhy May Get Paroles From Illinois Prison

Springfield Ill.—Illinois Pardon and Parole Board members will recommend freedom for thrill killer Nathan Leopold, it was reported today.

Reports also circulated that Stateville Penitentiary's gates will swing open for another highly controversial inmate, prohibition era gangster Roger (The Terrible) Touhy.

The five-man board met in a closed session Thursday, after which a spokesman said the Leopold case and an appeal for freedom by Touhy had been "disposed of."

Speculation Spreads
Although the board's recommendations cannot be made public according to state law, speculation quickly spread through Springfield that Leopold and Touhy soon would be freed.

The Chicago Sun-Times, in a copyrighted story by John Dreiske, said Gov. William G. Stratton already has decided to reduce Leopold's term to 64 years, which means the 52-year-old slayer of little Bobby Franks would be eligible for immediate parole.

The story said Stratton also will vacate a 199-year term imposed on Touhy for jail break, paving the way for his release.

Some Leniency
The Chicago Tribune quoted board members as saying they will recommend "some leniency" for Leopold and Touhy.

Stratton who returned here by plane Thursday night from Washington, said he had not yet made up his mind in the cases of the two prisoners. However, he added he expected to announce his decision in about 10 days to two weeks.

"I don't know a thing about it until I get their report" from the board, Stratton continued.

"In deference to the man himself (Leopold) I think I should see the board's report and the records in the case before I make up my mind," the governor said.

Board members left Springfield after the meeting, but will return again next Thursday to review their recommendation and sign it before presenting it to Stratton.

The final decision is up to the governor, who is not required to follow the board's recommendations.

Leopold, whose crime was one of the most notorious in Ameri-

can annals, pleaded last week for executive clemency the only avenue to freedom he has left.

City Firemen Are Called to Grass Fires in Vicinity

City firemen extinguished three grass fires yesterday and received an alarm on another which was outside the rural district and was put out by state forestry department patrolmen.

The city fire trucks were sent out on a blaze of about 10 acres at Barneburg hill south of Barnett rd. The cause apparently was a discarded cigarette, firemen reported. They were dispatched at 7:55 p.m.

Two other grass fires spread from trash blazes. One was at 1540 Ellendale dr. about 5:15 p.m. and the other at 531 Pearl st. about 3:30 p.m. Two pumps were sent to the Pearl st. scene since a house fire alarm was given.

Outside District
The fire outside the district was in the Foothills rd. area. It covered about two acres and six patrolmen and two pumps fought the flames. Patrolmen said there was indication that youngsters playing with matches may have been responsible for the fire.

Central Point rural firemen said that a boy playing with matches was the cause of a small grass fire yesterday morning in private property in the vicinity of the National Guard area on Table Rock rd.

Medford firemen had a diversion from grass fires yesterday afternoon when they were called to 410 West Jackson st. to rescue a small dog from under a house.

Damage was confined to fences and fence posts in a 30-acre grass fire on Coal Mine rd. Wednesday afternoon, city firemen reported. They said the blaze was believed started from a tractor working the area. The Medford fire department dispatched two pumps to the scene and the state forestry department one.

Portland — Visiting fire chiefs who have been attending demonstrations during a convention here got a double taste of the real thing Thursday night and early today when multi-alarm fires broke out on opposite sides of the Willamette river.

Thursday night's fire was the worst. The fire department estimated damage at \$300,000 from blaze at the Electro-Measurements, Inc., factory on the west side of the river.

Shortly after 6 a.m. today a three-alarm fire broke out at the Screw Machine Products Company in the old Inman-Poulsen warehouse on the east side of the river. Damage was estimated at \$5,000.
