Tennessee School Integration Interest Shifts To Nashville

Knoxville, Tenn. — The Tennessee integration struggle shifted today to the capital at Nashville from a federal courtroom here where John Kasper and six residents of Clinton sat stunned when a southern white jury found them guilty of criminal contempt.

In six weeks Nashville grammar schools open with integration going into effect in the first grade as part of a gradual desegregation plan that has won temporary approval of a U.S. district judge.

Kasper, 27, who is appealing two convictions for his interference with Clinton school integration, plans to go to Nashville in about 10 days to get in new groundwork.

Blasts Gov. Clement
With a blast at Gov. Frank Clement, the lanky Yankee-born segregationist said after his conviction that "Tennessee has no government" and the battle must be won or lost in this state.

In Clinton meanwhile the second integrated school year is expected to start late next month with 11 Negroes enrolled with some 75 whites. The Negroes will include five who attended last year, W. D. Human, the new principal, said the school board would set the exact opening date.

The Clinton residents, whose sentences along with Kasper's were delayed pending new trial motions, drove home through a sultry cast Tennessee afternoon. They face possible sentences of six months in jail and \$1,000 fines.

Convicted of Conspiracy
Kasper and the others were convicted of conspiring to violate U. S. District Judge Robert L. Taylor's injunction against interference with the Clinton integration. They were charged with blocking the Negroes' route to school and beating up a Baptist minister who ran a heckling gauntlet to deliver the Negroes to class.

Pear Harvest May Start Next Week

Some valley orchardists may start picking this year's Bartlett pear crop next week, according to County Horticultural Agent Clifford Cordy.

Others plan to wait until the week after. Cordy has invited all orchardists to bring samples of pears to his office in the county court house to test for ripeness.

Cordy uses a testing device to estimate how much fruit is now ripe, and this helps orchardists to determine how rapidly their crop should be picked.

About eight normal pears should be taken from the lower inside part of a tree in the early morning, and brought in for testing the same morning they are picked.

The d'Anjou harvest should begin in about three weeks, Cordy said, with bosc and comice harvests starting in early September.

Family Saved From Log Pond

Dorris, Calif. — Two lumber workers today saved a Portland, Ore., family of five from drowning after a car went out of control and sank in a log pond here.

Rescued were Mr. and Mrs. Carl Allen and their three children, Vicki, 8; Craig, 6, and Debra, 2. Their rescuers were James Chastain, Klamath Falls, and Jess Addington, Dorris.

California Highway Patrolman Virgil Winkelman Jr. said the car, driven by Mrs. Allen, was approaching the south end of Dorris when it struck a traffic sign, went over on a shoulder and plowed through dirt for 325 yards. Then, he said, the car flipped into the air 15 feet and landed on its wheels on four logs floating in the Associated Lumber and Box Company log pond.

Chastain and Addington saw the front end of the car extended beyond the first log and then saw it tip over "front first into the water and vanish from sight."

They ran from the mill across logs to the rescue. Chastain dove into the water, opened the car doors and pulled the children out, handing them to Addington on the logs. Then he got their parents out. They suffered only slight lacerations, bruises and shock.
