Portland — The weekly report on fishing conditions prepared by the State Game Commission:

SOUTHWEST — Summer steelhead angling was slow over the week end on the Umpqua, but with increased numbers passing Winchester dam, success should pick up. The Steamboat area continues to be best.

Trout angling is fair on the North Umpqua river. Trout angling is fair on Lemola and Toketee reservoirs. Coos Bay salmon fishing is good to excellent, with silvers predominating. Salmon angling on the lower Rogue river is fair to good.

CENTRAL — Fishing has been fair at East Lake. Some rainbow 16-18 inches have been taken on troll with flat fish. Pauline lake has been fair to good with 6-8 inch fish. Fishing is good at Big Lava lake on troll. Kokanee are hitting at Crane Prairie. Fishing is excellent at Three Creeks lake. South Twin lake is good on single salmon eggs. North Twin lake is fair. Wicupuk reservoir is good. Some catfish have been taken on the John Day river. Odell and Davis lakes are only fair. Diamond lake has been good with muskies. A few large fish from 2 to 4 pounds. Lake of the Woods has been fair in early morning of evening. Williamson river has been slow.

A few sea-run cutthroat are in the Nestucca up to Three rivers. The Little Nestucca is reported fair for cutthroat in tide water. A few chinook have been taken at the jaws of Nestucca bay. Lake Lytle and Spring lake are producing fair for trout and good for largemouth bass. Zetty and rock fishing has been good. Devils lake trout fishing has been slow to fair. Yaquina bay salmon fishing has been fair. Siuslaw sea-run cutthroat fishing has been fair in tide water. The Sandy river is colored from the Mt. Hood snow melt, and trout angling is slow. The Clackamas is fair in the upper portions. Fishing continues fair on the upper Willamette valley streams. Reservoirs are poor to fair. Clear lake is fair to good for trout. Other lakes in the Cascades are generally good for fly fishing during the evening hours.

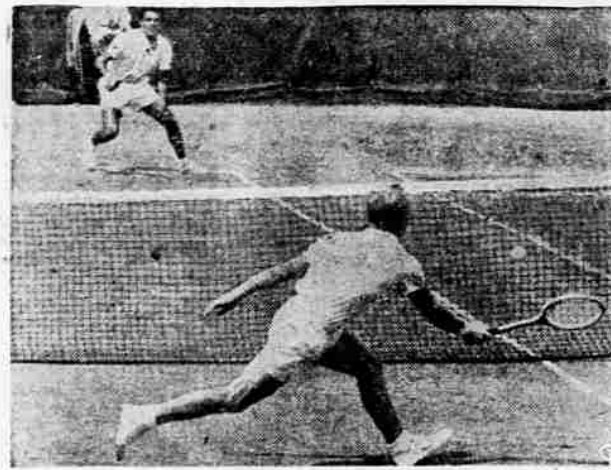
Defender Wins In Coast Golf

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Jack Sanford Chalks Up 13th Win for Phils; Billy Pierce, Luis Aparicio Spark Chisox

Jack Sanford, who made it the hard way in contrast to so many of the National league's highly-publicized pitching prodigies, seems sure today to top 'em all by becoming the first rookie to win 20 games for the Philadelphia Phillies in 46 years.

The Phillies haven't had a rookie win 20 games since Grover Cleveland Alexander did it in 1911 but the 27-year-old speedballer from Wellesley, Mass., raised his record to 13-3 Wednesday night with a 3-1 victory over the Milwaukee Braves.

The St. Louis Cardinals moved to within a game and a half of the first-place Braves when Larry Jackson shut out the Brooklyn Dodgers, 3-0, and the Cincinnati Redlegs were only two games from the top after Joe Nuxhall downed the Pittsburgh Pirates, 2-0. The Chicago Cubs shaded the New York Giants, 2-1, in the other National League game.
