

Interceptors Fail To Beat Speed of Sound in Contest

Washington — The modern jet interceptors in Air Force service failed to beat the speed of sound in a contest widely ballyhooed in advance as "history's first supersonic race."

Slow tail winds were blamed for the inability of six F102 Delta Dagger jets to dash between Chicago and nearby Andrews Air Force base, Md., Sunday faster than sound in the Bendix trophy race.

Though the flight was not up to advance billing, a new Bendix race record of 679 miles per hour was set by Capt. Kenneth D. Chandler, 33, Compton, Calif. He streaked over the 618.73-mile course from O'Hare airport to Andrews in 54 minutes, 45.5 seconds.

The record drew thunderous applause from an officially estimated 75,000 people gathered at Andrews for an Air Force demonstration of strength in honor of the service's "golden anniversary."

Slower Than Record

Chandler's speed was 44.5 miles an hour slower than the new transcontinental record set by Marine Maj. John Glenn Jr. in a Navy Crusader fighter July 16 over a course almost four times as long. Glenn refueled in flight three times between Los Angeles and New York. He had light tail winds at the beginning of his flight but then ran into crosswinds and headwinds the rest of the way.

In Sunday's second major race, Maj. Peter R. Phillipy, McKees Rocks, Pa., set a new record of 638 miles an hour in an F84F Thunderstreak in the annual Ricks Memorial race for Air National Guard pilots. He defeated 11 competitors in the run from Fresno, Calif., to Andrews Air base. They landed for refueling at Tucson, Ariz., Dallas, Tex., and Atlanta, Ga.

The F102 is the chief interceptor in the Continental Air Defense Command. The Bendix race Sunday indicated it needs a substantial tail wind to go a distance of 620 miles at a speed greater than that of sound.

In the air show, the Air Force demonstrated all its supersonic fighter aircraft including such 1,000 to 1,400-mile an hour aircraft as the F101 Voodoo interceptor scheduled for early service, the F104 day fighter and the F104, a new ground support plane recently put into production.

Men Hospitalized After Rolling Car

Two Medford men are hospitalized today following a one-car accident Sunday night on the Dead Indian rd., 10 miles east of Ashland, state police said.

Richard W. Imhausen, the driver, route 3, Medford, is in the Rogue Valley hospital with four fractured vertebrae and possible internal injuries. The attending physician described his condition as good this morning.

Clifford Eckel, 2409 Happy Valley rd., is in the Sacred Heart hospital here with a broken jaw and possible skull fracture, state police said.

Kenneth Rotan, route 1, Medford, another passenger, was reported not injured.

State police said all three were picked up by a passing motorist and taken to the Ashland General hospital. Imhausen and Eckel were later transferred to the Medford hospitals and Rotan was picked up by his father.

Imhausen was travelling west on Dead Indian road when his car got off on a gravel shoulder, rolled over and came to rest on its wheels about 40 feet from the shoulder, state police said.

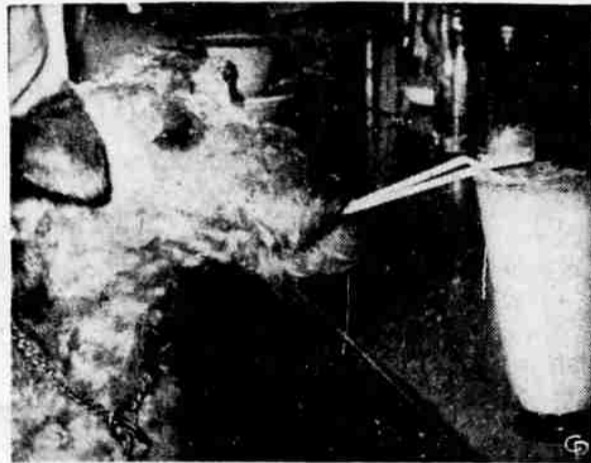

Boy Suffering From Case of Encephalitis

Pasco, Wash. — Encephalitis has struck down a six-year-old boy near Eltopia in the Columbia Basin project, it was learned here Sunday.

In critical condition at Our Lady of Lourdes hospital here was Mike O'Neil, son of Mr. and Mrs. George O'Neil who farm about 17 miles north of Pasco.

The attending physician said Sunday the boy's illness had been diagnosed as encephalitis but that he did not know whether the sleeping sickness was of the flu type or of the equine, mosquito carried kind.

The O'Neil farm is in an area heavily infested with mosquitoes and the doctor said the boy had suffered numerous mosquito bites.

It was the second suspected equine encephalitis case in a human in eastern Washington this year. A Sunnyside woman also was hospitalized with the ailment.
