

## Ex-Wisconsin Governor, Old Foe To Battle for McCarthy's Seat

Milwaukee, Wis.—Former Gov. Walter J. Kohler, an "Eisenhower Republican," and Democrat William Proxmire, whom he beat in two gubernatorial elections, will fight it out in the Aug. 27 general election to succeed the late Sen. Joseph R. McCarthy.

It will be a familiar scene when the two winners of Tuesday's Wisconsin primary election battle for the Senate seat. Kohler was governor for three terms (1950-1956) and Proxmire thrice tried unsuccessfully for that office. Kohler won both times they opposed each other.

Only about 500,000 of the state's 2,300,000 eligible voters cast ballots despite generally fair weather.

Proxmire predicted: "For the first time in 20 years Wisconsin will have a Democratic senator." Kohler said: "It is important

now that we all unite and look to a Republican victory."

Kohler beat out six conservative opponents for the Republican nomination. He rallied late in the vote-counting, mainly on the strength of support in populous Milwaukee county, to beat former Rep. Glenn Davis by nearly 9,000 votes. Rep. Alvin O'Konski, an early leader, fell back to third.

Proxmire won the Democratic nomination by about a 3-2 margin over Rep. Clement Zablocki of Milwaukee.

One hitch developed in the primary election, however, which could lead to a court battle. Gaige Roberts, state election supervisor, said "Republican Party" and "Democratic Party" were printed on the outside of Milwaukee county ballots rather than on the inside.

O'Konski said he was serious-

ly considering a suit to "void the ballots." He said the printing mistake was a "typical Chicago machine election tactic, done deliberately to keep Democrats from voting according to their conscience."

Republican returns from 3,354 of the state's 3,361 precincts gave Kohler 109,424, Davis 100,777, O'Konski 66,758, Lt. Gov. Warren Knowles 23,932, former State Supreme Court Justice Henry Huges 7,562, State Sen. Gerald Lorge 7,366, and former Rep. John Schaefer 1,964.

Democratic returns gave Proxmire 87,498 and Zablocki 56,042.

Kohler and Proxmire will be the major party candidates on the ballot along with Socialist Labor candidate Mrs. Georgia Cuzzini and one or two independents.

## Inquest Into Death Of Homedale Clerk Awaiting Autopsy

Ontario — A decision on where, when or whether to hold an inquest into the death of Homedale City Clerk Bertha Ehrhart was deferred here today pending receipt of a formal autopsy report from Dr. Joseph Beeman, Boise pathologist.

The body of the 39-year-old woman was recovered Monday from the Oregon side of the Sawyee County. Prosecutor Sylvan Jeppesen said he had checked Idaho law and, since it was undetermined on which side of the river Mrs. Ehrhart's body went into the water, he had no statutory power to have the remains sent to Idaho.

He added, however, the investigation of Mrs. Ehrhart's strange disappearance and death would continue in Owyhee county regardless of whether the body could be obtained for any inquest. The woman's hands were tied behind the back but investigators said the cord was secured with slip knots which Mrs. Ehrhart could have tied herself.

## Graham Offers Job To Accused 'Usher'

New York — Billy Graham gave a demonstration Tuesday night on how to carry out the Biblical admonition to turn the other cheek.

The object of his demonstration was Louis Silver, 49, a former liquor salesman accused of posing as an usher at Graham's Yankee Stadium rally on July 20 and taking up a \$491 collection for himself.

The evangelist offered Silver a temporary job at Madison Square Garden as an usher.

"I have confidence in Mr. Silver and want to give him a chance to show his good faith," Graham told the United Press. "He needs the money and we want to give him a chance to work out the sum we are able to give him."

He said he had instructed an aide to give Silver enough money to help meet his wife's doctor's expenses and other debts. Silver, who came here recently from Los Angeles, pleaded not guilty July 25 to grand larceny charges. He said that he had been handed the \$491 by someone and told to deliver it to Graham. The detective who arrested him said Silver had tried to bribe him.

## Recreation Building To Be Started Soon

Dunsmuir—Construction of a winter-summer recreation facility on the slopes of Mt. Shasta at Panther Meadows is expected to begin at once, according to the Mt. Shasta Ski Bowl corporation.

Application for release of \$450,000 held in escrow by the corporation has been made to the California Commissioner of Corporations.

The money represents stock sales and meets the financial requirements set by the U.S. forest service in granting land use for the development.

The corporation has set a Dec. 1, 1957 goal for opening the 600-passenger per hour chair lift, which will extend 7,775 feet from the 7,600-foot level to 9,800 feet elevation.

Surfacing of the first section of the Everitt Memorial highway from Mt. Shasta to Panther Meadows is underway and use of the entire route has been assured for this winter.

Moscow — There was a hot time in the old town of Moscow Tuesday night, with a thousand Russian youths rocking to the "St. Louis Blues" and "Swing Low Sweet Chariot."

The International Youth Festival was in full swing with the Russians crowding into the Cinema Actors house to hear Britain's Ruce Turner's orchestra and Jeff Ellison's band playing western songs.

Bernice Reading, a Negro, set the house a-jumping with "Rock Baby Rock" and the rock 'n' roll version of the once banned "Chichernaya" (Dark Eyes).

The audience, caught in the spirit, clapped in rhythm and applauded enthusiastically.

Robert Green, Los Angeles, brought a self-produced documentary film "The Color of Man" to Russia, intending to enter it as the only American offering to the festival's film competition.

Rumors that the Americans were bringing other American-made films, including the controversial "Blackboard Jungle," proved false.

## Jaycees Start Sale Of 'Preferred Stock'

A program to encourage citizens outside the membership of the Junior Chamber of Commerce to join in their youth activities and civic betterment projects has been announced by Hal Gardner, president of the "Preferred Stockholder committee."

In letters to interested Medford people, Gardner wrote that "while active membership is restricted to young men between the ages of 21 and 35 years of age, we have many persons who would like to aid us."

The Jaycees have begun the sale of \$15 per share "preferred stock" to be invested in community projects. Gardner and Charles Henry, committee chairman, announced that stockholders will receive a quarterly report and a "company" annual meeting will be held in January in conjunction with the Jaycee Distinguished Service Awards banquet.

Projects of the group include the summer camp for children at Lake of the Woods, Prescott park program, Teen Age rodeo, golf and tennis, Christmas activities, and several others.
