Ban Considered After Wild Teen-Aged Party At Rock 'n' Roll Show

Milwaukee — The city attorney's office today considered banning all rock 'n' roll stage shows in the wake of wild teen-aged parties and drinking sprees at a Milwaukee theater.

Knife fights broke out during the week end performances, youngsters staged dances in the aisles and young girls solicited outside the theater, authorities said.

Bottles Swept Up
Police arrested 29 persons and said they swept up baskets full of empty whiskey and beer bottles after the show, which featured the stage appearance of rock 'n' roll performers and the movie "Calypso Heat Wave."

However, Earl Tetting, an assistant to L. F. Gran, owner of the Garfield theater, defended rock 'n' roll shows.

"We're purely catering to the desires of the people for entertainment," Tetting said. He said

the rock 'n' roll shows were staged because of lagging attendance.

But Asst. City Atty. Robert Anderson said such shows "have to stop." He scheduled a meeting between city officials and the theater owner.

"Somebody might have been killed," Anderson said.

Inhibitions Said Lost
"We've been through all dance crazes from Charleston to jitterbug, but never have been affected like that," he said.

"Those kids just lost all their inhibitions and sense of moral responsibility."

Anderson said three Negro girls and a white girl, none of them over 16 years old, tried to solicit a member of the city attorney's office staff outside the theater.

The city officials said although there are no "clear cut laws against such shows," "we could

Boy Found With Fractured Skull

Whitman, Mass. — A three year old boy, missing from his home for five hours, was found Monday night in a thicket, his skull fractured. A bloody 10-pound rock apparently used by his attacker was found nearby.

He was found only six miles from where two young brothers were knifed to death and burned by a sexual psychopath on Friday.

Little Richard Doherty Jr., who vanished from his yard on Monday afternoon was discovered face down in a briar patch. He had a four inch gash on the back of his head and police said his body was covered with bruises.

The child was taken to Brockton hospital where doctors said his condition was poor.

In Brockton District Court Monday Raymond F. Ohlson, 20, was held without bail for the slaying of John Logan, 12, and his brother, Edward, 11, both of Stoughton.

Their stabbed and burned bodies were found in a Brockton park Friday and Ohlson has admitted the murders, according to police. The pallid faced, sideburned youth entered a mandatory plea of innocent and the case was continued to Aug. 8.

Labor Laws Said Neglected by HST

New York — Attorney General Herbert Brownell Jr. has accused the Truman administration of neglecting to enforce criminal laws against labor racketeering, according to a New York Times dispatch from London.

Brownell, who is attending the American Bar association meeting in London, said the Eisenhower administration found that criminal laws were not being enforced in several important areas, including labor racketeering, when it came into power in 1952, the Times said.

Brownell said that since he took over from Truman's attorney general, James P. McGranery there have been more than 200 prosecutions of labor racketeers. He said there was a great need for reform in criminal procedure and predicted that there would be more progress in reform in the next decade than in any comparable period in the past.

Vancouver, Wash. — An eight-year-old boy was injured fatally Monday evening when he was run over by a feed wagon on his father's farm in the Fern Prairie district near Camas.

The victim was Tom Myers, son of Mr. and Mrs. Clayton D. Myers.

Deputy Coroner Fred Apple said the boy was riding on the wagon which was being drawn by a tractor driven by his father. He said the boy apparently fell off the front of the wagon and both the front and rear wheels passed over him. The boy died in a Vancouver hospital today from internal injuries.

Redwood City, Calif. — A pair of young prisoners accused of murdering a cellmate in a weird "kangaroo court" execution explained today they were merely "havin' some fun, man."

Girl Arraigned On Murder Charge

San Mateo, Calif. — Suzanne Elaine Soule, 19, was arraigned in Municipal Court on Monday for murdering her roommate by beating her with an electric iron and stabbing her with a kitchen knife.

Victim of the savage attack last Wednesday was Catherine Marie Elvins, 19, attractive daughter of a prominent Seattle physician.

Miss Soule was given until Aug. 7 to enter a plea to the murder charge. Her attorney, John McKenna, asked Judge J. A. Branson for the continuance, saying he wanted to have the girl examined by a psychiatrist.

Miss Soule, her face a mask, listened quietly as the judge read the complaint accusing her of killing Miss Elvins in the Burlingame apartment they shared.

She spoke only one word that was when she corrected the judge when he mispronounced her name as "Miss Soule."

With Miss Soule in court was her father, Frank A. Soule, of Freeport, N.Y. He declined to discuss the case.

San Rafael Flames Wreck Business Firms

San Rafael, Calif. — Wind-driven flames swept both sides of the main street of this suburban San Francisco Bay area town Monday night destroying shops on two block fronts.

Damage was estimated at \$2 million. More than a dozen shops were gutted.

Fire Chief C. M. Johanson said it was the worst fire in the history of San Rafael.

RED CROSS DIRECTOR DIES
Eagle, Wis. — Dr. John Earl Baker, 76, director of American Red Cross relief projects in China in the 1920s, will be buried Wednesday at a cemetery here. He died Saturday at his home in Mill Valley, Calif., but was born here and graduated from the University of Wisconsin in 1908.

"It was just a game, man," said Jose Veitenheimer, 19, who acted as "prosecutor" in last Friday's trial that resulted in Robert Young, a 38-year-old machinist.

Veitenheimer was charged Monday with murder, along with Dan Howard, 18, a narcotics user who has "born to hate cops" tattooed across his abdomen, and Vern C. Williams, 20.

The execution took place in a cell in the San Mateo county jail. Young was serving a 10-day sentence for vagrancy. The others were in on various felony charges.

Serves as Judge
"You know, man, we were just havin' some fun," said Howard, who served as "judge" in the trial. "We didn't mean to kill him."

Police Chief William Faulstich said the three "have no more remorse than if they'd killed a fly."

Three other men who acted as "jurors" in the trial were Walter White, 22, Alfred Martinez, 21, and Ernest Lopez, 20. They said they hid their faces under their blankets to avoid seeing Young get strangled.

Young incurred the hostility of his cellmates apparently because he considered them "criminals" and beneath his notice. On many occasions he did not reply to their jibes.

Hard of Hearing
Coroner Paul B. Jensen suggested that Young did not reply simply because he was hard of hearing. His hearing aid was in the jail safe with his other personal effects.

After being found guilty at his "trial," Young's cellmates strung him to the top cell bar with a blanket and pushed him off a bunk. His 170-pound weight ripped the blanket. This was Friday night.

During the next day, deputies said Veitenheimer engaged in "baseball practice," hurling tin cups at Young.

On Saturday night, under cover of singing in an adjoining cell, Howard and Veitenheimer took turns choking Young while Williams held his arms, deputies said. Then they tried to make it look as though Young had committed suicide. However, guards were suspicious and the story came to light Sunday.

Movie Actress Hurt In Auto Accident

East Meadow, N. Y. — Movies actress Barbara Nichols, 26, who has a featured role in "Sweet Smell of Success," was reported in "fair" condition today with injuries received in an automobile accident.

The shapely, blonde actress is recovering from shock suffered when a car in which she was riding collided with another auto Saturday night. She was reported resting comfortably at Meadowbrook hospital.

The driver of the car in which Miss Nichols was riding, Leverett S. Miller, 25, and both occupants of the second auto were treated for cuts and bruises.

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
