

Cancer Workers for County Review Program Material

A special meeting of the educational committee of the American Cancer Society for all Jackson county was held at the home of Dr. Earl Lawson, 301 Windsor avenue, July 23. Mrs. Lawson, educational chairman, called the meeting of various Medford sub-chairmen and outlying community chairmen in order to acquaint them with the various types of literature available and the programs offered by the Cancer Society.

The ACS has a new color film to offer for general public use this year entitled "The Other City," and Laurence Butler showed this to the group. This is perhaps one of the most dramatic of all the ACS films, it is said. It was made possible through the cooperation of a city of 75,000 people — Racine, Wis. In startling sequences the film illustrates the tragedy of the 75,000 who die of cancer needlessly each year. Racine symbolically becomes a silent city, without life, with the dishes still waiting to be washed, the bicycle wheels still spinning. And it pinpoints the ACS message through seven people — seven danger signals. "It is a film that truly leaves a lasting impression," Mrs. Lawson reports.
