

Ceylon Newspapers Suggest Gluck Find Way Out as Envoy

Colombo, Ceylon — Local newspapers Saturday called U.S. Ambassador-Delegate Maxwell H. Gluck "I don't know-Cluck" and suggested he "find some way to get out" of his appointment as envoy to Ceylon.

The kind of publicity Gluck has been getting here, the Morning Times commented, "makes it very unlikely that he could function effectively or comfortably in Ceylon."

The Ceylonese press has been pouring out copy critical of Gluck since he disclosed he did not know the name of Ceylon's prime minister, Solomon West Ridgeway Dias Bandaranaike.

The Chinese Communist radio Peiping also entered the controversy Saturday. A Peiping broadcast heard in London quoted the Ceylon Daily News as remarking: "Gluck is the first American we know to have actually admitted his ignorance on a subject."

The public discussion, ranging from jests to harsh criticism, was stepped up following Secretary of State John Foster Dulles' London comments of Friday.

Dulles said that if the United States were to limit its selection of Envoys to Ceylon to those who knew the country's prime minister "we would have a limited choice."

The Times said yesterday that "the case of Maxwell Gluck" was becoming "more and more embarrassing to everybody" with "each explanation" for him.

"It is not necessary for an ambassador to know everything about the country to which he is appointed," the newspaper said.

"What disturbs us is that Gluck seemed at the time of questioning to know next to nothing about world events generally and especially the most important political document of the year, the U.N. report on Hungary."

"Nobody doubts his goodwill," the paper added, "and he undoubtedly has a desire to serve his country but seems to be the wrong kind of person for a diplomatic post."

"It is in no spirit of mischief that we suggest Gluck find some way to get out of the appointment to Ceylon that he has accepted."

Troop Withdrawal To Present Problem

Tokyo — Japanese "satisfaction" over the announced withdrawal of United States ground forces from Japan was tempered Saturday by the economic problems it will bring.

The Asahi Evening News reported more than 66,000 Japanese employed by the security forces would be thrown out of work.

Thousands of others working in bars, cabarets, souvenir shops, tailoring and dressmaking establishments, laundries, hotels and other small businesses also will feel the absence of the free-spending GIs.

Not all the American servicemen will leave Japan under the new order. Some 80,000 U. S. Navy and Air Force personnel and their supply units will remain and offset some of the loss suffered by the departing ground forces.

Irishman Arrives in Topeka on Country Walk

Topeka — A spry 77-year-old Irishman, Patrick P. Thienes, rested here briefly Friday on his 17th walking trip from coast to coast.

Thienes estimated he has strolled 239,181 miles since he tossed away crutches after he was stricken with polio in his childhood. His current jaunt from San Diego to New York City, he said, will probably wear out three pairs of high-top shoes.

"Keeps you healthy," commented Thienes. "Good for anybody."

Gervais Woman Injured In Car-Train Accident

Salem — A Gervais woman was in serious condition in a Salem hospital Saturday as the result of a collision between her four-passenger Renault auto and a northbound freight train here Friday.

Mrs. Gloria Hope Hunter, 31, suffered multiple head lacerations in the accident which also slightly injured her nine-year-old daughter Deborah.

Police said Mrs. Hunter was thrown from the car which was dragged 97 feet by the train.

Michigan Man Bothered With Pain in Left Leg

Midland, Mich. — Robert Prosser, 21, Merrill, told police he had been bothered by a lot of pain in his left leg for some time and resorted to a drastic "remedy."

Thieves Break Into Graham's NY Office

New York — Thieves broke into the Billy Graham New York crusade office early Saturday and stole a "negligible" amount of money.

The office was one of several entered by the burglars in a Times Square area office building.

Crusade officials said the thieves broke open a small petty cash box. They said it was the first time a crusade office has been robbed in any of their evangelistic campaigns here and abroad.

Police Seek Clue To Toledo Slaying

Toledo, Ohio — Police Saturday checked all known sex deviates for a clue to the rape slaying of a mother of four whose nearly nude body was found along a short cut to her home early Friday.

Detectives said the slayer had criminally assaulted and strangled Mrs. Anne Louise La Tour, 33, and left her body along a secluded path near a West Side Post Office substation.

A blue party dress was found near the body. A wedding and engagement ring and diamond brooch had not been taken.

The body was found at 5:20 a.m. by a postal worker and police estimated the woman had been dead for about two hours.

Police said Mrs. La Tour had taken her children home from a beach party Thursday evening and then went to the Gaiety club with another woman for an evening of drinking.

Police said the woman frequented barrooms in the neighborhood and it was her custom to take the short cut home where she was slain.

Her husband was away at his job as a railroad research employee for the New York Central Railroad in Cleveland at the time of the slaying.

Robert Jacob, a bartender, said Mrs. La Tour had talked with two men at the Gaiety club but left alone at the 2:30 a.m. closing time.

Bronx Youth Charged In Knife Murder

New York — Police charged a Bronx youth with celebrating his 16th birthday Saturday by murdering another youth with a hunting knife.

The 18-year-old victim was the fourth to die from teen-age violence in the city within a week.

Samuel Montgomery and two other youths, Robert May, 16, and Russell Corley, 16, were celebrating Montgomery's birthday when words between the trio and the victim and Richard Vaughan, 78, led to a fistfight and then the stabbing, police said.

A juvenile gang fatally stabbed one youth earlier last week. The 26-year-old son of a policeman was killed to death by teenage thugs last week-end. A 74-year-old man died of over-exertion Wednesday night shortly after he fought off three hoodlums in Central Park.

A 16-year-old boy was in critical condition from a near-fatal stabbing Thursday night.

Bomb Threat Sends Police to Navy Ship

New York — A telephoned bomb threat Friday night sent the crew of a U.S. Navy frigate to battle stations.

A meticulous hour and 40-minute search of the 31,675-ton USS Mitscher tied up in the East river failed to disclose a bomb.

The Mitscher, one of several Navy vessels which docked here Friday as part of New York's summer festival, had been visited several hours earlier by musical comedy star Ethel Merman.

A Navy spokesman said an anonymous caller telephoned Third Naval district headquarters about the bomb threat.

Some 200 officers and men aboard the ship raced to battle stations while police, firemen and fireboats sped to the dock. Police said a search showed the call a hoax.

Man Sentenced for Securities Violation

Portland — Edgar Robert Errion, 56, who admitted violations of the securities and exchange act, mail fraud, and conspiracy to commit the violations in connection with memberships in two Oregon plywood cooperatives, was sentenced Friday to 12 years in prison.

Errion pleaded guilty to government charges that he and accomplices took \$550,000 from persons who were investing in the Mt. Hood Hardwood and Plywood cooperative, Estacada. He also pleaded guilty to charges of a swindle of "several hundred thousand dollars" in the organization of the Beaver Coop of Salem.

Power Companies to Study Coal Seams

Portland — The possibility of coal seams in the Cascade foothills east of Centralia, Wash., are being studied by Pacific Power and Light company and Washington Water Power company, the firms announced here Friday.

The companies have taken options on a "substantial" acreage of land in an area of Lewis and Thurston counties to the south and east of Bucoda, Wash., officials said.

The coal study, described as a long range effort, is designed to determine its potential as a power source to help fulfill the region's need after the development of planned hydroelectric projects.

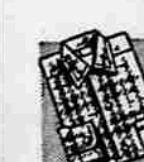

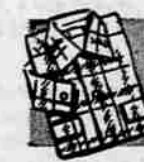

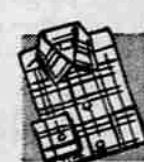
