

Governor Appoints Two Committees For Interim Study

Salem — First of some 50 public members he will appoint to interim study committees created by the 1957 Legislature have been announced by Gov. Robert D. Holmes.

Three public members of the nine-member interim education study committee named by the governor are Elizabeth Ducey, Portland; Leo Marantes, Seaside; and Mrs. Paul Buck, Klamath Falls.

Problems of migratory labor in Oregon will be tackled by a committee including four public members appointed by the governor. They are Dr. Hoyt Franchere, Oswego, head of the division of humanities at Portland State College; Lawren King, Ontario, a Malheur county rancher who employs migrant workers; Dr. Daniel Wessler, Corvallis, head of the Presbyterian foundation; and Dean Holmes, editor.

Several areas of study are ahead for the education committee. The resolution calling for its creation asked study of elementary and high school district minimum standards, reorganization, finance, in-service training, curriculum development and vocational needs, and investigation of post high school education problems including extent and manner of assistance for community colleges authorized also by the legislature.

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Hearing Scheduled For Land Reserve

Portland — A plan to reserve 5017 acres of public land to provide public access to fishing spots on the Deschutes river will be aired at The Dalles at a public hearing Aug. 23.

The Federal Fish and Wildlife service had requested the withdrawal in cooperation with the Oregon State Game commission.

Virgil T. Heath, Oregon supervisor of the Bureau of Land Management, said the acreage lies along both banks of the Deschutes between the abandoned Union Pacific railroad tracks and the Oregon Trunk line track near Sherars bridge to near Freebridge, Ore. The abandoned railroad bed would be used for an access road.

Adventurers Resume Trip Around World

Shemya, Alaska — Two seafaring adventurers aboard their amphibious Jeep "Half Safe" resumed the next leg of a round the world trip Thursday.

Skipper of the craft, Ben Carlin, 45, and Boyd de Mente, 28, Phoenix, landed here July 8 after a hazardous 1,300-mile North Pacific crossing from Japan's Hokkaido Island.

Next stop will be Homer, Alaska, with perhaps a few unscheduled stops along the way on the Aleutian chain, Carlin said.

From Homer it will be on to Anchorage, then Seattle, down the coast to San Francisco and Los Angeles, and finally across the continent to Montreal, where Carlin began his Odyssey seven years ago.

Auxiliary Policemen Resign at Portland

Portland — Thirty auxiliary policemen resigned Wednesday night in protest over demotion of three officers.

Capt. Louis Foust said the mass resignations were turned in after a meeting at which the demotion to patrolmen of Captain Foust and Lieutenants Frank Carpenter and Jack Leonard was protested. The letter said that because of reorganization these three men would be reduced in rank.

Foust said they were not given a hearing.

Washington — President Eisenhower said Wednesday he would like his official and personal papers placed in the Eisenhower Library planned to be established in his home town of Abilene, Kan.

However, the President told his news conference that he wanted to keep his personal papers during his lifetime.

Eisenhower also expressed a wish that any paper or letter in which he may have "spoken disparagingly of someone still alive" would be kept secret until that person had died.
