Radioisotopes Saving Millions

Chicago — Industry is saving nearly 400 million dollars a year through the use of radioisotopes, according to an Atomic Energy commission official, E. Eugene Fowler. He said the figure will increase "several fold" over the next 5 to 10 years.

Fowler, deputy director of the AEC Division of Civilian Applications, placed the estimated present savings to industry at \$380 million.

On this basis, he said, for every dollar of federal expenditure on the production and distribution of radioisotopes, \$750 is being returned to the national economy through savings effected in industry, medicine and agriculture.

Fowler said that while about 50 per cent of the 600 largest manufacturing companies are using isotopes, only about one-third of one per cent of the total 300,000 manufacturing and mining concerns in the United States are using the technique.

Fowler believes the peaceful uses of nuclear materials are being held back "because we (AEC) have not been overly successful in bringing to bear upon management the vast amount of information and technique currently available on non-power uses of nuclear materials to particular manufacturing problems."

Capital expenditures for equipment to use radioisotopes in many cases do not exceed \$5,000 or \$10,000, he said.

The Family Council

Editor's note: The Family Council consists of a judge, a psychiatrist, three clergymen, a newspaper editor, a women's editor and two writers. Each article is a summary of an actual report. Stephen R. — I can't give back Betty's gift.

Mrs. F. R. — It's quite embarrassing for me.

Stephen R. — I am 16 and have been going steady with a girl of 15 for the past year or so. Our parents don't approve of our going steady, but my parents like Betty and her parents like me, so they don't make too much fuss.

The problem is this: Betty has given me expensive presents for my birthday and Christmas. Her folks have plenty of money and she has a big allowance — a lot bigger than mine. The presents I give Betty don't cost half as much. My mother says I have to give back the last present she got me — a watch.

I don't mind giving up the watch, but I know that Betty would be very hurt and so would her folks. I don't think it's right to return a present once you've taken it.

Mrs. F. R. — I have known Betty's family for years and they have always been this way about their money. They give gifts and entertain lavishly without realizing that others can't keep up with them.

I know they are very fond of Steve and would really like to see something come of his friendship with Betty. I feel that Betty is a very lovely little girl, but there are so many years ahead for both of them that I don't like Steve to get too obligated to the family.

I am really rather ashamed of the things Steve has gotten for Betty. They are so cheap! And when he takes her out, it is always to the most inexpensive places. It is all quite embarrassing for me.

The Council: Mrs. F. R. is bringing a few too many adult considerations to bear on this teenage relationship. The fact that she feels embarrassed and is concerned about "keeping up" with Betty's family indicates she is overly concerned with her relationship to Betty's family. This confuses the problem a bit.

On the teenage level there is nothing terribly wrong with Betty's giving Steve slightly more expensive gifts than he can give her. Since she has a bigger allowance, she can save more for these gifts. And Steve does spend a good share of his small income on taking her out. It is natural for Betty to want to show her appreciation in a gift. But as a matter of taste there

should be a limit to the amount a girl of Betty's age spends on gifts for a boy, no matter what her family's income is. A watch seems like much too big and serious a gift. Betty's parents should have tipped her off about this. Mrs. F. R. is right in her feeling that her son could become over-involved because of such gifts.

Once the gift has been accepted, however, it would be impossible to give it back without hurting feelings. A better idea would be for Steve to let Betty know in a serious way that she "shouldn't" have done it and suggest tactfully, but firmly, that he won't accept any more gala presents.

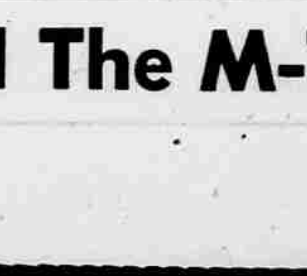
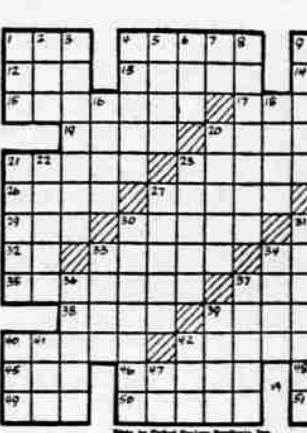
