

## Helicopter Pilot Killed, Passenger Hurt Near Roseburg

Roseburg — A helicopter pilot was killed and his passenger was injured Tuesday evening when the craft crashed in rugged country of the Umpqua National Forest about 50 miles east of here. Vondis Miller, forest supervisor at the Steamboat ranger station, said a ground party reached the wreckage about 4 a.m. today and reported the pilot, Bruce Forrester, had been killed. The passenger, Mike Moore, suffered a broken ankle but otherwise apparently was all right, Miller said.

### To Be Evacuated

Moore had to be carried to a clear spot on a high rock and evacuated to Roseburg by helicopter, Miller said.

The crash was reported about 7 p.m. Tuesday by a lookout who saw the 'copter go down in heavily-timbered country about 12 miles from Steamboat. Ground parties on foot and on horseback hiked throughout the night to reach the scene.

Miller said the helicopter which crashed had been flying timber cruisers into back country.

Miller said Forrester was being relieved from the San Francisco bay area and had been flying for the Forest Service. Moore, he said, had been working locally for the service.
